

Nebraska Beats Beavers in Closing Period

OREGON STATE LOSES, 26-20

Thrilling Battle Waged
in Intersectional
Clash.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 29. (UP)—Oregon State's football team, thrice beaten in its own conference, drove the chill out of Memorial stadium field Thursday before finally bowing to the Big Six champion Nebraska Cornhuskers, 26 to 20.

Twenty-five thousand spectators forgot their feet were cold in the fourth period when the Beavers, seemingly outclassed early in the game, forged ahead, 20 to 19, with a long looping forward pass. Mountain to Schultz, for 67 yards and a touchdown.

25,000 See Game
The twenty-five thousand then saw Coach Dana Bible send back into the game his first team backfield, starting from their own 35-yard line, the Cornhuskers marched down the field for 65 yards and a touchdown.

Lloyd Cardwell was the main driving rod in this march and it was he who drove across the Oregon State right tackle spot for the touchdown. He was ably assisted all the way by other members of a backfield that is considered one of the best in Nebraska history.

Jerry Lanoue, Sam Francis and Henry Bauer participated in the relentless push that Oregon State, with victory almost in its grasp, could not stop.

Mountain, Gray Star
Statistics showed that Nebraska had a wide margin in sheer power but the Beavers constantly threatened with their passing attack. The field was a bit slippery but there was no rain during the game.

Joe Gray and Bob Mountain starred for Oregon State while Bernie Scherer, left end, Francis, Lanoue and Cardwell shone for the Huskers.

**Smaller Crowd
Sees Portland
Football Game**
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29. (AP)—The Washington high-Spokane high football game drew smaller crowds than the so-called mythical state championship games the previous two Thanksgiving days.

Fair attendance yesterday was 6133, or slightly under the Medford-Washington high crowd last year.

Two years ago Salem and Washington drew 10,329, in a Shrine benefit game. Some attribute part of this year's decline to Washington's unpopularity. Aside from the Washington high section, most of the crowd here yesterday was rooting for Spokane.

**Big Six Grid
Season at End**
LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 29. (AP)—The 1935 Big Six conference football campaign today was history, and a history to which one more tie was added to a record that already had more ties than a railroad.

Kansas and Missouri, whose gridiron rivalry has an ankle length beard, provided the tie—a scoreless one—at Lawrence yesterday in the only strictly conference encounter on the Thanksgiving program. Oklahoma routed an old flinx by defeating the Oklahoma Aggies, 24 to 0. Nebraska Big Six champions flitted with trouble but finally came through with a 26 to 20 victory over Oregon State.

**Bucknell Upsets
Warner's Temple**
TEMPLE STADIUM, Philadelphia, Nov. 29. (AP)—Bucknell college skidded to a 7 to 0 triumph over the Temple Owls Thursday before 15,000 drenched spectators.

It was a game of breaks with Temple refusing numerous chances to score due to the continuous rain. With Bucknell leading 7 to 0 in the final quarter the Owls scored a touchdown after Gursynski recovered a fumbled punt by Sitarsky. Bucknell's peppery quarterback, on the Bison's 22 yard line. PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29. (AP)—The Portland hockey team has neither won nor lost in two games this week. Sunday, the Bucks were tied by Edmonton and last night the Calgary Tigers swooped down from the Canadian plains to hold the Portlanders to a tie.

The Thanksgiving day battle almost ended in a riot in the overtime period. Portland fans, 3600 of whom witnessed the contest, proclaimed a goal when the puck swept towards the Tigers' net and was scooped away by hand. A field judge concurred but Referee Carl Jacobs ruled no score.

A season of upsets descended in full force on two high school gridiron in Oregon on Thanksgiving day.

Only three teams remained on the unbeaten, untied list today and one of these—Washington high of Portland—had a blot on its otherwise perfect 1935 record.

Colonials Lose First
Washington was toppled from the select class by the light, scrappy team from John Rogers high of Spokane, 6 to 0. The defeat, however, does not affect Washington's strength in Oregon's grid world.

Hood River's 13 to 0 surprise defeat of Milton-Freewater put a different aspect on the state picture. Milton-Freewater here before ranked with Washington high, Medford and Myrtle Point—the topnotchers of the season.

Tigers Beat Ashland
Medford remained on the highest rung by powering its way through a battling Ashland eleven 13 to 0.

Myrtle Point was idle. So far as is known, no arrangements have been made for a playoff for the mythical state title.

