Daggett, member of the state board of forestry, was emphatic in his belief that the new law will work to the benefit of taxpayers in general, and others expressed similar opinions.

Kimball, opening the meeting, said that the lumber men had learned, from publication of the proposed budget, that a considerable increase in taxation is in prospect. The county levy, for instance, would be upped from 17.54 mills last year to 20.24 mills; he averred.

Timber men present expressed the opinion this is not the time to begin extensive increases in taxation, although they are not opposing minor salary increases in line with higher living costs.

Chapman emphasized that valuations both in Klamath county and the state as a whole, have been materially reduced.

Members of the county court discussed the problems of delinquent taxes at some length, and when the tentative decision to abandon foreclosures was reached, Commissioner Chase said:

"Now, don't tell us we haven't tried to collect delinquent taxes."

The conferees got only part way through the budget Tuesday morning. They informally discussed numerous items, such as those for relief, circuit court, and various departments.

Chapman, tax expert of the Weyerhaeuser company with headquarters in Tacoma, raised numerous questions. He asked about an item for attorney's fees.

Action Not Determined
What action the league will take on the project for shutting off oil from Italy—as the United States has recommended from both Italy and Ethiopia—still had not been determined.

British sources expressed suspicion Premier Mussolini of Italy had succeeded in driving a wedge between Premier Laval of France and Great Britain.

Officials refused to say whether Great Britain would demand action at Geneva as soon as Premier Laval's status in the situation was cleared up.

GENEVA, Nov. 26. (AP)—League of nations' officials said today the meeting to discuss imposition of an oil embargo against Italy probably would be December 6 or 9.

Rumania and India have joined with Soviet Russia in expressing readiness to extend the existing embargoes against exports to Italy to include oil, iron and steel.

India made no reservation, but Rumania, like Russia, made the acceptance conditional upon its being instituted by all producing and exporting states.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26. (AP)—The United States was denied officially today as standing firm in its efforts to discourage abnormal trade with Italy and Ethiopia, despite delayed action by the league of nations on the proposed oil and steel embargo against Italy.

State department sources reaffirmed that postponement of league consideration of the embargo had no effect on maintenance of a separate and independent American neutrality policy.

FINANCE OCCUPIES F. D. R.'S STUDIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26. (AP)—Budget recommendations drew the attention of President Roosevelt today while child patients of the Warm Springs foundation excitedly awaited a drawing which will decide his Thanksgiving dinner partners.

Effect of Trade Treaty Discussed

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the terms of the new treaty, this is reduced to 20 per cent. This duty is still much higher than has ever been charged by the United States on Canadian lumber.

"Limitation of 250,000,000 feet has been placed on importations of fir and hemlock but no limitations have been placed on pine or spruce which make up bulk of imports and which are strongest competitors of western pine.

"Canadian spruce and pine production is largely from the eastern provinces of Quebec and Ontario. Logging operations for such mills are conducted largely in the winter months. Date of treaty announcement will permit Canadian mills to start logging without delay. Effects of this increased production will not be felt before the summer of 1936.

"Freight rates from eastern Canadian mills to Boston average 29c per 100 pounds and to New York 33 cents. Rate from Klamath Falls is 72 cents and that rate represents a recent reduction. The reduced rate is temporary and will be cancelled if it does not produce enough additional business to justify making it permanent. If cancelled, the former rate of 88 cents will apply. It had been anticipated that this reduced rate would permit western manufacturers to enter New England markets with low grade lumber. The reduction of duty is nearly equal to the reduction in freight rate so that it is questionable if shipments can be increased sufficiently to justify continuance of the lower rate now in effect.

"British Columbia minimum was rate is 35 cents per hour. The prevailing rate in eastern Canada is slightly lower. The general minimum in Oregon and Washington is 50 cents."

With Senator Borah apparently considering the idea of running for president, politicians and today that his republican independent colleagues in the senate probably would be divided on such a candidacy.

Three members of that little band in which Borah has been a leader for years—Senators Norris of Nebraska, La Follette of Wisconsin and Johnson of California—have become so closely affiliated with President Roosevelt that a break would be unlikely, political leaders contended.

These three have taken so little part in republican affairs of late that they could probably give Borah small help even in a fight for the nomination. La Follette has left the party entirely and become a progressive.

SEC COMPLAINT FILED IN COURT

NEW YORK, Nov. 26. (AP)—The securities and exchange commission today filed a complaint in equity in federal court against Electric Bond & Share Co. and five of its intermediate holding concerns, asking the court to direct them to register in compliance with the public utilities act of 1935.

The S. E. C. also asked the court to issue subpoenas directing Electric Bond & Share and the holding corporations specified to answer the complaint in court and "for such other relief as the court may deem fit."
