Universal Bible Sunday

FOUR centuries ago—almost a hundred years after the process of movable type was invented by Johannes Gutenberg of Mainz—the first English Bible was slowly, laboriously given to the Christian world from the hand printing press of Miles Coverdale. That event was epochal and this week we observe it reverently with Universal Bible Sunday.

Today, although many of us turn less consciously to the Bible as a source of knowledge, the great piling-up of influence goes on unshaken even as the modern presses of our times roar out millions of other works. Yet although we may read these other books more readily, the English Bible, today as it was 400 years ago, still is printed in greater numbers than any other volume. From that we know, for it is not necessary merely to assume, that the Bible is read—yesterday, today and tomorrow—in every corner of the earth where other books have been forgotten.

Here are some interesting figures compiled by Dr. Smith of the First Presbyterian church:

"Since 1875 of the 65 best sellers over 500,000 there are the following: 'In His Steps,' Charles M. Sheldon, published in 1899, the sale has been 8,000,000; 'Freckles,' Gene Stratton Porter, 2,000,000; 'Ben-Hur,' Lew Wallace, 1880, 1,950,000; 'Girl of the Limberlost,' Porter, 1,700,000; 'The Harvester,' Porter, 1,600,000; 'Tom Sawyer,' Mark Twain, 1,500,000; 'The Winning of Barbara Worth,' Harold Bell Wright, 1,500,000; 'Laddie,' Porter, 1,500,000; 'The Virginian,' Owen Wister, 1,454,000; 'The Call of the Wild,' Jack London, 1,412,000; 'David Harum,' Edward Noyes Westcott, 1,200,000; 'The Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come,' Fox, 1,225,000; 'Five Little Peppers and How They Grew,' Margaret Sidney, 1,090,000; 'Huckleberry Finn,' Twain, 1,000,000; 'Pollyanna,' Eleanor Steward, 1,000,000; 'Black Beauty,' Anna Sewall, 1,000,000; 'Treasure Island,' Robert Louis Stevenson, 1,000,000; 'Tribes,' George du Maurier, 1,000,000.

"All the best sellers in the million and near the two million class antedate the Armistice, and only three works of fiction since 1919, have reached the 600,000 class.

"But the American Bible Society alone in 1934, distributed 10,822,459 volumes. The British and Foreign Bible Society an equal number, making over 20,000,000 by two publishing houses, let alone the millions issued by other great publishing houses.

"It is not generally known that the printing of the Bible was authorized by act of congress, yet such is the case. The Bible was issued in 1782, September 12th, with the official recommendation of the Congress of the United States. In the library of a prominent Philadelphia business man, Mr. T. Edward Ross of Ardmore, Pa., is a valuable old copy of this special edition of the Bible. The exact text of the title page reads:

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

The Inside Story From
 The Capital

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The fancy way the new dealers have been skating around on one foot across this embargo ice would indicate there is something wrong with the ice. There is.

Official legal advisers of the government will confess quite frankly under their unofficial breaths that an embargo against oil, copper, steel, etc., would be illegal. Messrs. Ickes and Welles have almost admitted as much publicly.

But the unspoken truth about it seems to be that the new dealers are counting on the support of public opinion to cut more weight than legal ice. In other words, they are reading the favorable editorial comment about their efforts to discourage trade with belligerents, rather than following the advice of their lawyers. Therefore, oil men and others had better not count too much on the letter of the law.

The fancy skaters here may let their lawyers find an excuse for their acts later.

SIDE-STEPPING

That is not as difficult as it sounds. For instance, the north-west mounted statesman, Secretary Hull, has already managed to get around and forget a certain treaty signed by the United States and Italy Feb. 26, 1871, and still in legal effect.

After all Mr. Hull has said about the sanctity of treaties, it appears not to have been even disconcerting for him, when his lawyers pointed out pertinent article six. It says:

"No prohibition shall be imposed on the importation or exportation of any article, the produce or manufacture of the United States or Italy to or from the territories of the United States or to or from the territories of Italy, which shall not equally extend to all other nations."

In intelligible but diplomatic language, that means the U. S. and Italy agreed not to adopt prohibitions against their trade or commerce unless extended to every one.

CONSCIENCE-EASING

Few non-partisan lawyers will doubt that the treaty is still technically in effect. It carries a specific provision that it shall remain in effect until one year after one country specifically disavows it. Neither Italy nor the U. S. has.

Mr. Hull has been able to get a conscience-easing opinion from his lawyers to the effect that Italy violated the spirit of the treaty by imposing tariff quotas a few years back. This is probably true, but if the U. S. considered the quotas a violation, it should have served notice against Italy and given the one-year notice of cancellation.

Legislators, now writing the new neutrality legislation, have been looking for a better legal excuse than that one. They have to find one to make any neutrality legislation really effective.

TALK

The new dealers seemed to be more steamed up about the rectitude of their position on the embargo issue than on any other lately. A few days ago, an authority near the top flatly said the president and Mr. Hull were agreed that they were not going to let American trade interfere with the effectiveness of any League of Nations oil action against Italy. Voluntary appeals will be made first, indirect pressure next, but, if everything fails, the president (he said) would slap oil into the embargo list as a war material, law or no law. This may be inspired talk for effect, but it is by no means impossible.
