STATEMENT MADE ON GRIZZLE CASE

Joseph Jensen, county surveyor, made a statement this week regarding a letter from T. K. Harper, offered to clear County Judge Grizzle of a charge that he "stole" county lumber from the Sprague river bridge. Harper claimed that as contractor, the old lumber was his and he gave it to Grizzle. He said Jensen selected what lumber the county wished to keep.

Jensen cited a sentence in Harper's contract, which states that "all parts of old bridge structures, except the longitudinal runway plans and other such timber as the county may elect to use for the strengthening and repair of other bridges in the vicinity, shall be removed and disposed of by the contractor."

Jensen said there were four lines of 4x12 plank the entire length of the two old bridges, making a total of 12,304 board feet. "Other timbers" were recently placed stringers.

The surveyor said he selected about 25 per cent out of a pile of about 50 stringers, these to be salvaged and used by the county. He said he had nothing to do with any other lumber, and he had no jurisdiction over the equipment or county forces at the time.

Man Injures Arm in Auto Accident

Charles W. King sustained injuries to one arm in an automobile accident on the Weed-Klamath Falls highway, eight and one-half miles out of Klamath Falls, early November 27.
