

Conference Schedule Drastically Revised

New Deal for Coast Football

New Schedule Best Thing Conference Has Done In Years. "Big Four" Gives "Way In Favor of "Big Eight."

The "big four" of the Pacific Coast conference vanished at San Francisco Monday with the release of the football schedule for next season. The conference has now consolidated its ranks, leaving only weak Montana and Idaho on the outside.

California, Stanford, University of Southern California and Washington once prepared their schedules to suit only themselves, leaving the remaining six members fight for favorable games at favorable times. Since every big team plays every big opponent, the conference appears on the most advantageous basis in its history.

With the eight major schools regarding each other with equal rights and privileges under the conference organization, there probably will be no more talk of a divorce between the north and the south. Athletic rivalry dropped years ago has been resumed, and now the championship-winning club will be a true representative of the Pacific coast.

Oregon will play Washington State for the first time since Captain McEwan's team invaded Pullman in 1926. Stanford is back on the Webfoot schedule for the first time since 1929. After a lapse of one year, Oregon has gotten together with U. S. C.

From all indications Oregon will drop its meeting with St. Mary's in favor of further conference competition.

The same picture goes for Oregon State. The Beavers again are on Stanford's schedule. For the first time in recent conference history, they tackle the Golden Bears of California. Washington, too, will be an Oregon State foe next season.

Each of the two Oregon schools will play an eight-game conference schedule.

With this admirable move on the part of graduate managers and coaches, the conference becomes stronger than it has ever been. It rivals the Big Ten for continuous Saturdays of major competition.

With such schedules, there will be no opportunity for "bushers."

All in all, it looks like the Pacific coast teams are going to have to play football to survive equally difficult schedules.

All Major Teams Gain Big League Football Games

Eight Teams Schedule 7 Conference Contests for Next Year.

IDAHO, MONTANA LEFT ON OUTSIDE

Oregon, Oregon State Resume Relations With Old Foes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10 (AP)—The Pacific Coast conference has secured itself of "big league" football in 1936 as the result of the most sweeping changes in the 20-year history of the organization.

Old time gridiron fixtures were scrapped, in some cases, and former pigskin alliances were renewed in other instances in the drastic reorganization yesterday that saw two universities—Montana and Idaho—reduced virtually to the status of associate members.

Graduate managers and faculty athletic representatives in the opening session of the annual meeting adopted a 1936 schedule in which eight members will each play seven conference games.

The eight who will play representative schedules are California, Stanford, Washington, Southern California, University of California at Los Angeles, Oregon, Oregon State college and Washington State college.

Montana and Idaho will be limited to four conference games, including their own contest. Each has played five or more conference games heretofore. The new setup automatically prohibits either team from winning the conference title or becoming a Rose Bowl contender.

The big shakeup resulted in California dropping Santa Clara, a team it has played since 1922 from the schedule.

Stanford will not renew relations with University of San Francisco after three games and Washington will not re-schedule Santa Clara, a contest played for the first time this year.

Beavers Meet Bears

After two annual meetings, Washington State probably will not take on St. Mary's again. Coach Orin Hollingsworth, W. S. C., said he did not see how the game could be arranged as his team will play nine conference games next year, the largest number for any eleven. St. Mary's may not be played on the U. C. L. A. program after several engagements.

Oregon State secured a place on University of California's schedule for 1936, and brings the Golden Bears to Portland. The Beavers also bring Stanford and University of Nebraska to Portland, and play University of Washington at Seattle.

Oregon braves Los Angeles again for an early season game with University of Southern California. Oregon's Portland games will be Idaho, Washington and U. C. L. A. The Webfoots will play Stanford at Palo Alto.

Troy Takes on Bruins

The new schedules will result in such revived gridiron clashes as U. S. C.-U. C. L. A., who will meet November 26, and Washington State playing both Stanford and California on October 3 and October 31, respectively.

The graduate managers and coaches expressed the opinion the new arrangements will make the Pacific Coast conference the strongest one in the country, in the matter of intra-conference competition. Howard Jones, U. S. C. coach, was one mentor expressing that opinion.

The Big Ten conference members are obligated to play only four league games.

Rule Changes Asked

Kirk Bagley, University of Montana graduate manager, expressed satisfaction with the conference's

radical changes, although his school is one of the two hit by the new regulations.

Willis Hunter of U. S. C., coast member of the national rules committee, and Herb Dana, coast football commissioner and one of the officials' advisory committee to the national body, were given several recommendations by the coaches to submit for action by the rules body.

The coaches recorded themselves as favoring a revision of the blocked kick rule to permit either team to pick up the ball and run with it. Present football law gives this privilege only to the blocking team.

They also endorsed the idea of giving the team behind in the score the choice of kicking off or receiving, instead of, as present, making that matter optional for the side scored on. In case of a tie, the team scored on would have the choice.

Slow Whistles Unwanted

"Slow whistles" drew opposition from the coaches, who favor quicker decisions. Officials now are allowed to use their own discretion.

