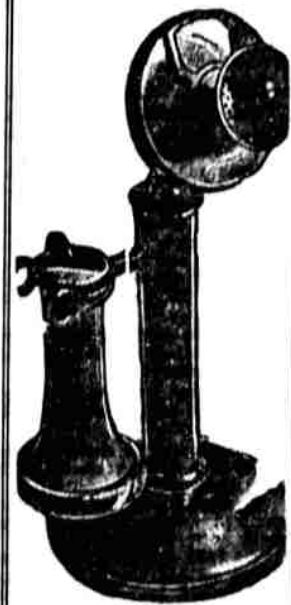

NEW YORK, Dec. 28, (AP)—Stock market profit takers cashed in some more of their gains today in a moderately quiet brief session.

There were a number of losses ranging from fractions to more than a point. Scattered specialties were in demand, and rails and aircraft were relatively steady. The close was somewhat heavy. Transfers approximated 1,169,999 shares.

Among resistant stocks were Youngstown Sheet & Tube, Santa Fe, Pennsylvania, New York Central, Union Pacific, Delaware & Hudson, Allied Chemical, National Dairy, Auburn, Woolworth and Douglas Aircraft.

Among the heavier issues were Case, Deere, Chrysler, American Can, Dupont, Johns Manville and Radio preferred "B." Unchanged to slightly lower were American Telephone, Consolidated Gas, Radio, U. S.
