CALIFORNIANS ON SCHEDULE

Friday, Saturday Games Planned with McCloud and Mt. Shasta

The Klamath high school basketball team will enter its first intercollegiate contests of the season in northern California next weekend.

The team is definitely scheduled to meet McCloud Saturday night, Dwight French, head coach, is awaiting confirmation of the Mt. Shasta contest for Friday night.

Practice since Thanksgiving has already given the coach a line-up on his squad for the defense of the district championship. The team is almost entirely composed of inexperienced men. The whole first string of last year's state tournament contenders has been graduated.

Players making the trip next weekend probably will include: Forwards—Sanders, Durbin and Giovanni. Guards—Reginato, Atkins and Putman. Centers—Musselman and one still to be selected.

Player Detained by Authorities

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7. (AP)—John Geoffrey Heath, 20, Seattle baseball player, waited for word from Washington today to learn whether he would be permitted to set foot on American soil or would have to remain aboard the steamship Taiyo Maru when it sails for Los Angeles.

Heath, member of the American amateur baseball team that toured Japan this fall, was detained aboard ship by immigration authorities when the squad landed yesterday. His parents, British subjects, are residents of Seattle but officials found his papers "unsatisfactory."

Heath batted .452 in the eight games the Americans played with Japanese college teams. The Americans won five games.

Canadian Woman Still Yawning as 3rd Month Ends

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 7. (UP)—Mrs. Percy E. Wakelin, 40, weary-eyed and wasted in flesh, on Friday night yawned through the end of the third month of a curious disorder that praver, medical science and numerous home remedies have failed to relieve.

Mrs. Wakelin has yawned repeatedly, at first as rapidly as 30 times a minute, but now about five times a minute, since the night of September 8.

She is unable to sleep, except under sedatives, to eat anything but soft foods. She weighed 142 pounds when the attack started, now only 115. Her face and jaw muscles ache from repeated, involuntary stretching. Her throat, she said, "feels like fire," because her mouth opened so often the natural moisture evaporated.

The attack of yawning started about midnight, September 8. Wakelin, a taxi driver, came home for a late supper. He made some joking remark, now forgotten. His wife laughed, then yawned. She has continued since.

SPEARS CENTER OF SQUABBLING

Wisconsin Coach, Meanwell Involved In Controversy

CHICAGO, Dec. 7. (UP)—The long standing feud between Dr. Walter E. Meanwell, Wisconsin athletic director, and Dr. Clarence W. Spears, Wisconsin football coach, neared a showdown today as the university board of regents prepared to investigate the controversy.

The first was brought into the open when John Golemske, captain-elect of the 1936 team, reportedly acting upon a suggestion of Dr. Meanwell, circulated a petition among fellow players demanding Spears' resignation.

Later Golemske destroyed the petition, saying he had been misled by the athletic director.

Meanwell bristled with indignation today when asked to comment on his part in the matter. He was in Chicago attending the annual meeting of Big Ten coaches and athletic directors.

"It's too absurd to need denial," he said. "I reserve further comment for university authorities."

Then, as an afterthought, he said: "I shall welcome an investigation. In fact I shall insist on one."

Spears, former coach at the University of Oregon, said he first heard of the petition through hearsay. He also is attending the Big Ten meeting here.

Boys Ask Fair Deal "Golemske called me long distance and said he was extremely sorry about the whole incident and told me he was for me 100 per cent," Spears declared.

"I thanked him for calling and told him I appreciated his attitude."

At Madison, Golemske led a delegation of five teammates to the office of Harold M. Wilkie, secretary of the University Regents' Athletic committee, to demand an investigation.

"The boys told me they are for Doc Spears 100 per cent, that they want to see him get a fair deal and that they want the matter looked into so that he will have a chance to coach the football team next year without outside interference," Wilkie said.

Meeting Set Dec. 10 "The regents will discuss the situation at our next regular meeting December 10."

So acute has the situation become that it was predicted either Meanwell or Spears will be asked to resign before another football season rolls around.

Sentiment in Madison favors Spears despite the fact that his team won only one of its eight games this fall.

Spears was promised the athletic directorship at Wisconsin when he went there to coach four years ago. For three years, however, athletic and faculty heads at the school quibbled over who should get the job. It was awarded finally to Meanwell.

Although both Spears and Meanwell attended meetings in the same hotel they made no effort to communicate with each other.

