

PLAY OFFERED AT UNITED SERVICES

The churches of the city are uniting in the observance of Universal Bible Sunday in a mass meeting to be held in the auditorium of the Klamath Union High school at 7:45 Sunday evening. In this connection it should be generally known, that while six of the participating churches of the city are presenting each an episode in the pageant-drama, "The Power of the Word," the Youth Council of the city, representing an even wider constituency, with Harold Van Duker president, is presenting a two-act play by Elliott Field, entitled "Fine Gold."

Bible Anniversary Observed Sunday

The First Baptist church, corner Eighth and Washington streets, announces a special service Sunday evening at 7:30, in commemoration of the four hundredth anniversary of the printed English Bible. The regular evening service will be dedicated to that event, and the pastor will speak on the subject, "The Unbound Word," in which he will discuss the power and influence of the Word of God.
