

Boston Red Sox Acquire Washington Player

MANUSH CENTER OF TRADE DEAL

Solons Get Roy Johnson, Carl Reynolds in Dickering.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17. (AP)—The Washington Senators today traded outfielder Heinie Manush to the Boston Red Sox for outfielders Roy Johnson and Carl Reynolds.

Owner Clark Griffith of the Senators said it was a straight swap with no cash involved.

Griffith, already possessing outfield strength, had held out for a pitcher in return for Manush but finally made the swap for the outfielders when the Red Sox refused to send along a hurler. The Senators now have eight outfielders but have failed to make a single change in their pitching staff, which was one of the poorest in the American league last season.

It has been known that Manush felt he could do better in another location. A strong hitter when the Senators won the pennant in 1933, Manush fell down the last two years. In Johnson, Griffith feels he has a player at least Heinie's equal and in Reynolds one of the game's best "spring hitters." They also add to Griffith's potential trading material.

Reynolds now has been with four major league clubs and with the Senators twice. Manush previously had played with Detroit and St. Louis.

Both Reynolds and Johnson are four years younger than Manush, 35-year-old Manush hit .273 last season while Johnson hit .315 and Reynolds .279.

Malin's opponents put up a stubborn defensive holding the local squad to a one point victory the final score ending 21-20 with E. Reber and H. Hundley tied for high point with a 6-6 score.

Malin's B team chalked up a ten point margin against the visitors with the final score reading 23-13.

The games Saturday night gave the local quintet their second victory of pre-conference play after they took a 26-19 victory over the snappy Beatty Indians a week ago.

The first conference game scheduled for Malin is with the Klamath Union high school Wildcats on the local floor, January 3.

Coast League Will Name New Leader Today

OAKLAND, Calif., Dec. 17. (AP)—Pacific Coast league directors elect a president today and then adjourn.

Names of nominees for the presidency were announced by H. L. Haggerty, resigned, were not announced, but principal candidates were reported to be George Hilbrand and Frank Herman of Los Angeles; J. Cal Ewing of Oakland, and Royal Brougham of Seattle.

Yesterday's session witnessed adoption of the so-called Shaughnessy plan, providing for a playoff series at the end of the regular season with a seven-game champion series between playoff winners for the title. In the playoff, the first club meets the third and the second club the fourth.

The directors voted each club must contribute to a \$10,000 purse, to be divided \$2500 to the team finishing on top at the close of the regular season, \$5000 to be divided on a 60-40 basis between winner and runner-up in the elimination series and \$1250 to the losers.

March 25 was set as opening date next season, with the close September 13.

HELEN MOODY SPORT QUEEN

Comeback Wins First Place in Poll of Accomplishments.

(This is the second of a series detailing results of the annual Associated Press sports poll.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 17. (AP)—For her remarkable comeback in winning the Wimbledon tennis championship for the seventh time, after a two year absence from tennis competition, Helen Wills Moody is rated the outstanding individual performer of 1935 among women athletes by the fifth annual Associated Press sports poll.

Tabulation today of votes cast by sports editors and writers in all parts of the country showed Mrs. Moody far in the lead over rivals in all sports in a year marked by many noteworthy feminine achievements.

Mrs. Vase Second The California matron, who first scaled national championship heights in senior competition in 1923, nearly doubled the point total of her nearest rival, Glenna Collett Vare, heroine of the year's outstanding golf comeback as she won the national title for the sixth time.

Mrs. Moody polled 136 points to 76 for Mrs. Vase. Points were tallied on a 3-2-1 basis as sports observers listed the three outstanding performers in the order of preference. Mrs. Moody headed 33 lists and Mrs. Vase 11.

In a close race for third place in the poll, little Mary Hoeger of Miami Beach, who had not yet celebrated her 12th birthday last July when she won the national senior A. A. U. three meter diving championship, emerged the winner, with 51 points.

She was followed closely by Helen Stephens of Fulton, Mo., new sensation in track sports and record breaker in national sprint competition, with 52 points. Helen Hull Jacobs, winner of the American tennis title for the fourth year, with 51 points.

Sports observers cited evidence to show that 1935 marked a fresh challenge from feminine ranks to the theory of masculine superiority in sports. With no rivals among her own sex, Helene Mayer, the famous German girl and Olympic fencing champion, engaged leading men fencers on the Pacific coast on even terms.

In the Rand America trap-shooting tournament, Mrs. Lela Hall of East Lynne, Mo., not only captured the women's title but beat two men in a shoot-off for the national class "B" championship.

In golf, Mildred Babe Didrikson, the Texas girl who turned professional, and Joyce Wethered, British star, startled galleries by their ability to match shots with masculine rivals. Miss Didrikson can hit a golf ball 250 yards but she has yet to develop the all-around skill of Miss Wethered, generally considered the best shot-maker of her sex, amateur or pro.
