

THANKSGIVING MISHAPS TAKE TOLL OF LIVES

Scores of Americans were killed or injured in traffic and other accidents accelerated by Thanksgiving day travel, a United Press survey showed.

Rain or snow made pavements slippery in many sections of the country, adding to the hazards of jammed highways.

Trains killed several persons in grade crossing crashes.

Huron Crash Kills Three

Four persons were instantly killed at Sibley, Iowa, and two seriously injured when a Rock Island passenger train struck their car broadside at a crossing. Less than an hour later, a man and his 12-year-old son were killed in a train crash at the Chicago & Northwestern crossing at Eagle Grove, Iowa, a few miles away. Their car skidded into a train.

At Millersville, Mo., a young couple and their three months old baby were killed when their car crashed head-on into another. Six occupants of the other car were injured.

Hit-Run Victim Found

A New York motorist changing a tire was crushed against his car by a speeding taxicab and killed. His companion was injured. The body of an aged man, believed victim of a hit and run driver, was found on a suburban highway.

STOCKTON, Calif., Nov. 29.

(UP)—One University of California co-ed was killed and three others injured in an automobile accident Thursday as the group was en route from Berkeley to a holiday house party.

Mrs. Margaret Gillhouse, 29, Los Angeles, daughter of Major and Mrs. Henry Gillhouse, Manila, P. I., died in emergency hospital three hours after the wreck occurred. She sustained a fractured skull.

Lakeview Girl Hurt

Eleanor Vollman, 22, driver, daughter of E. G. Vollman, of Stockton, secretary-treasurer of the San Joaquin county fair, forehead and nose lacerations, shock.

Frances Miller, 19, Lakeview, Ore., lacerated forehead, cheek and leg, fractured shoulder.

Jean McCrory, 18, Honolulu, internal injuries, lacerated scalp.

The accident occurred when Miss Vollman's car was hit in the rear at a residential intersection by an automobile driven by Francis Davis, 27, Stockton, according to police.

Davis was booked at jail here on charges of negligent homicide and drunken driving.

Delicious Cheese Dishes Offered in Big Contest

We are told that cheese is one of the oldest prepared foods known. It is at present a staple article of diet. Very seldom is the housewife without cheese in her refrigerator. Cheese making in America is an important industry.

Cheese is a very good substitute for meat and convenient to add variety to the meal. It is important to know that cheese is easily overcooked either by long cooking or high temperatures. Overcooked cheese is lumpy, stringy and tough.

It has been the mistaken idea of some people that cheese is difficult to digest. This idea has arisen from the fact that cheese is not easily masticated. However, it is a concentrated and economical food, worthy of frequent consideration as a dietary factor.

Our first prize recipe is one which adds variety to a common and well liked food—waffles.

CHEESE WAFFLES
Mrs. H. J. Modrell
No. 7, Esplanade Courts

4 oz. cream cheese
1 egg
1 cup milk
2 eggs
1 cup flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons melted butter
Mash cream cheese with fork, add milk slowly until well blended. Add well beaten eggs and the flour, salt and baking powder, sifted together. Add melted butter and beat well.

Cook in hot waffle iron. A favorite of many people is a cheese salad. Here we have—

Frozen Cheese

Grate 1 cup American cheese, add 1 cup cream cheese, and 1 cup mayonnaise dressing, and beat thoroughly. Fold in six maraschino cherries, chopped fine, six green mint cherries, chopped fine, and 1 pint cream beaten stiff. Freeze in refrigerator, needs no stirring. Remove to serving dish, and sprinkle with 1 cup chopped nuts, or with paprika. Serve with salad course. Very delicious.

Macaroni with Cheese in Ham Jackets

Mrs. Frank Ockerson
1755 Crescent

1 1/2 cups macaroni (broken in 4 inch pieces)
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 cups boiling water
2 tablespoons fat
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 cup Pet's milk, diluted with 1 cup water
1 cup grated cheese
1 tablespoon horseradish
8 large, thin slices boiled ham
Add macaroni and salt to boiling water. Cook until tender, then drain and rinse with cold water. Melt fat in sauce pan. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Stir in slowly, diluted milk. Cook 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Add cheese and horseradish. Cook slowly until cheese has melted. Pour about 12 pieces macaroni on each ham slice. Pour hot cheese sauce over macaroni, then roll up secure, with string or toothpicks. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F) 30 minutes or until ham has browned. Serves eight.

Cheese Balls
Mrs. Harvey Woodard
Route 2, Box 109

1 1/2 cups grated cheese
1 tablespoon flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
Cayenne
Whites 3 eggs
Cracker dust
Grate the cheese; add the flour, salt, and a dash of cayenne. Beat the whites of eggs stiff. Then gradually beat the dry ingredients into them. Take up about one

heaping teaspoonful of this mixture and with the palms of your hands roll into a ball. When all of the mixture is thus used, roll the balls in the cracker dust, which has been previously made by rolling plain soda crackers until fine. Fry the cheese balls in deep fat until a delicate brown. These are especially nice served with salads.

MURPHY AWARDED CLAIMS BY JURY

A circuit court jury Wednesday night returned a verdict for Dan Murphy after trial of the case of Joe Schuss versus Murphy.

Schuss sued for \$263.30 alleged due on a grocery bill. Murphy filed a counter-claim, asserting Schuss bought potatoes from him and refused to take delivery. He asked for \$154.21. The jury's first verdict was for \$173.60 for Murphy, more than he asked. Judge Ashurst sent the jury out again, and it returned with a verdict for \$121.70 for Murphy. J. H. Carnahan represented Murphy.
