

CLUB TO AFFILIATE WITH FEDERATION

MERRILL, Dec. 7.—At a lively meeting of the Merrill Library club Thursday afternoon, members voted to become affiliated with the southern Oregon district federation of Women's clubs and discussed the advisability of establishing the local city library as a branch of the county library system in order to increase the amount of reading material for patrons of the district. The latter decision was held over until a later meeting.

A number of advantages of federation with the district organization were advanced. A wider scope of activities of interest to women will be made available. Programs for study groups are furnished by the federation, bringing subjects of national interest to members here as well as providing a course in art craft classes, according to Mrs. Rusek, Bonanza, president of the district federation who spoke before members of the Merrill club at a recent meeting.

Affiliation with the county library system will bring an increased number of good books to the shelves of the Merrill library, and the reading fee charged patrons in the past will be discontinued if the change in policy becomes effective. Books formerly purchased by the club and those to be added in the future from club funds will be placed on a pay shelf. Decision on this question was held in abeyance until a later meeting when it is planned to have Mary McComb, county librarian, present for further discussion of the plans.

WOMAN ARRAIGNED ON THEFT CHARGES

Emma Victoria Dent of Plush, Ore., was arraigned before Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay of Lakeview early this week on charges of sheep stealing, according to reports received by the state police of Klamath Falls.

Couple Sustain Serious Injury In Road Mishap

CHILQUIN, Dec. 7.—Faith Zeller and Eugene Campbell, both of Bend, were recovering Friday from serious injuries sustained Thursday evening when their car crashed into the rear of an automobile owned by William Moore, about 74, Chilquin Indian, parked without lights on the traveled portion of The Dalles-California highway a half mile south of Williamson River.

Faith Zeller sustained a fractured kneecap, a possible fractured right leg and severe cuts and bruises. Campbell, whose head was driven through the windshield of the car in the crash, was badly cut and bruised. The front of the Zeller car was crushed in, and the Moore vehicle, unoccupied at the time of the collision, knocked off the road.

The injured couple was taken to Chilquin for first aid by Robert Diehl, who drove up shortly after the accident, and today the two returned to Bend.

Moore was fined \$100 and sentenced to 30 days in jail by Justice Earl Bradford on a charge of parking on the highway without displaying lights. Fine and sentence were suspended on condition Moore pay costs of repair on the Zeller car and agree not to operate an automobile for a period of two years.

Work Halted on New High School

MERRILL, Dec. 7.—Work on the new high school building is being held in abeyance temporarily until a decision as to location of the building is definitely decided upon. One-half day's preliminary work started this week, but due to frozen ground progressed slowly.

Original plans called for placing the building a distance of 45 feet from The Dalles-California highway, but the advisability of a deep frontage for lawn and shrubbery effects has been taken under consideration.

Work is expected to be resumed at an early date.

FARM CONFERENCE GAINS INTEREST

"I want to know where we farmers are heading for, and so I intend to get all I can from this county farm outlook conference."

This sentiment, frequently expressed in much more vigorous and picturesque language, is exactly what farm leaders all over the state are saying in connection with the local preparation being made for 23 county conferences scheduled in Oregon. The dates of the farm outlook conference in this county are February 25-26.

Most counties not having their own separate conference will be represented in similar studies of the grain industry carried on in connection with the annual meeting of the Eastern Oregon Wheat league, December 6 and 7.

With the background of former economic studies and county conferences of 19 years ago to build upon, Oregon has an opportunity to gain more benefit from the coming series than most other states. It is pointed out by extension leaders at Oregon State college. Recent agricultural census returns and other available data

will give opportunity to compare accurately the trend in agricultural development in each county in the past 10 years and to forecast possible future trends under varying conditions.

These county conferences will be localized in fact as well as in name, and hence much depends upon the advance work carried on by the various commodity committees already appointed and at work in each county. Extension specialists who have visited all parts of the state in helping organize these committees report a greater interest than has ever before shown in such outlook work.

Reports from many counties show the grower members of the counties are entering into the spirit of the task with real enthusiasm and by the time the date of the conference arrives these committees will be prepared to build with real understanding the full report for the county as a whole.

ARMY VACANCIES EXPECTED SOON

Since the first of last October, the staff of the local Army Recruiting Service, whose head-

quarters are in the city hall in downtown Medford, has enjoyed a well-earned period of relaxation after their strenuous recruiting campaign of summer and early fall.

Commenting on these campaigns, Major H. D. Hagnell, the district recruiting officer, offers the information that the present holiday period is a direct result of the overwhelming response from Oregon lads received during the period of these recruiting drives and which necessitated a temporary cessation of recruiting activities in order to remain within the limits of the authorized enlistment quotas.

However, with the winter season well advanced and the prospects of many excellent army vacancies looming in the near future, plans are now being made to officially open winter recruiting season on the first of the new calendar year. Tentative plans now in preparation provide for an augmented staff of permanent recruiting personnel and the probable opening of one more sub-office in a city in Oregon to be determined upon at a later date.

This new sub-office will be in addition to the four now in operation in the cities of Salem, Eugene, Medford and Pendleton, the main office being in Portland. This will, with the proposed new station, give the re-

cruiting district complete statewide coverage.

Applications for enlistment in the army are now being accepted at all offices and interested applicants should contact their nearest army recruiting office without delay. Vacancies will be available in most of the units stationed at Vancouver Barracks, Wash., just across the river from Portland, and at Fort Stevens, Oregon, two of the finest military posts in the Pacific northwest.

Present available vacancies include the infantry and medical department in Tientsin, China. These vacancies are limited to single, former service men of excellent character, not under 21 or over 35 years of age, who were last discharged with excellent character and have resided in the United States, at least, two years since their last service in China, and who are native born citizens of the United States. Only men who have had service in a combat army will be enlisted for infantry, China.
