Leisure time activities that give added zest to life will be the theme of the "Hobby Show" which the Riverside P. T. A. is presenting for the enjoyment of all members of the community who are interested. The event is scheduled for Wednesday, Dec. 11, at 8 p. m., at the Riverside school auditorium.

The results of happy hours spent on favorite occupations will be displayed and a program presented in which many well-known townspeople will give first-hand information about their "pet" diversions in brief talks. Feature of the evening will be Dr. C. V. Hugh's showing of moving pictures taken on his recent trip to Mexico City and his exhibit of numerous articles of native Mexican handwork.

Indian Work Displayed
Among the hobbies to be presented will be a variety that should leave everyone who attends the event popping with ideas for the development of an absorbing leisure time activity of his own.

Booths constructed for the purpose will enable the displays to

be shown as effectively as possible. One of these will feature hobbies based on the collection of Indian artifacts and the study of Indian lore. To this exhibit, Mrs. S. J. Coull will contribute many beautiful articles of beadwork. Mrs. Bert Thomas, a number of fine pieces of stone work; Mrs. Don Fisher, a striking array of baskets from many tribes, and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Payne a mounted display of arrowheads, as well as bonework and beads.

Rare Specimens Gathered
One of the outstanding displays will be that of Kenneth McLeod representing a longstanding interest in collecting and mounting butterflies and insect life. Hundreds of specimens of rare beauty will be seen, most of them native to the Klamath country.

Amateur photography claims the interest of many people, and its possibilities as an absorbing hobby will be shown by the excellent work of Howard Ashley, principal of Fort Klamath school. Also of unusual interest will be the presentation by Rev. Hale Eubanks of the pounded metal craft. Many articles he has made

will be shown, and he has promised to give a demonstration of the evolution of a flat piece of pewter into a useful and decorative article.

Other hobbies to be featured will be stamp collecting by Bert Thomas; needlework by Mrs. Violet House; homemade toys by Mrs. H. P. Bosworth; music by Mrs. Don Zumwalt; gardening by Mrs. E. D. Lamb who will particularly emphasize winter dish gardening; woodworking by Dr. E. D. Lamb; art by Mrs. Cone, Mrs. Ada Morris, Mrs. Ray C. Johnson and Mrs. Hale Eubanks; a colonial collection by Mrs. Bert Thomas and sports such as skiing, archery and sailing.

Coffee and sandwiches will be served at the close of the evening, according to Mrs. H. P. Bosworth, who has been in charge of planning the program.
