PORTLAND, Nov. 25. (AP)—The turkey market was fairly steady here today with the demand chiefly for hams and very small turkeys. Few of the latter were available. Receipts were described as "only fair" over Sunday.

The general top for hams was 29 to 30 cents a pound to retailers, with some quoted at 28 to 29 cents.

The buying price was nominally 24 to 25 cents for hams, live birds, Portland delivered price, were 18 to 20 cents.
