

Methocists Selected as Stanford's Opponent

ROSE BOWL BID GOES TO TEXAS

Mustangs Pleased With Chance for Pasadena Honors.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Dec. 2. (AP)—Southern Methodist football conquerors of the southwest, and Stanford, choice of the Pacific coast conference, meet New Year's Day in Pasadena's Rose Bowl.

That announcement late last night by Al Masters, Stanford graduate manager, ended a week long national speculation over the Indians' opponent in the Rose Bowl game.

First on Record
Selection of Southern Methodist, undefeated and untied, marks the first time a team west of the Mississippi river has been chosen as an "eastern" representative in Rose Bowl play. Southern Methodist, noted for its colorful and effective passing attack, earned its bid Saturday by beating Texas Christian, previously undefeated, 20-14.

Although Stanford lost to the University of California at Los Angeles 7-6 in an early season game, it walloped California 13-0 after the Bears had won nine straight.

Acceptance Comes Quickly

The invitation to Southern Methodist was extended by Masters via long distance telephone. James Stewart, director of athletics at the Texas institution, conferred quickly with S. M. U. officials after Masters called him and then called back and said the Mustangs accepted "with pleasure."

The negotiations were completed within an hour. Coach "Tiny" Thornhill of Stanford grinned broadly when he was informed S. M. U. had accepted.

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 2. (AP)—Coach Madison (Matty) Bell, whose Southern Methodist eleven won the Rose Bowl bid in his first year as head coach, was happy today for the "greatest gang of kids I ever saw."

He received the news after being awakened from a sound sleep last night. "I'm mighty happy," he said sleepily. "I hope we can make good."

Then his voice began to clear up.

Star Will Return

"It's a great thing for the boys," he continued. "They're the greatest gang of kids I ever saw. The Rose Bowl has been their goal all season. They've talked about it all year. You should have seen them working out in the Rose Bowl when we were out to play U. C. L. A. They were telling the folks they'd be back on New Year's Day. They grinned when they said it, but underneath they really meant it. I'm happy for them."

Bell, whose Mustangs have won 11 straight games, said he thought Harry Shuford, crack field general, would be available for the post-season classic. Shuford has been out with a wrenched knee since the game with Southern California at Los Angeles.

UCLA's Victory Over Idaho Ties Coast Conference

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Dec. 2. (UP)—Sparked by ball-toting Charlie Cheshire, the University of California at Los Angeles climbed into their first Pacific Coast conference title Saturday with a 13-6 victory over University of Idaho's Vandals.

The Bruins, by virtue of their fourth victory in five conference starts, share the title with the Stanford Indians, whom they beat, 20-0, in California's Golden Bears, who beat them.

It was a desultory matinee of football for some 15,000 citizens who came out to watch the Bruins complete their most distinguished football season. Riding the conference heap at mid-season they faltered against California and bogged down against Southern Methodist, erasing themselves from the national picture.

After a stodgy first quarter, in which Idaho reached scoring territory only to be halted on a penalty, the Bruins started a drive late in the second period. Cheshire intercepted a pass, ran it to his 32 and lugged the ball most of the time in a 68-yard march to a score, which he made from the 11. Murphy kicked goal.

Early in the third Bill Maxon, Idaho halfback, took a pass from Lee Holmes and travelled 47 yards to the Bruins six but the push was stalled. Washington State Gains 7-to-7 Tie With Gael Eleven

KEZAR STADIUM, San Francisco, Dec. 2. (UP)—Outgained and outpowered for three hatless quarters, Washington State's Cougars staged a fighting last period comeback to tie St. Mary's 7 to 7 before a crowd of 15,000 persons here Saturday.

St. Mary's grabbed an early advantage with a second quarter touchdown and conversion, then over-powered the Cougars for another quarter only to fall before the fleet feet and deadly passing arm of Ed Goddard, ace Cougar quarterback.

Goddard smashed over in the final period from the 2-yard line.

Mat Tatman, sophomore reserve, added the extra and tying point from placement.

