

Independent Schools Scramble for Schedules

COAST SET-UP BRINGS CHANGE

Catholic Teams, Pacific, Idaho and Montana in Difficulties.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11. (AP)—Independent colleges left out on the football limb by Pacific Coast conference, began a mad scramble to fill their depleted schedules with intercollegiate games in an effort to counteract looming financial adversity. Deprived of their major money-makers by the drawing card giants—California, Stanford, U. C. L. A., Washington and U. S. C.—St. Mary's, Santa Clara, University of San Francisco, and College of the Pacific beseeched the east, mid-west and west with proposals for new and renewed gridiron rivalries to bolster threatened sides in their money pouches.

Gaelic Want Eastern Tilt. St. Mary's, long considered the major "lone wolf" of Pacific coast football, was negotiating with Holy Cross of Boston for a game which would be played when the Gaels invade the east for their Fordham encounter.

The Moragans were taken from the U. C. L. A. schedule, leaving them only California, Oregon, Santa Clara, Fordham and U. S. C. as top-notch gate receipt opponents.

Santa Clara, dropped by California and Washington and cheered by the popularity of its meeting with Texas Christian here last Saturday, were seeking a three-year arrangement with the Horned Frogs. Unofficial sources hinted also that the Broncos may try to interest Pop Warner's Temple Owls in a home-and-home agreement.

S. F. U. Dickered. University of San Francisco, passed up by Stanford and at least tentatively barred from a place on California's schedule, was reported dickered with Manhattan College, New York for a home-and-home contract.

University of Idaho, one of the "restricted" members of the conference which virtually was eliminated from the scheme of things by limiting it to four scheduled games, approached Michigan State College for the purpose of arranging a contest in the east. Michigan State met Loyola at Los Angeles this season.

Montana interests were seeking a game with Santa Clara to be played at Butte in an attempt to alleviate emptiness left by severance with Stanford and other conference teams.

Stagg's Team Hit. College of the Pacific, headed by Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg, appeared the hardest hit by the revolutionary conference set-up. The Tigers in 1934 made a fairly successful debut into big-time competition, holding U. S. C. to a one-point win and California to one touchdown, besides offering a colorful display of aerial offense to enthusiastic spectators.

Next year, however, will find the "grand old man of football" and his squad without a major engagement. The Staggmen were lopped from the California and Trojan schedules and indications were that they would not be asked into major competition during 1935.

Baseball Stars Change Hands in Chicago Deals

CHICAGO, Dec. 11. (AP)—The biggest sportsman's deal ever known, Young Tom Yawkey, and the game's greatest auctioneer of playing talent, venerable Connie Mack, have combined to turn the annual major league meetings into the most frantic bargaining session in history.

Another broadside from Yawkey's backlist yesterday, which brought Jimmy Fox, mighty slugger, and Pitcher Johnny Marcum to his Boston Red Sox from Mack's Philadelphia Athletics, touched off the struggle over the balance of American league power.

The deal, involving two Boston players and cash estimated at \$150,000, was hardly announced before the World Champion Detroit Tigers were actively involved.

Seeing the balance of power flowing steadily toward Boston with the transfer of the redoubtable Fox and Marcum, the Tigers quit bagging with the Chicago White Sox over price and quickly completed a cash deal for outfielder Al Simmons. Manager Mickey Cochrane gave the Sox a bundle of banknotes said to amount to \$75,000 for Simmons.

Oregon State Will Continue Wide Open Game; Veterans Return for 1936

CORVALLIS, Dec. 11. (AP)—Oregon State college's wide-open offense which thrilled spectators and chilled opponents this season, will be still dizzier in 1936—and probably even more effective.

This was the word today of Head Coach Lon Stiner, who boldly said his team "should be even better" next year. But it will be no bed of roses for the Beavers, he believes, for most opponents will be stronger.

Many Lettermen Return. While 10 lettermen graduate, only three were regulars. Returning will be 18 lettermen—nearly two full teams. This year's starting backfield returns intact. Seven of the returning lettermen are backs and 11 linemen.

Coach Stiner said next year's line should be stronger, on the whole, despite the loss of Joslin and Schultz, regular ends, and McClurg, regular guard. Needless to say the backfield will be stronger.

Sophomores carried nearly all the backfield burden this season, and the starting tackles were sophomores.

The Beaver reserves should be about the same, he said. However, observers believe that if this year's talented rookies come through as expected, the reserves will be stronger, for there will be more experienced juniors and seniors.

Gray Should Star. Joe Gray, probably the most outstanding all-around sophomore halfback in the coast conference this season, should attain new heights. His passing arm was the magic wand of the Beaver's aerial circus, and he scintillated at ball carrying. Seldom did he fail to twist loose at least once a game for a kick return of 50 yards or more.

His change of pace and ability to remain on his feet carried him farther than many speedier backs.

He tied with Cheshire of U. C. L. A. for conference scoring honors at 48 points. (Cheshire has one more chance Saturday against St. Mary's.) To his other accomplishments Gray added signal calling late this season, and showed capable generalship.

Kolberg On Hand. If Kolberg, sophomore fullback, and the other fullback candidates continue to improve, they will provide the line-smashing threat needed to make Gray more effective on off-tackle and end runs.

Anticipating the loss of both regular ends, the Oregon State coaches paid particular attention to developing reserves and freshmen. There will be plenty of rangy, pass-catching wingmen on hand next fall.

Besides Gray and Kolberg, Swanson and Duncan are returning backfield regulars. The key linemen for next year are Deming, outstanding center, Strack, guard, and Miller and Fisher, tackles.

This was the first season of wide-open football for the Beavers, and they were handicapped by not having a strong enough power attack to supplement it. Nevertheless the open football worked much of the time and produced thrills aplenty.

"We'll go right on next season, playing the same open, chance-taking football we did this year, and we still more so now that the players have the idea," Coach Stiner promised spectators and warned opponents.

The Los Angeles Filipino, touted as one of the best in the game, weighed in at 119½. Dado scored the only knockdown.

FRANKIE PECK TRIMS HOLLIS

Giving his opponent every chance to wrestle cleanly, Peck was pushed and punched around the ring for the first ten minutes of the bout. Finally aroused, the Californian clamped on a vicious head scissors to gain the first fall in 10 minutes and 47 seconds.

Hollis received a gash over the eye in the fall.

After hickering with Referee Ray Frisbie throughout the rest of the period, Hollis came out to win the second fall in 3 minutes and 52 seconds. It was gained with a series of hard body slams followed by a Boston crab hold.

The third fall was short-lived. Falling to receive an extra five minutes for rest, Peck showed remarkable recuperative powers to take the match in one minute and 48 seconds with a backward body slam off the ropes.

Pete Belcastro, Klamath Falls, and Les Wolfe, Texas, wrestled the semi-windup to a draw. Belcastro took his fall in the third round with two smart drop kicks. Wolfe evened the match with an octopus hold in the fifth.

Several times Wolfe verged on victory when he caught his rival in Indian deadlocks. Belcastro was saved by the bell in the fourth.
