

ANGLO-FRENCH MOVE BRINGS WIDE DISCORD

uel Hoare, foreign secretary, had reached an agreement with Premier Laval of France.

In the house of commons, Prime Minister Baldwin was subjected to a fire of questions from the opposition. He told the legislators he was "not at all sure that finally has yet been reached" and that therefore he thought it might be harmful for the house to discuss the matter.

Still there was no authentic description of the terms of the peace plan, although it was generally considered likely that Italy would be offered a portion of Ethiopia while Ethiopia would be given a seaport.

Hand Fighting Occurs

Meantime, at the war front, hard bayonet fighting was reported to Rome by Italy's northern forces. War correspondents advised their publications in the Italian capital that both Marshal Pietro Badoglio and Gen. Rudolfo Graziani, commanders of the northern and southern fronts, respectively, were fighting more serious fighting soon.

The Ethiopian government announced that Seyoum's armies on the northern front won two engagements last week, scattering Italian encampments at Kallabale December 2 and at Menager the next day. The Italians, said the Addis Ababa government, left nine dead and many rifles.

The announcement added, "fifty soldiers from the personal bodyguard of the traitor Haile Selassie Gugsa joined the Ethiopian side Dec. 8." Gugsa is the governor of Tigre province who went over to the Blackshirts weeks ago incident to the original Italian advance.

Naval Conference On

From Rome came word that Premier Mussolini persisted in his efforts to take by warfare what other powers were debating whether to concede him by peace negotiations—a strip of Ethiopia. Informed Italian sources said Gen. Graziani had been encouraged by promotion from the rank of corps commander to "army commander."

At London the naval conference struggled through its multitude of problems for the regulation of additions and subtractions from the navies of world powers, punctuated by reports that Japan and France will oppose abolition of the submarine. France has its eye on Italian naval construction as it dickers with other powers in London.

On the other hand, Italians at the conference pledged themselves to give serious consideration to the American proposal that fleet reductions by 20 per cent be adopted as the first move toward amity among nations.

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and pressed hopes for quick apprehension of the slayer.

Liggett, his arms full of groceries and with a pistol in his pocket, fell dying as his daughter cried, "Don't die, Daddy, don't die."

At police headquarters Mrs. Liggett sobbed, "I will remember the killer's face as long as I live."

The police held Isadore Blumenfeld, alias Kid Cann, for questioning in the case after he submitted voluntarily for examination. He was exonerated a year ago after an investigation of the passing of ransom money from the \$200,000 Charles F. Ulrich kidnapping case.

Previous Attack Recalled

Blumenfeld, identified by police as connected with the liquor business here, said he was in a barber shop shortly before the killing and could not have reached the scene in time to fire the fatal shots.

Also under investigation was a telephone conversation which Detective Captain Al Marzen said Liggett had yesterday with Meyer Schulberg, president of a liquor distributing company.

Marzen said Liggett informed Schulberg he was writing a series of articles on Schulberg's activities. He said Schulberg bet the editor \$500 he was wrong in his premises and suggested Liggett give government operatives his evidence if he thought it was true. In formal statement to police Schulberg said Liggett demanded \$1,500 to "lay off."

Blumenfeld said he was introduced to Liggett by Mrs. Annette Fawcett, divorced wife of magazine publisher Billy Fawcett, shortly before Liggett was severely beaten by unknown assailants in a beer parlor two months ago.

Soon after, Liggett was acquitted of criminal charges involving two minor girls. He branded the charges a "political frameup."

Howard Guilford, 48, publisher of the weekly Saturday Press, an anti-radical publication, was slain September 6, 1934, six blocks from the spot where Liggett died.

Liggett was former director of publicity for the North Dakota nonpartisan league, deputy commissioner of immigration for North Dakota in 1919 and a New York free lance writer.

In 1926 he published "The Broken Frontier," first of several books.

The latest issue of his paper said he might be killed and demanded impeachment on Governor Olson of graft charges.

ASHURST AFFIRMED BY SUPREME COURT

The current year's deficit stood at \$1,732,000,000 today and was estimated to exceed \$3,000,000,000 by June 30.

