TOKYO, Thursday, Nov. 28. (AP)—Empress Nagako gave birth to a boy at 7:57 a. m. today, it was announced officially. The boy becomes the second in line to the throne of the Japanese empire, after the baby crown prince born two years ago.
Crown Prince Akihito, born in December, 1933, was the fifth child of the imperial household. The emperor's and empress' first four children were girls. The second, Princess Hima, died in March, 1928, when six months old.

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UNITED PRESS NAMES STARS

Team Players Rather Than Individual Performers Dominate.

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SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—Team players, rather than brilliant individual performers dominate the 1935 United Press-all-coast football selections.

Sports editors, football writers and United Press correspondents who followed the various teams and players, agreed on first and second team selections which stressed practical playing possibilities unusual in a collection of "stars".

Grayson Great Star

The 1935 season on the coast has not been generally marked by singlehanded performances. Stanford rose to its greatest heights only when Bobby Grayson, brightest individual player, received team blocking and support. Grayson motored the Cardinals within scoring distance in at least three games, only to be forced to call on big Jim "Monk" Moscrip to settle matters by booting field goals.

Typical of the general play was that of California, where a company of fine backs—Floyd Blower, Don Fowler, George Cornell, Sam Chapman—shared almost equal honors. Washington banked on the combined rather than individual power of Byron Haines, Jimmy Cain, Elmer Logg and Ed Novogroski.

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Sisler Planning to Buy Interest in St. Louis Club

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 28. (AP)—George Sisler, who experienced the glory and misfortune of baseball in a decade with the St. Louis Browns, expects to return to the team as a part owner.
Sisler, once considered the best first baseman in baseball and onetime Browns' manager, confirmed reports last night that he and a group of St. Louis sportsmen and business men plan to buy the American league club.

"We know just about how much it will take to buy the club," he said, "and it looks like we'll have little trouble raising the necessary amount."

Sisler, who managed the team after suffering eye trouble at the height of his playing career, said his projected return to the diamond would not be in an active role.

"Hornby will do the managing," he asserted.

Sisler, who joined the Browns as a pitcher in 1915, was shifted to first base and became a star almost immediately.

He was voted in 1922 the most valuable player in the American league.

He is now a sporting goods manufacturer and softball league promoter.

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