Contest Winner Donates Prize Marjorie Kincaid was formally presented with a \$10 prize at the armory last night as winner of the ticket sale contest in connection with the Pelican Charity ball. Mrs. Kincaid donated the prize money to the Pelican cause.

Hollis, deeply hated by the armory crowds, is scheduled to meet the Californian Tuesday night in the main event. Despite Peck's confidence, Hollis still rates the edge.

For two weeks Hollis has held forth at the armory as one of the most thorough ruffians to visit Klamath Falls. In his opening match Hollis was prevented from administering further punishment to Les Wolfe of Texas when Referee Rhy Frisbie halted the match on a foul.

Last Tuesday Hollis thumped Pete Belcastro, the junior heavyweight champion of the coast, into submission.

Peck has wrestled here on three successive cards. He has shown great ability as a grappler and now it is expected the tactics learned as a pugilist will be recalled in his meeting with Hollis.

Long rivals in matches at the old Legion hall, Pete Belcastro and Les Wolfe will clash in the semi-windup. It will be a test between the figure-four scissors of the Texan and the drop kicks of the champion. The match will be wrestled on the round system.

Bryant Williams, chamber representative, said the game would be played here on Thursday, Dec. 26.

The Oregon varsity will be on a barnstorming trip through southern Oregon into California.

Grid Squabble Between UCLA, Troy Ironed Out

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7. (AP)—University of California at Los Angeles and Southern California will renew grid relations next fall.

Willis O. Hunter, athletic director of Southern California, said the game probably would be played Thanksgiving day.

U. C. L. A. athletic officials promptly confirmed differences between the cross-town institutions had been ironed out.

The official announcement came as no surprise, since responsible sources revealed November 19 that the intra-city contest, abruptly ended after the 1929 struggle, would be renewed either in 1936 or 1937.

U. C. L. A. athletic authorities yesterday announced they were keeping a date open for Southern Methodist at Dallas in 1936, and that either Washington or Washington State, or both, also would be played.

Besides these games, the Bruins have agreements with Stanford and California, and they probably will play one of the two Oregon members of the conference.

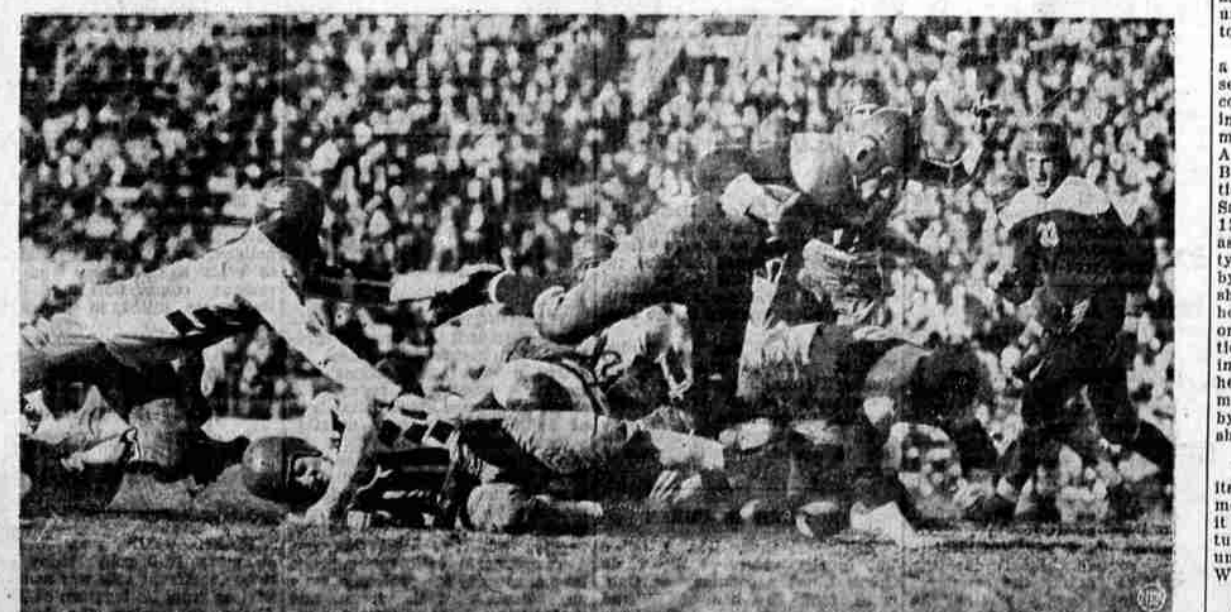
