AT THIS PORCH PARTY, Mrs. McIntosh served GINGER TEA CAKES (1 egg)

1 1/2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
1/2 teaspoon Calumet Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves

1/2 cup butter or other shortening
4 tablespoons brown sugar
1 egg, well beaten
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup boiling water

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, salt, and spices, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream well. Add flour, alternately with molasses, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add boiling water, mixing quickly to blend. Turn into small greased cup-cake pans, filling them 3/4 full, and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 20 minutes. Butter frosting. Make 2 dozen tea cakes. (All measurements are level.)
