

### MAIL SERVICE PREPARING FOR SEASONAL RUSH

Preparations for the Christmas rush are underway at the local post office, according to Postmaster Hart Hawkins, who announces that extra crews comprising 22 men will go into ac-

tion early next week, probably on December 17. Two extra trucks will be pressed into service for delivery of parcel post. A great increase in business is expected over the Christmas season of 1934, due to the fact that postal receipts have shown a steady increase for the past 27 months. An interesting feature of this holiday season, Postmaster Hawkins stated, is the fact that applications for extra work are only about 10 per cent as great as last year, indicating that a greater number of men have steady employment. It is expected that the big rush will start Monday, December 16, which will give eight days for transportation and delivery of packages. This allowance is none

too great, the postmaster said. There will be three parcel post windows in operation at the local office whenever increased business justifies this added service. The postmaster urges everyone to wrap parcels well, and address them plainly on one side only. As an extra precaution he advises that a slip of paper bearing the name and address of the sender as well as the address to be included inside each parcel in case the original wrapping is torn off.

### HOTEL AT MERRILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

MERRILL, Ore., Dec. 13. (Special) — The Merrill hotel, 26-year-old landmark of this community, was destroyed by fire early Friday morning. The building, erected years ago by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Welsh, was owned by John Groves. A number of guests were registered when the blaze occurred, but there were no injuries. The fire started in the north wing. It had gained great headway by the time fire fighters arrived. The cause was not determined. Insurance coverage was not known.

### NORTHWEST STATES SHOW RAPID GROWTH

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 13. (AP) — Faculty members of the University of Oregon business school said a survey showed today that Oregon and Washington have been outstripping the nation as a whole in manufacturing growth. Lumber, canned goods, flour and pulp paper industries showed largest gains. The survey, dating back to 1889, showed Oregon and Washington then produced only one per cent of the nation's manufactured goods. The percentage doubled by 1919 and then slumped. Recent gains brought it to 1.3 per cent at the present. If the increase rate continues an all-time high would be reached by 1939.