BLOCKED PUNT WINS
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29. (AP)—A blocked punt and a score in the first period, followed by a desperate and successful defense, gave the scrappy John Rogers high team a 6 to 0 victory over Washington high of Portland here yesterday.

The winners, Spokane city champions, garnered six points in the first period, right end, recovered a blocked kick and ran 37 yards to the one-yard line. Brown, fullback, crashed over on the first try. The conversion kick was wide.

Three times in the second half Washington marched down the field inside the Spokane 15-yard line but the visitors, outweighed 26 pounds to a man, refused to give way. The confident Washington team tossed passes all over the field the first half and much of the second.

An off-side penalty resulted in ruling out a score for Washington in the final minutes of the game when a touchdown pass was called back.

Washington made 10 first downs to Spokane's 1 and its goal was never endangered after the first-period encounter.

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BEARCATS WIN GRID PENNANT

Willamette Ends Year
With 10 to 0 Victory
Over Whitman.

The northwest conference 1935 grid season was just another page in the record book today, with Willamette's bombastic Bearcats alone at the top of the heap.

The Bearcats, with four conference victories and no defeats, topped the league for the second straight year, although last season they had to divide the circuit crown with the College of Idaho. Linfield, finishing in the runner-up spot with three wins, no losses and a tie, had an otherwise perfect conference season wrecked by a scoreless tie played with Pacific university in an early game.

Whitman Beaten 10-0
Willamette blazed its way into the championship Thursday with a decisive 10-0 victory over Whitman's Missionaries, scoring late in the second period with a place-kick and again as the third session opened with a touchdown.

Little Johnny Oravee, flashy Bearcat halfback who led the nation last year in scoring touchdowns, shook himself loose several times, but couldn't quite make the grade all the way into pay dirt. The game marked his last appearance as a college gridman after seeing action in every game the Bearcats have played in the past four years.

Oravee ripped off dashes of 27 yards, 18 yards, and 14 yards to place the oval on Whitman's 10-yard stripe. Manfred "Moose" Olson made one mighty smack at the line and crashed 10 yards for a touchdown. Weisgerber deftly place-kicked for extra point.

Stopped At Goal
He also place-kicked for Willamette's first score with a boot from the 25-yard line in the second quarter.

The powerful Bearcats made three other goal line drives, one of which Whitman desperately stepped on its one-yard line. Linfield clinched second place in the standings with a 21-6 decision over Albany's much-debated Pirates, scoring twice in the opening stanza and again in the third, and making all three conversions good. The Pirates smashed their lone counter across in the final period.

Whitman, although finishing third, bobbed up with the biggest upset of the conference season, taking on a big league opponent and coming out on top, 7-0. The victim was the University of Idaho Vandals.

The conference teams had a bit of an edge over non-conference opposition, winning 12, losing nine and tying one.

**Gonzaga Scores

SPokane, Nov. 29. (AP)—Gonzaga's Bulldogs put their football suits away in mothballs for another year today, after capping their successful 1935 season with a 20 to 0 victory over Portland university.

Gonzaga beat the Pilots at their own passing game, and hurled too much manpower at them on the ground. The Bulldogs piled up 210 yards from scrimmage and added to their advantage with repeated runbacks of punts.

Portland never was able to get near the Gonzaga goal after recovering a fumble on the 30-yard line in the first period.

The team gained only a total of 50 yards.

Gonzaga set a record of 120 yards lost on penalties.

**Linfield College
Defeats Albany**

Big Game Saturday
For Southern Methodist and Texas Christian were the only remaining untied and undefeated acceptable teams for the annual intersectional clash as a result of New York university's defeat by Fordham yesterday.

The two Texas teams meet Saturday for the southwestern conference championship. A win for either would make it highly acceptable to Rose Bowl fans.

There was still some vague talk of trying to get Notre Dame, beaten and tied, but the mass of opinion added weight to the

statement of Al Masters, Stanford's graduate manager, that he was "interested in the outcome" of the southern contest.

The Contest Possible
Masters planned to set up office here today as a preliminary move toward getting the ticket sales moving but he indicated he would have no announcement to make "pending the outcome of Saturday's games."

Apparently the only way the situation can fall to clear itself up Saturday would be for T. C. U. and S. M. U. to play a tie contest. Each has another game on the schedule. The Mustangs still must meet Texas A. and M. while the Horned Frogs travel west to play Santa Clara.

**Dons Score Win
