Miss Earhart Declares Education Fails In Preparation.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., (AP)—Amelia Earhart, noted flyer and "consultant in careers for women" at Purdue University, declared today that education has failed, in many respects, to prepare young people for careers.

She asserted "we may find the ideal state when both husband and wife work and when both share equal responsibility for the home" and expressed the belief men should take courses in home economics. She asserted there should be no differentiation between college courses for men and those for women.

Prefacing her remarks with the statement that 92 per cent of the Purdue coeds plan to work after leaving school "but some of the men think it's the baloney," she outlined the following "failures" of education in career preparation:

"Education does not start soon enough to discover aptitudes or to help the individual develop what he is best able to do; it fails to bridge the gap between training and the practical aspects of employment; and it is making very little effort—certainly it is not leading the way toward remedying the present economic situation, in which neither the ability to work, the desire to do so nor the necessity for having a job will provide one."

At a conference here on "women's work and opportunities" Miss Earhart said extra curricular activities aid the student to decide what he or she wants to do. She expressed belief that colleges can not continue to admit freshmen until previous graduates are absorbed by industry and business.

Referring to a questionnaire given to all women in the university, Miss Earhart said only a few believed married women should work when they have small children, but that a large number felt mothers might work after the children have reached 16 years of age.

She reported 40 per cent of the Purdue freshmen women knew what they want to do when they enter college, and "this is a large proportion, I think, when you consider how little education does along the way to trace talents or analyze desires. However, 90 per cent of the senior class knows what it wants to do."
