BOMBS DROPPED

WITH THE ITALIAN ARMY
AT DOLO, Dec. 14—(By Courier to Mogadiscio, Italian Somaliland, Dec. 14)—Fifteen Italian airplanes bombed and killed today in the town of Noghele, source of supplies of the rear guard of Haas Denta Denta's Ethiopian army.

Although pilots reported heavy damage was visible, the number of fatalities was not estimated. The Ethiopians replied with fire from their anti-aircraft guns and machine guns.

Many Accidents Blamed On Cold

B. L. Harrington and J. W. Hahn reported an accident due to fog and slippery pavements at the intersection of Oregon avenue and Addison streets Saturday morning.

John A. Carlson and Inez L. Cox reported a Saturday evening crash occurring at Sixth and Main streets.

Henry Klinkhammer and Fred Ervin reported that both their machines were damaged when they sideswiped on the South Sixth street viaduct Saturday evening.

Mrs. Fannie M. Cheyne, a passenger in an automobile driven by Murray Dickenson, was slightly injured when their car was struck by a car operated by Lee Menko, who backed out of a driveway without lights, according to police reports. The accident occurred early Saturday evening.

Other Saturday evening accidents were reported by C. F. Ream and Leona Jeanne Roberts, whose machines collided at the intersection of Martin and Eberle streets, and by James S. Hoffman and H. H. Tipton, who crashed at Third street and Klamath avenue.

Although the fog abated somewhat in the city late Sunday, it persisted in the valley below Klamath Falls, and threatened to descend upon the city at any time all day Monday.

No change in weather conditions is predicted by local and state weathermen, and continued.

such is highly regarded by all of us. But some nasty charges are being leveled at the pelican. It is said, for example, that each pelican eats at least 10 pounds of fish per day, and since there are estimated to be some 5000 pelicans in the Klamath country it is apparent (if the 10 pounds per day estimate is accurate) that they dispose of around 25 tons of fish daily.

That runs up into a lot of fish in the course of a summer.

BUT, the defender of the pelican will answer, these are chiefly fish of the poorer type, such as mullet and chubs; the trout being swift enough to escape.

Another theory enters here. Mullet, chub and other fish of this type consume the larvae of the midges, which are such an unwholly pest in the summer season and prevent Klamath from being a great resort lake. It seems obvious that if the pelicans eat the mullet, chubs, etc., that would otherwise eat the midge larvae the midges are going to get out of balance. (As goodness knows, they have.)

And so it goes. This problem of the balance of nature is one that we haven't yet solved. Perhaps it might be a good idea to sic the New Dealers onto it.

HAVANA, Dec. 16. (AP)—Nicolas Castano, millionaire who was kidnaped a week ago and held for \$500,000 ransom, was found alive today by the Cuban army.

Details of Castano's recovery or whether the huge ransom had been paid were not immediately available.

Police believed the kidnaping was staged by leftist revolutionary groups. Thousands of men had been thrown into a search for the wealthy snach victim, including the national army, navy and police.

(Hauptmann's story continues) it was agreed that Hauptmann should act as treasurer, hide the money, and try to pass as much as possible through his brokerage account and in dealings with tradesmen.

Faured To Tell

"Hauptmann gave Fisch \$2000 from the brokerage account in November, 1933, so that Fisch could sail for his native Germany. (He died there a month later). "Hauptmann says he did not tell this story at his trial because he feared that if he admitted the extortion it would increase his chances of being convicted for murder.

"Hauptmann gave Fisch \$2000 learned from Fisch the identity of the kidnaper. He reported words on that point are: 'On my Bible I swear I had nothing to do with the kidnaping. I can't name any accomplices in that crime because I had nothing to do with it.'"

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 14. (AP)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman and Col. Mark G. Kimberling,

principal keeper at state prison, denied published reports today that Bruno Richard Hauptmann had confessed he and landor Fisch collected the \$50,000 Lindbergh ransom.

The governor said, "I never heard of any such thing," and Col. Kimberling said emphatically, "there has been no confession of any kind."

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
