

BANKING OFFICIAL GUEST AT ROTARY

T. P. Cramer, secretary, of the Oregon Bankers' association, was the speaker before the Klamath Falls Rotary club Friday noon.

Cramer's subject was, "Everybody's Business." The speaker said that insofar as government and taxation concern the nation, that they are everybody's business. He called attention to the tremendous increase in government expenditure and stressed the fact that many government officials take the attitude that there must be a redistribution of wealth to reach a social and economic balance. Others, however, Cramer pointed out, declare that this is not the method to promote prosperity and to continue a sound democratic government.

He declared that the present policy had been to "spend our way out of the depression," and that much of the spending had been done by people who had the foresight to save before the depression struck.

Cramer's subject was approached from a non-political viewpoint, and he pointed out that increased government expenditures were not confined to any one administration, and that previous to the present administration expenditures had increased steadily through one administration after another.

Mitchell Tillotson acted as chairman of the meeting, and T. B. Waters, vice-president of the Rotary club, presided.

Case May Reach Jury by Tonight

Nearing its conclusion, the second Ritchie vs. Jordan punitive damage case seemed likely to reach the jury late Friday afternoon. The case is being heard by Circuit Judge Edward Ashurst.

Long cross-examinations, frequent quibbling and numberless objections helped slacken the advance of justice. Only five witnesses, one of whom was already on the stand at the close of Wednesday's session, were called during the course of the long court day.

At Thursday's adjournment defendant's case had barely been opened. G. C. Palmer, first witness for Jordan, had just been dismissed when halt was called for the day. Testimony resumed Friday morning.

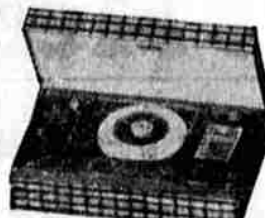
