

Detroit Captures Professional Grid Title

LIONS DEFEAT GIANTS, 26-7

Victory Gained Handily On Snow-covered Gridiron

DETROIT, Dec. 16 (AP)—Detroit's Lions today ruled as kings of the professional football jungle after grinding the New York Giants, defending title holders, into the mud of the University of Detroit stadium Sunday afternoon, 26 to 7.

A snow storm and a sudden field was not enough to halt the march of the Lions as they unleashed a devastating ground attack.

Clark Scores Second
Within a few plays after the opening kickoff the Lions reeled off their first touchdown, as Ace Gutowsky raced through a sapling hole in the Giants' forward wall and scored without a hand being laid on him.

Dutch Clark made the second touchdown when with the ball on New York's 42-yard line he sliced through tackle, shook himself into the open and sprinted across the goal line.

The Giants scored in the third quarter when Danowski faked back from the Detroit 42-yard line and rifled a pass to Ken Strong, who made a spectacular one-handed catch near the sideline.

Lions Block Point
The Lions scored again in the fourth period after a Giant punt was blocked. A series of smashes took the ball to the 3-yard line and Ernie Caddell swept wide around the Giants' right end to score.

In the final seconds Buddy Parker intercepted a pass on the New York 41-yard line and galloped to the nine yard line. On the third play he scored.

Uclans Score Upset Victory Over Moraga

KEZAR STADIUM, San Francisco, Dec. 16 (UP)—Standing off the challenge of a power-packed St. Mary's football team, University of California at Los Angeles closed its greatest season in history with an upset 13 to 7 victory Saturday.

Bitterly fought from start to finish, the game ended in a wild flurry as an irate fan, angry with repeated penalties against the Gaels, accosted Referee Nibs Price and planted a right to the jaw. J. Blewitt, field judge, rushed in and halted the battle.

Moraga Play Ragged

Taking advantage of a ragged play by the Moraga squad, the Bruins took the ball in the second quarter on the Gaels' 18-yard line. Charles Cheshire, U. C. L. A. all-American half back candidate, was spilled for a 10-yard loss. Two plays later left end Bob Schroeder snared a beautiful pass in the clear and stepped over the goal line for a gain of 26 yards and a touchdown. Cheshire's try for the extra point was wide.

St. Mary's staged an 80-yard touchdown drive in the first five minutes of the third quarter with Quarterback Lou Perry plunging over from the 1-foot line to score. He also made good the kick for extra point.

Gaels Fumble
A moment later and the Gaels were down to the Bruin 6-yard stripe. Fullback Floyd Maxham started over for a goal, but tumbled to lose the ball and give the Bruins first down on their own 20.

From that point the U. C. L. A. team, co-headers with Stanford and California of the Pacific coast conference championship, moved out to the Gaels 42-yard line before the quarter ended. Taking the ball after an exchange of kicks Cheshire started from his own 46 and rambled 23 yards in a sparkling run that saw him swiftness past a futile company of tacklers.

Extra Point Made
Substitute Quarterback Bob Williams faked back on a delayed buck, dropped in behind a charging line of interferences and swept cleanly around the left side of the St. Mary's line for a 12-yard run and touchdown. He kicked the extra point.

Stanford Goes Into Training For Mustangs

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. Dec. 16 (AP)—Stanford football players buckled down to heavy training today for their game against Southern Methodist University on New Year's day.

One of their teammate mainstays—end James "Monk" Moscrip—may be on the sidelines during the Rose Bowl classic.

Moscrip was in the hospital recovering from an operation for a torn knee cartilage suffered Nov. 23 in the game against University of California that brought Stanford the Rose Bowl bid.

It was reported he might be able to try out his leg again the latter part of the week but doubt was expressed he would be of much value to the team even if allowed to play New Year's day.

Head Coach C. E. "Tiny" Thornhill returned to the campus armed with notes on the plans to combat Southern Methodist's aerial attack after a flying visit to watch the Texas team in action in its last game of the regular schedule Dec. 7.

After watching the Mustangs beat Texas A. and M., the Stanford mentor declared his team faced a tremendous task in the Rose Bowl but at the same time expressed opinion that the visiting eleven is not invincible.

Pitt Panthers Score Twice in Defeating Troy

MEMORIAL COLLEGE, Dec. 16 (UP)—The University of Pittsburgh drove over two touchdowns and presented a stalwart defense in the pinches to score a 12 to 7 victory over University of Southern California in an inter-sectional clash here Saturday.

