Eberhart Both Coach, Player

Ashland Mentor Still Tops As Basketball Center. Thorough Knowledge of Oregon Style May Bring Victory for Normal School Here Next Thursday.

Jean Eberhart, head coach of the Southern Oregon Normal school, not only has taken his place in the northwest as a leader of intercollegiate athletics but he still is one of the finest basketball players in the section.

The bustling accompanying a coaching career and the sideline worry during the course of a contest hasn't dimmed Eberhart's love for active competition. Whenever there is an opportunity, you can find him doing the center job in grand style for some independent team.

Eberhart has a thorough working knowledge of the type of basketball played by the University of Oregon this season and when the Webfoots come to Klamath Falls next Thursday, Hobson, the new coach, may find his offensive stalemated.

Eberhart has played with and against Oregon; many of his players were on Hobson's Ashland team last season and practically everyone of them saw service against the Webfoots in the 1934 season.

The situation makes it tough on Hobson.

During the last Thanksgiving holidays Eberhart returned to his home in Eugene, organized an independent team and upset the Webfoots in a practice game.

He knows the strengths and weaknesses of the Oregon varsity. With this to work from, his team of Elephants has an outstanding chance to score victory on the Klamath armory court.

The young Ashland coach's career has been noteworthy. At Eugene high school he centered the Purple to a state championship. It was the same Eugene team that invaded Chicago for the national tournament.

He jumped into prominence as a freshman and then became varsity center for three years.

Following his graduation from Oregon he became coach at University high in Eugene and took one team to the state tournament.

This is his first season as Ashland coach.

Sons Transfers Help in Multnomah Tilt; Beavers Beat Bearcats.

Oregon's sport calendar this week is heavily marked with basketball.

University of Oregon plays Union Oil in Portland tonight and then opens a southward barnstorming trip against Southern Oregon Normal in a game at Klamath Falls Thursday night.

Oregon lost to Willamette university's giant team, 29 to 21, Friday, but beat the Multnomah club Saturday night 53 to 33 with the aid of Ward Howell and Chief McLean, second team transfers from Southern Oregon Normal.

Oregon State's basketball five meets Multnomah club at Corvallis tonight and wind up their pre-conference schedule against Union Oil of Portland at Corvallis Friday and Saturday nights.

The Beavers beat Union Oil 35 to 32 Friday night and came from behind to beat Willamette 30 to 29 Saturday night.

There will be no more boxing in Portland until after the first of the year, Matchmaker Stub Nelson announced.

The annual business meeting of the Oregon High School Athletic association at Portland Thursday night may bring forth repercussions of football "state championship" mess. Election of a "senate" composed of one representative from each basketball district will be up for consideration.

The Portland ice hockey team left for its first invasion of the prairies. The Buckaroos play at Edmonton Wednesday, at Calgary Thursday and Saturday and then back to Edmonton Monday, Dec. 30.

DALLAS, Texas, Dec. 23. (AP)—Coach Matty Bell ordered hard scrimmage behind locked gates for his Southern Methodist Mustangs today as the Ponies started polishing plays to be used against Stanford in the Rose Bowl game on January 1.

The Mustangs entrain for the west coast Thursday noon, and will spend Christmas day in their final workout here.

Third-stringers have been equipped with Stanford plays to offer opposition for the varsity in defensive and offensive practice.

The Mustang mentor said his charges would have to buckle down to business to redeem themselves for the poor showing they made in scrimmage last week, when the reserves completely outplayed the regulars.

No definite plan of attack has been announced for the Mustangs. Bell said he was getting ready for "just anything."

Bell seems to lean more toward building a defense, however, declaring that he is still worried over the question of stopping the Stanford power attack.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. Dec. 23. (AP)—Christmas was just another day of Rose Bowl preparation for Stanford football players and late in the day they entrain for Pasadena where they will meet the Southern Methodist Mustangs New Year's day.

Coach C. E. "Tiny" Thornhill promised his men little respite from the stiff workout schedule until shortly before game time.

Today he planned another rigorous practice, chiefly on defense. Drills are scheduled again tomorrow, and the Cardinals then make ready for the trip to Pasadena Wednesday night.

Thirty-eight varsity players received Rose Bowl jackets yesterday, souvenirs of the grid classic. The jackets are of leather and bear the Stanford Red Indian insignia.

Dartmouth's 12th Man Play Year's No. 1 Sports Oddity

NEW YORK, Dec. 23. (AP)—Oddest happening of the year on any field of American sports was the voluntary appearance of a spectator as a "twelfth man" in Dartmouth's lineup against Princeton.

This, at least is the conclusion drawn from the fifth annual Associated Press poll of sports experts, who gave this particular oddity wide preference over all other unusual developments of 1935.

The incident had an appropriate setting. Playing in a raging snowstorm, Dartmouth was being pushed all over the snowy aridities by the ferocious attack of the Tigers. Backed up against their own goal line, late in the game, the Indians needed help.

As Princeton called signals on third down, with scarcely a yard to go for a touchdown, a spectator leaped from the stands, raced across the end zone and took a place in the Dartmouth line before officials could stop him or the play.

The Tigers, somewhat startled, executed their line smash uncertainly and failed to score. The "twelfth man" was summarily removed and Princeton then scored.

Anything, sentimentally or otherwise, he is worth this. At least have him put out of his pain humanely if you cannot look after him.

Kamm to Manage Missions in '36

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23. (UP)—William (Willie) Kamm, one of baseball's smartest tacticians, was named today as manager of the San Francisco Missions in the Pacific coast league for the 1936 season.

Kamm signed a one-year contract at unannounced terms to handle the team which Charles (Gabby) Street, another famed baseball figure, directed for two years.

The contract brings Kamm back to the city where he started his baseball career. After starting at third base for the San Francisco Seals, he was sold more than a decade ago for \$125,000 to the Chicago White Sox.

It was the largest baseball sale price on record.

U. S. Ski Jump Hope Goes East

AUBURN, Calif., Dec. 23. (AP)—Roy Mikkelsen, junior yard employee and America's chief hope for the ski-jumping championship of the Olympic games, traveled eastward today to join the American contingent bound for Germany.

Mikkelsen, national champion of the United States, left as he wanted to—without fuss or feathers. When he went to the national championship at Canton, St. D., this year, this hero-worshipping foothill mountain town, turned out en masse with a banner to bid "goodbye."

The champion slipped out of town this time with only a few friends to bid "goodbye."

He said he thought Reldar Anderson, Norway, would be his stiffest competition. "Reldar sure is tough," said the tall, rangy blond, who was born in Norway and came to America in 1924.

Mikkelsen is 28 years old and won the national championship twice, once in 1933 and again this year. He has three brothers who have held sectional titles. His parents live in Oslo.
