

Oregon Drops SONS, 44-33 in Klamath Game

1000 FANS AT BIG CONTEST

Last Half Scoring Drive Gives Webfoots Victory Here.

University of Oregon's barnstorming basketball team paused here Thursday night long enough to hand a 44 to 33 walloping to Southern Oregon Normal school's fighting elephants. A last half scoring drive gave the Webfoots their commanding lead, after a see-saw first half.

About 1000 fans braved a snowy night to witness the college hoop contest, sponsored by the junior chamber of commerce.

Walton Scores

Walton, dead-eye forward of the Ashland outfit, opened the scoring in the first ten seconds of play when he flipped in a field goal. Howell, husky Webfoot, came back a minute later to even it up.

Superiority from the foul line gave Oregon the advantage as it built up a first half lead, which it lost as Southern Oregon tied things up at 14 all. At half time the elephants were only a point behind, 15-17.

As the second period opened, Walton dropped in a foul shot to even the score. Then Oregon began its scoring drive, with Howell and W. Jones leading the attack. The Webfoots drew steadily ahead to the finish.

Many Substitutions

Substitutions were plentiful throughout the game. In the middle of the first half, Coach Howard Hobson of the Webfoots and Jean Eberhart of the Sons sent in full new teams.

A recent dance on the armory floor made it slick, and there was a good deal of tumbling that slowed down the game. When the elephant forward, was sent out on personal fouls.

Many students of both the normal school and the State university, home for the holidays, were in the stands.

The Oregon team, after spending the night in Klamath Falls, entrained for its southward jaunt. On its way back from California, the university squad will meet the SONS team again at Medford.

The Klamath high Pelicans lost to the CCC Cubs, 27 to 23, in a preliminary contest.

Farm Prices Improve As Inventory Time Arrives

Opening of the 1936 Oregon farm inventory campaign, the OSC extension service has just issued in its monthly agricultural situation report current information on farm inventories, credit statements and farm operation budget plans. The eight-page circular also reveals that the Oregon farm price situation is continuing to improve even faster than in the country as a whole.

Listed in the circular are many farm management bulletins which are available from county agents, as well as farm record books, farm price outlook information and market reports that are available by mail and radio.

With National Farm Inventory week coming just after New Year's, it is time to get the 1935 farm records closed up and new ones started, say the extension agricultural economists. County agricultural agents are prepared to assist any farmer who needs help either to obtain satisfactory record books and forms or in getting his records started.

Some recommended forms for making the annual farm inventory and net worth record are given in the circular which is the December issue of the Oregon Agricultural Situation report.

The section on the trend of farm prices, demand and costs, indicates that farm prices in Oregon have made some further general advance during the past few weeks, although the general level of farm prices in the whole country has stood practically unchanged. This has resulted in reducing the disparity between the farm price level in Oregon and that of the whole country.

Farm prices in the country as a whole have been rather high in relation to the purchasing power of consumers, owing to reduced supplies of farm products in the drought areas. Consequently the improvement in demand, as factory payrolls increase, is showing more effect on farm prices in Oregon than in the country generally. Here the supply of farm products was not curtailed much by drought and prices have never been far out of line with demand conditions.

CONDITION OF INDIANS GOOD

Stanford Men in Shape for Test; S. M. U. on Way West.

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 27. (AP)—Stanford's football team is going to be in better physical condition for its game with Southern Methodist in the Rose Bowl here New Year's Day than in either of its last two visits.

This was the promise of Coach Claude (Tiny) Thornhill today before he herded his stalwart band together for another session at Brookside Park.

"We've had a week more of practice for the game this year than was possible before the Columbia and Alabama games," said big, good natured Tiny.

"The boys are in the pink right now and our practice session the rest of the way will be designed to keep them up there. It is surprising what an extra week of work will do for a team. You know last year and the season before examinations came so late they cut us out of a week we needed badly."

Thornhill does not plan any heavy training the rest of the way. Dummy scrimmages on offensive and defense to perfect his attack and build up a more solid front against S. M. U. formations along with some punting, running and passing will be in order until Sunday after which the team will start tapering off.

Not only did the Indians appear in top physical condition, save possibly James (Monk) Moscrip, star end, but their mental attitude also appeared to be better.

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 27. (UP)—Ready for their New Year's Day game with Stanford and anxious to prove that they deserve the title of national champions, 31 football players from Southern Methodist University entrained yesterday for Pasadena and the Rose Bowl.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27. (AP)—Western speed against eastern power is the battle prospect for the Shrine Intercollegiate football game here New Year's Day, judging from the coaches' appraisal of players.

Coaches Orin Hollingbery and Percy Lacey of the west team declared this year's bucks are all sprinters and the fastest they have seen for many seasons.

Eastern mentors, Dick Hanley and Andy Kerr, admitted they have very little to match the speed of the westerners but pointed with pride to their backfield averaging some 195 pounds.

Quarterback Riley Smith of Alabama weighs 265, Sheldon Beise, fullback from Minnesota, scales 195, left half Dick Hookin of Ohio State weighs 192 and Dick Crayne, right half from Iowa, is a 190-pounder.

Walter Cruice of Northwestern, who dislocated his knee in a fierce Christmas Day scrimmage, is 209 pounds. He will take it easy in practice for a few days but definitely will play, eastern coaches said.

LEGISLATURE PLAN OKED

Delegate Districts Mapped for High School Athletic Group.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 27. (AP)—An assembly of 22 delegates will act as a legislature for the Oregon State High School Athletic association, members of the association voted at the annual meeting here last night.

Under the new provision, which becomes effective next October or November, the state was divided into 11 districts from each of which will be elected a delegate from an "A" school and one from a "B" school. "A" schools have more than 150 enrollment.

The association, in its last business meeting under the old system, lifted all member schools a vote, lifting the eligibility ruling that students must start within 11 days of the semester opening. The old ruling handicapped the working lad, it was argued.

A three-member board of control will hold three regular meetings yearly and special meetings as needed.

Edward F. Bloom of Heppner is board president, John L. Gary of West Linn, secretary-treasurer, and Lynn Parr of Marshfield was elected the third member to replace Paul T. Jackson of Klamath Falls.

No. 2—Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Wheeler, Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties.

No. 4—Clackamas and Multnomah (outside of Portland) counties.

No. 5—Clatsop and Columbia counties.

No. 6—Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill and Polk counties.

No. 7—Marion county.

No. 8—Lincoln, Benton, Linn and Lane counties.

No. 9—Douglas, Coos and Curry counties.

No. 10—Josephine and Jackson counties.

No. 11—City of Portland.