Approximately 45,000 fans saw Pitt even up the series with USC. The win by the eastern club gave each university two victories.

Pitt Gets Revenge
Today's performance by Pitt was a great satisfaction for Coach Jack Sutherland who had vowed his Panthers would revenge themselves on California soil for 47 to 17 and 35 to 0 defeats in the Rose Bowl. Pitt beat the Trojans 26 to 6 in the east last fall.

Pitt's touchdowns came in the first and third periods. Frank Patrick, sophomore fullback, drove for a scant foot for the first tally. The second came after Pitt advanced the ball 81 yards, with Hubert Randour, senior halfback, doing most of the work. He contributed two runs of 25 and 24 yards, respectively, during the march. His touchdown slash was good for seven yards. Patrick missed two place kicks after the touchdowns.

Spectacular Touchdown
The Trojan touchdown was a spectacular last-minute affair. USC was on the Pitt 35 yard line after a punt when Davy Davis shot a 20-yard pass to William Galsford, end. Galsford gathered in the ball and loped 19 yards through the Pitt secondary for the score. Sutherland converted a place kick.

LOUIS LISTED TOP ATHLETE

Lawson Little Runner-up In Associated Press Sporto Ballot

(NOTE—This is the first of a series on the results of the fifth annual Associated Press poll on the year's leading individuals, teams and happenings in sports.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (AP)—By a margin of votes as convincing as any conquest with his fists, Joe Louis stands acclaimed today by the nation's sports experts as the outstanding athlete of 1935, amateur or professional.

The 21-year-old negro heavyweight, who brought the million dollar "gate" back to pugilism with his knockout punch, tops the individual masculine performers in the fifth annual Associated Press poll.

First Fighter to Win
He is the first prizefighter in the poll's relatively brief history to take the main honors. Previous winners were Pepper Martin, Gene Sarazen, Carl Hubbell and Dizzy Dean.

Unmentioned a year ago when the elder of the celebrated pitching Deans ran away with the balloting, Louis was voted a substantial margin of victory over his chief rival, William Lawson Little Jr., two time king of the amateur golfers and runner-up in the poll for the second straight year.

Little made a closer contest of it this year, however. The 1934 count was 268 points for Dizzy Dean and 113 for the golfing ace. Today's tally shows that Louis, while enjoying a three to one margin in first place, received 182 points to Little's 129.

Gate Receipts Inference
That Louis is not a champion and will not even get a crack at the heavyweight title of James J. Braddock until next September makes his rating as the "athlete of the year" all the more remarkable.

Most sports editors and writers contributing their views emphasized their high rating of Louis was due to his tremendous influence on boxing gate receipts as well as on his sensational knockout record.

Several rate him as the "uncrowned king" of the heavyweights, while also recognizing Braddock's victory over Max Baer as one of the year's greatest comebacks. Braddock tallied only four points, however.

Third place went to another negro athlete sensation, Jesse Owens of Ohio State, for his unprecedented achievement in breaking three world records and equalling a fourth in one afternoon during the big ten track and field championships.

Owens tallied 61 points and outdistanced the dusky rival who beat him in the National A. A. U. championship, Eulace Peacock of Temple. Peacock collected only five points.

Jay Berwanger, Chicago's All-American halfback, finished fourth with 42 points, confirming his rating as the year's outstanding college football player. Notre Dame's Andy Pilney was the only other gridiron star mentioned. He tallied 11 points, including two nominations as the year's outstanding performer.

Baseball's individual stars for the first time failed to play a conspicuous part in the poll. Manager Mickey Cochrane of the world champion Detroit Tigers proved the most popular. He finished fifth with only 19 points.

Tiger Players Star
Tommy Bridges, Hank Greenberg, Goose Goslin and Marvin Owen received mention for their contributions to the Tiger cause. Dizzy Dean received three testimonial points.

Twenty-four individuals in eight branches of competition were mentioned in the poll, representing the views of expert eyewitnesses in all parts of the country. Besides those previously listed, individuals receiving one or more nominations for first place were Sir Malcolm Campbell, Britain's land-speed king, and Wilmer Allison, conqueror of Fred Perry of the United States tennis championship.

