Girl Scouts Enjoy Busy Week Prior To Xmas Holiday Recess.

Twelve girls, members of the high school troop, selected the twelve gifts, Miss Lydia Erickson, who is personally acquainted with all of the patients, supplied the names and a written description of each one with suggestions as to what sort of gifts each might like. A definite amount of money was allowed for each gift and the girls made their own selections, showing excellent judgment, good taste and thrift in their choice.

On Wednesday evening the girls met at the home of Mrs. Earl Gilbert and wrapped the gifts with the gayest of Christmas paper, seals and ribbon. Mrs. Twyla Ferguson, president of the Klamath County Health association, who was invited to be present Wednesday evening and see the gifts before they were wrapped, as well as after, expressed her complete satisfaction as to the manner in which the girls had carried on the plan.

The candy, which had been made before hand by Mrs. Alfred Peterstener and Mrs. Gilbert, assisted by several of the girls, was carefully packed in attractive boxes. This is a special treat to the inmates of the hospital because only at Christmas are they allowed any but hard candy. The high school troop is composed, for the most part, of girls, who, until they entered high school were active members of grade school troops. Walter Boyce, engineer, was unconscious, and physicians said he would not live. The men were scalded when the boiler of the engine exploded, after crashing through eight wooden cars of the Great Northern train.
