Experiences in Lava Flow Told By Former Klamath Man

The writer has had an exciting experience, which he little expected, when he wrote last to the Herald-News of the volcano eruption.

Many who could spare the time, and had the facilities, went up the mountain to get, if possible, to the actual lava flow. Four days after the eruption, a young "Y" secretary and his wife, accompanied the writer and Mrs. Preston on the trip to get to the flow. This necessitated an auto trip of some difficulty up the mountain for about 40 miles to an elevation of 6500 feet.

This brought us to the saddle between the two mountain peaks of our island and opposite the site of eruption and river of lava. The intervening distance, between end of road and lava, was about six miles, over an old lava flow and rough country. Two kinds of lava are common in these eruptions, i.e. "aa" lava—which has a broken-up, sinder-like formation; and "pahoehoe" lava, which is comparatively smooth, pouring out like thick fudge, cooling quickly into curious formations. As this latter lava cools on the surface it is forced up from below by the on-coming molten lava which swells it up into hills and cracks it open. It was necessary to cross both these kinds, created by a flow which occurred in 1859, in order to get to the new outbreak.

It was afternoon before we got started on the hike across the lava. The writer and his wife felt it unwise to proceed more than two miles over such ground, realizing it would be impossible to get back before dark. Our friends believed, being good hikers, that they could find their way back. We returned to the road where our car was parked just before it got dark.

We had arranged with our friends to shine our headlights across the lava, and blow the horn at intervals for their guidance. A few hours after dark, in response to these signals, two men emerged from the brush in front of the car. These were business men who had come over from Honolulu to see the flow, and were saved a night on the lava by our signals. They were very grateful for this assistance, confessing they had no idea where they were till hearing the auto horn. They left us shortly and we sat in the car for several hours, there being intervals of heavy fog and rain. We kept signalling. At 9:30 we felt we should drive about five miles

back to the CCC camp and get help.

Two men were sent back with us to light a large fire on top of a hill back of the spot where we were parked and, at intervals, signal with rifle shots. This they kept up till one in the morning.

At 2:30 a party of hikers appeared who had run across my "Y" friend some miles back on the road. He told that his wife had worn the sole off one shoe and could not walk further on the lava, and he had left her a mile or so out on the lava in one of the numerous hollow formations for protection from the very cold wind and rain. Stock-

ing up on hot coffee, food and clothing he proceeded out again across the lava to bring her back, but we saw nothing again of him till the writer ran across him at 10:30 in the forenoon some miles back of our parking place. He was still carrying his supplies, having failed to locate his wife after eight hours search. He was, naturally, very alarmed that his wife had not turned up. He asked the writer to go again to the CCC camp to secure more help to accompany him on another search (the CCC men were already searching the lava).

On my trip to the camp to secure this additional help I met his wife coming out of the brush. Considering her experience she was in good condition, though quite tired and hungry. Returning with her to our base, expecting we would meet her husband, we discovered he became too impatient and alarmed to wait and went out again on the lava to search for her.

As he had entirely lost his bearings the night before, he was searching in the wrong location and it was three in the afternoon before the CCC workers located him to unite him with his wife. After eating and reporting at the camp we drove for home to allay the anxiety of friends who had heard the Honolulu and mainland broadcasts, and read the big headlines in the papers. We had been 36 hours up on the mountain. Our friend's wife had sat for nine hours in the hole in the lava with only her husband's hiking shirt for extra covering—she was wearing jeans and a light sweater over a shirt waist. It rained most of the night with a bitter wind blowing. The temperature was but a few degrees above freezing.

Daylight came about 6:00 o'clock but, expecting searchers, she stayed till 9:00 o'clock when she concluded her husband had failed to get out for help. Taking a service cap he had left with her she bound it with her neck scarf to the worn shoe and walked out across the lava to the rough scrub ground where, after several hours of wandering, she struck the road. That she came through the experience so well is almost a miracle.

The writer and his wife feel they have had an intimate acquaintance with lava and volcanoes! After two weeks of activity the lava flow is within a half mile of the road where we were and we may be tempted to go again to see it before the activity ceases.

The writer has sent a picture of the eruption and map diagram to Attorney F. O. Small with the request he loan it to the chamber of commerce to display for those interested.