Buddy Myer Wins American League Batting Crown

CHICAGO, Dec. 16, (AP)—Charles Solomon (Buddy) Myer, the Washington Senators' second baseman, who talked himself out of swinging in the leadoff position and took up golf to sharpen his eye, officially became the American League's 1935 batting champion today.

The official averages, just released, show that the little Senator veteran beat out Joe Vasmik of Cleveland by one point, .349 to .348, with Jimmy Foxx, then of the Athletics, but now the property of the Boston Red Sox, only two points farther back.

Myer's championship mark was the lowest in 27 years or since 1908 when Ty Cobb won the honors with .324, but it was the Senator star's tops by a huge margin for an 11-year major league career.

He attributed his rise to taking up golf last year to improve his timing, and to getting away from the head of the batting order. He considered the number one spot a fluke and proved, to his own satisfaction at least, that there was some truth in it, by winning the title in one of the hottest stretch battles in years.

Never a distance hitter, Myer has made only 30 home runs in 11 seasons, he punched out 215 hits, one less than Vasmik who topped that department. His collection included 153 singles, 36 doubles, 11 triples and five home runs. The five homers matched his best previous mark for circuit blows, made in 1932 when he hit only .279.

Drake University Basketball Team Invades Oregon

The intercollegiate basketball season starts in Oregon this week, although no conference play is billed until after New Year. The Drake university hoopers, co-champions of the Missouri valley, play at University of Portland Wednesday night and at Willamette university Thursday night.

University of Oregon's basketball team meets the Bearcats at Willamette Friday and Oregon State plays the Bearcats at Salem Saturday night. Oregon State opens its season Friday at Portland against Union O. I.

Southern Oregon Normal, which defeated the Eugene town hoopers 27 to 19 Saturday, meets Fresno State at Ashland Monday and Tuesday. Fresno plays at University of Portland Thursday. The still undefeated Portland ice hockey team plays Seattle here Thursday night after meeting the Seahawks at Seattle Wednesday.

Texas Elevens Resume Practice For Big Games

DALLAS, Dec. 16 (AP)—Rested after a week's layoff, the Southern Methodist Mustangs and the Texas Christian Horned Frogs today called back to the gridirons to begin rehearsing for their football games on New Year's day in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif., and the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans.

Bobby Wilson, the Mustangs' all-American back, was not with his teammates. He had to go to Houston to accept a trophy presented by the Houston Post annually to the most valuable individual player in the southwest conference. Head Coach Matty Bell and James H. Stewart, directors of athletics, were with him, leaving the team to start working out under the direction of Vic Hurt, Bell's first assistant.

Hawaii Defeats Utah University

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 16 (UP)—A fourth-period touchdown and the subsequent extra point enabled University of Hawaii to defeat University of Utah by a 21-20 score in their inter-sectional game here Saturday.

The game was a see-saw battle which saw one team and then the other grab the lead.

PECK OPPOSES JAP GRAPPLER

Jiu Jitsu Star Appears At Klamath Armory Tuesday Night

Recognized as one of the first five Jiu Jitsu grapplers in Japan, Shinuchi Shikuma, 205, comes to the Klamath armory Tuesday night to meet Frankie Peck of San Francisco in a one hour match.

Peck, who has competed before against oriental stars, considered he had a good chance for an even break in the Jiu Jitsu. The first two falls will be divided between Jiu Jitsu and catch-as-catch-can. If a third is necessary, the grappler who gained his fall in the most rapid time will select the method of wrestling.

Peck on Monday pointed out some of the features of the Japanese wrestling art. The grapplers will wear canvas jackets. This is because Jiu Jitsu is not particularly effective on the nude body.

In the orthodox Jiu Jitsu, the victor must either render his opponent unconscious or force him to give up. The winner, if his rival goes out, must himself bring him in. In Japan a student must first learn to revive his competitor before he is permitted to go on with wrestling.

Peck studied the oriental style on his last trip to Japan.

Chief holds are the strangle and the arm bar.

Shikuma is a black belt wrestler in his native country. This is the next to highest degree in the Jiu Jitsu school.

The last match on Tuesday's card will be between Ken Hollis and Rex Mobley. Hollis, Little Rock, Ark., is favored chiefly because few opponents can stand up to his roughness.

Les Wolfe, Texas, meets Bob Kennaston, Gold Hill, in the opener.

Only the first match will be wrestled under the Australian round system.