The tie not only gave the over-powered Cougars a "moral victory" in their last start of the 1935 season, but also avenged a 9 to 6 defeat at the hands of the Gaels last year.

The game started listlessly. With the exception of a few moments after the opening kickoff, the Gaels retained the upper hand throughout the first quarter.

The Moragans made their first scoring threat when Flea tossed a long pass to Erdelatz, who was halted on the W.S.C. 9-yard line. Then, after a mediocre performance, the Washington State line came to life. For four downs they held the east bay team to four scant yards and Goddard came to the rescue, booting to midfield.

Goddard, a little later, gave the first exhibition of the elusive running form which made him a virtually unanimous all-coast selection, slicing outside tackle and around end for 17 and 13 yard gains.

Washington State staged a smashing comeback in the fourth period. Goddard and McCormack teamed to advance 20 yards. Goddard passed to Bates for 16 more, then cracked across for the score in three plays. Tatman rushed into the game and converted for the tie.

St. Mary's piled up 225 yards to 166 for the Cougars while W.S.C. made 8 first downs to 7 for St. Mary's.

Slip Madigan, Moraga coach, said Goddard "is the best back-field man on the coast."

Webfoots Beaten in Practice Tilt

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 2. (AP)—Coach Gene Eberhart of Southern Oregon Normal led the Riggs All-Star team of Eugene to a 47 to 46 upset win over University of Oregon's basketball team Saturday night.

Eberhart scored 18 points. Willie Jones, shifted to forward, scored 17 points for the Webfoots in their first game under Coach Howard Hobson. Dave Silver, left-handed sophomore at Jones' old center post, scored 11 points.

THREE SCHOOLS TOP GRID LIST

Minnesota, Princeton and S. M. U. Selected As Best in Country.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2. (AP)—In any order you like, put Minnesota, Southern Methodist and Princeton at the top of the national football standings today, congratulate S. M. U. on its selection for Rose Bowl against Stanford, hall Army for its spectacular return to service supremacy, and then reflect on the virtual wind-up of the greatest season the game ever has enjoyed.

Bobby Wilson Great Star
Although not strictly upsets, the smashing victories Saturday of Southern Methodist, Princeton and Army were entirely in character with a season notable principally for its disregard for form.

Not within the memory of the oldest inhabitant has there been such a terrific mortality rate among sectional champions.

Credit for the most important accomplishment last week must go to Southern Methodist's Mustangs, who knocked Texas Christian from the unbeaten and untied list, preserved their own perfect record, virtually clinched the southwest title and earned a bid for the Rose Bowl game at Pasadena on New Year's Day.

Led by their little running back, Bobby Wilson, the Mustangs, 7-5 short ends in the betting, piled up a 14 point lead in the first half and wound up victory, 20-14.

Tulane Badly Beaten
Princeton climaxed its second undefeated and untied season in three years by overwhelming Yale 38-7.

Army piled up four touchdowns in little more than a period and then held off Navy throughout the second half of the annual service duel before 81,000 at Philadelphia to win 28-6.

Elsewhere Saturday's program was marked by form reversals. Louisiana State, as expected, crushed Tulane 41-0 to gain clear claim to the southern championship, but Georgia fell before Georgia Tech 19-7 and Mississippi State, conqueror of Alabama and Army, dropped a 14-6 decision to Mississippi. Auburn easily stopped Florida 27-6.

Oregon Meets Gaels
In the east Holy Cross, unbeaten but tied by Manhattan, won from Boston college 19-6. Dartmouth fell victim to Columbia and Al Barabas 13-7. Western Maryland spotted Georgetown ten points and then won 14-10.

Baylor conquered Rice, 8-0. Heavily favored St. Mary's gained only a 7-7 draw with Washington State, while U. C. L. A. clinched a tie with Stanford and California for first place in the Pacific coast conference by whipping Idaho 13-6.

This week's slender schedule includes S. M. U.'s important tussle with Texas A. & M., a Pacific coast conference contest between Southern California and Washington, and clashes between St. Mary's and Oregon, South Carolina and Florida, and Texas Christian and Santa Clara.