Today's sessions were devoted to the completion of minor sports schedules and the election of officers.

Methodists Get First Place In Dickinson List

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Dec. 10 (UP)—Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Tex., Monday was awarded the mythical national football championship by Professor Frank Dickinson, author of the Dickinson rating system.

The Mustangs, first southern team to win the Dickinson ranking, scored 28.01 points to rank above Minnesota, last year's champs given 27.35 points.

Princeton ranked third with 26 points; Louisiana State University, fourth, 24.03; Stanford and California tied for fifth place with 23.11 points each.

Ohio State ranked seventh with 22.21; Texas Christian, eighth, 22.01; Notre Dame, ninth, 21.66; U. C. L. A., 10th, 21.25; Fordham taking last place with 20.89.

Callison Denies Kitzmiller Will Quit Grid Post

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10 (AP)—Pink Callison, University of Oregon football coach, said today there was nothing to the rumor that Johnny Kitzmiller intends to resign as Oregon's backfield coach, making way for a newcomer from professional football ranks.

PECK TACKLES ROUGH HOLLIS

San Franciscan Expected to Give "Meanie" Tough Time.

Frankie Peck of San Francisco, wrestling curtain raiser and semi-windups here for the last three weeks, steps up to the main event at the armory tonight when he tackles Ken Hollis of Arkansas.

With both grapplers bent upon victory the match takes on the aspect of "the survival of the fittest." Hollis, rough to the extreme degree, stands out as a favorite, although the good wishes of the crowd will be with the popular Californian.

Last week Hollis pummeled and gouged his way to victory over Pete Belcastro, the junior heavyweight champion of the Pacific coast. The week before that he out-slugged Les Wolfe of Texas but Wolfe won the match on a foul.

Peck, an ex-prize fighter, is expected to give the Little Rock grappler plenty of trouble. He has scored clean-cut victories over Jerry Marcus of New York, Toots Estes of Honolulu and then lost a close one to Wolfe.

The two opening matches, both to be wrestled under the Australian round system, stand out as rivals to the main event. Wolfe and Belcastro, young and aggressive, clash in the semi-windup. They have been old foes here in the past and there is no indication that their rivalry has diminished.

The opening bout will see a return clash between Rex Mobley of Alabama and Toots Estes. Mobley won last week after a long, hard struggle.

MACK BARTERS STAR PLAYERS

Foxs Believed Among List Traded to Boston Red Sox Club.

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—The Boston Red Sox today announced the purchase of Jimmy Foxs, home run slugger, and Pitcher Johnny Marcum from the Athletics for cash, and Pitcher Gordon Rhodes and Catcher George Savina, who was with Syracuse last year.

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—Unless every expert is wrong, Connie Mack already has salted \$300,000 away in the bank and picked up three or four new players from the Boston Red Sox in exchange for a quartet of his stars—Jimmy Foxs, Eric McNair, Roger Cramer, and Johnny Marcum.

Adams Takes Club

And, unless Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis and the national league club owners changed their minds overnight, Charles Francis Adams, New England sportsman, will take the Boston Braves back from the league, pour a lot of money into the club and give Bob Quinn, present general manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, the job of guiding it back to the land of plenty.

Mack, it was unanimously agreed by baseball writers and rival major league baseball owners and managers, will announce the deal whereby Foxs, McNair, Cramer and Marcum have been sold to the Red Sox for \$300,000 and four players—Pitcher John Welch or Pitcher Gordon Rhodes, Outfielder Carl Reynolds and Outfielder Mel Almada.

Part of the deal was expected to be officially revealed today at the formal opening of the annual major league winter meetings with the rest to follow around the first of the year. Why the probable split-up announcement, no one knew. The general guess was that Mack didn't care to hand the other American league pennant contenders too much of a shock.

After three weeks of sparring, the New York Giants announced Pitchers Roy Parmelee and Allyn Stout, Outfielder Phil Weintraub and Second Baseman Al Cuccinello had been traded to the St. Louis Cardinals for Second Baseman Burgess Whitehead, a fine fielder but a .255 hitter last season.

The Al Simmons to Detroit deal was still very much alive but who the White Sox were going to get was the subject of debate. Cochran insists he will not include Outfielder Gerald Walker.

Portland Gives Boost To Star Bearcat Player

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10 (AP)—The University of Portland football squad adopted a resolution urging that Johnny Oravec, star halfback of Willamette University, be included in the squad to represent the west in the annual East-West Shrine game at San Francisco.

The pilots did not play Willamette this year, but many of the Portlanders faced Oravec last year and saw him in action this season. The pilots were unanimous in their opinion that the stocky and versatile little speed-

ball would help the western eleven.

It was his fourth-quarter touchdown, following his long pass to McAdams, which gave the Beacats a win over Portland last year.

The consensus was that Oravec deserves recognition in the same group with Mikulak of Oregon, Justice and Karamatic of Gonzaga, Franklin of Oregon State, Nichellu of St. Mary's, Falaachi of Santa Clara and other great backs the pilots have faced in the past three seasons.