Crowding in the background were potential new troubles hanging chiefly on findings of the supreme court. As the president drove up Pennsylvania avenue to the executive mansion shortly before 11 o'clock, the court room was filling with spectators for the second day of argument on constitutionality of the New Deal's farm program.

The administration has declared its readiness to raise funds elsewhere should the controversial AAA processing taxes be invalidated by the high tribunal. Only yesterday in Chicago, as he lashed "political advantage seekers and profiteers," Mr. Roosevelt stressed "a simple fact" that the states acting independently "never were able and never will be able . . . to balance the agricultural life of a nation so greatly dependent on nationally grown crops."

HEARST PRESS BACKS LONDON AS PRESIDENT

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of New York \$300,000,000 further in debt when he left office than when he took it over. Governor Landon has demonstrated to the nation he can do the opposite and the public is becoming vitally interested in tax reduction and economy in government.

Hearst scoffed at suggestions that Landon's dry record might be a disadvantage.

"There is no prohibition issue," he declared. "It's buried."

"The democrats can't afford to dig it up," he asserted. "It's a dead issue."

F. R. Critics Increase

The publisher was certain there is a "swing" throughout the nation against the Roosevelt administration.

"The new deal is faced with three issues," Hearst said. "They are the high cost of taxation, the high cost of living and the high cost of government."

Hearst declared Landon "stands out in high contrast to Mr. Roosevelt."

"In the minds of the public, Mr. Roosevelt is a gay promoter of things, Landon, on the other hand, is one who does things. The people are tired of promises."

Asked if there was a move in republican ranks to agree on the Kansas governor as the presidential nominee, Hearst said: "I don't know. I'm not a republican. Neither am I a politician."

The publisher waived aside questions about the agricultural adjustment administration with the remark "we'd better postpone that until we have more time to talk."

lical. They are not political. If it could be proven to me that not only Hauptmann, but any man is innocent, I wouldn't be moved by popular clamor or mauling sentiment if I never got another vote. It is a matter of duty to satisfy myself about this case. I've got the greatest burden."

Mrs. Hoffman "Sorry"

The governor said that Mrs. Hoffman had "refused" to comment on the case to inquirers. The Journal quoted her as saying she was "sorry" for Mrs. Anna Hauptmann and the couple's child.

The governor steadfastly declined to reveal what took place in his interview with Hauptmann. He justified his visit by saying the case was before the court of pardons "from the moment there was a conviction."

Asked if he had any new evidence in the case, the governor said the only thing before him were "representations by both sides." Some persons, including Col. H. Schwarzkopf, the governor said, including Hauptmann, Ellis, and others, including Ellis and Parker, Burlington detective, think him innocent.

The governor denied he had in his possession an affidavit purporting to show the latter evidence was "faked."

The governor left for Detroit to attend a safety council meeting today. He said he would return tonight and denied the trip had any relation to the Hauptmann case.

rectly involved in the case, but the court of appeals at Boston held the entire act unconstitutional.

Cotton Plan Expounded

Pepper contended one AAA purpose was "expansion of the markets" and likened that to "rigging the market."

Reed methodically pencilled notes.

Their debate occupied the time until mid-afternoon, when the turn of the Bankhead compulsory cotton limitation plan had precedence.

Reed had the speaking role for the government in this, too. Counsel for Lee Moor, a Texas planter out to force the Texas and New Orleans railway to transport his cotton without the tags showing he respected the law attached, have contended the legislation constituted improper delegation by congress of its powers.

It was necessary for those in the crowded court who wished to follow the proceedings intelligently to understand the difference between the AAA and the Bankhead act.

Decision Next Month

The AAA cotton program aims to control production of the nation's crop through the use of voluntary contracts and through payments to contract signers for reducing acreage. The funds are raised by processing taxes.

The Bankhead act provides that the secretary of agriculture fix a national allotment for each crop year. Producers are given individual quotas from the national allotment.

Secretary Wallace frequently has insisted he favored only voluntary control of production. The Bankhead act was not drafted by the farm administration and met only lukewarm reception from government officials when it was passed. However, Wallace recently said when commenting upon his attitude toward compulsory potato control that the Bankhead act had operated with considerable greater success than he had expected.
