## Interesting Xmas Boxes Sent Immigrants By D. A. R. Groups

Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution have prepared 28 Christmas boxes containing useful and practical gifts, as their annual contribution to the detained immigrants and aliens at Angel Island, according to state chairman, Mrs. Warren Hunt, of Klamath Falls.

Thirty dollars a month is sent to Angel Island by the national society to buy supplies not found in the boxes. C. A. R. societies send boxes of toys each year for children.

These detained people would be idle from morning to night if it were not for the Daughters of the American Revolution. There is no other organization that gives occupational work.
