YOUTH'S DEATH TERMED ACCIDENT

VALE, Ore., Nov. 27. (AP)—A coroner's jury decided last night that George Dapkus, 18-year-old Cleveland, Ohio, boy, died of a fractured skull accidentally incurred. No blame was placed.

The body of Dapkus, member of the Vale CCC camp, was found on a highway near here late Sunday.

William H. Ragsdale, who told the jury his truck had "struck something" Sunday night, was not held. Coroner R. A. Tacke said even if Ragsdale's machine hit the youth the jury was not convinced that another car had not first dealt the fatal injury.

The front tires on Ragsdale's machine, the coroner said, were worn smooth. Evidence given to the jury showed there were tread marks on Dapkus' head.

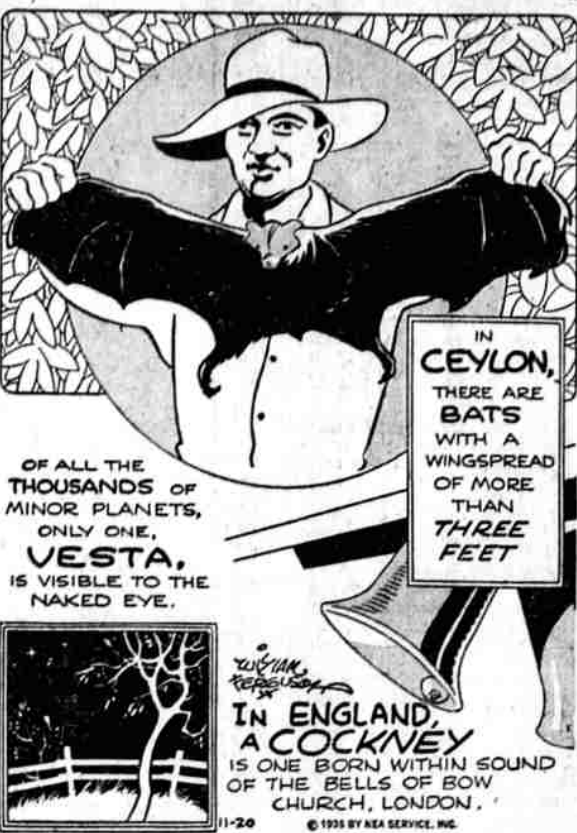
Coroner Tacke said the jury was at loss to account for the position of the boy's body. He said the youth was found in a pose which indicated he had been asleep, his head resting on his crossed arms. He said the youth had not been drinking. He was seen in Vale a few hours before his body was found.

Officers of the Boise, Idaho, CCC headquarters told the jury their separate investigation showed the boy could not have been knocked down or dragged. Aside from the fractured skull, the only other apparent injury was a small bruise on one leg, they testified.

CCC officers have not yet announced disposition of the body.

MANSLAUGHTER JURY'S VERDICT

PORTLAND, Nov. 27. (AP)—George Leonard Fiedler, 23, was convicted Tuesday of manslaughter in the shotgun slaying of Deputy Sheriff Ernest Loll who sought to arrest him for shooting a China pheasant out of season.

Fiedler was tried on a charge of first degree murder and the state had demanded the death penalty.

Sentence Friday. Circuit Judge Hall S. Lusk will sentence Fiedler at 9:30 a. m. Friday. Maximum penalty is 15 years in prison and a \$5000 fine.

Trial of A. F. Weston, 23, Fiedler's companion when Loll was killed in suburban Portland September 29, will be started soon. He also will be charged with first degree murder, the prosecution alleging Fiedler blasted the deputy to the ground with two shots and that Weston then fired a charge into Loll's prone body.

The jury of seven men and five women received the Fiedler case at 6:20 p. m. Monday and was locked up for the night at 11:30 p. m. Deliberations were resumed this morning and at 10:15 a. m. the jury gave its first indication it was considering a less severe penalty than first degree murder when it asked Judge Lusk to repeat his instructions. The manslaughter verdict was brought in shortly after 5 p. m.

Captured at Moclipis. The state insisted Fiedler killed Loll from ambush, with premeditation, rather than be arrested for illegal hunting. Defense counsel sought to show

that Fiedler's mental reactions in emergencies were unreliable, due to skull injury suffered a year ago, and that he shot in self-defense.

After the killing of Loll, Fiedler and Weston fled to Moclipis, Wash., where they were captured without a struggle.
