

LAND AVAILABLE FOR IRRIGATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30. (UP) The result of reclamation projects begun several years ago, nearly 100,000 acres of land on three projects, two of them Owyhee and Vale in eastern Oregon and the other in Wyoming were available for irrigation this year for the first time. A report on these and other projects, made by Elwood Mead, commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation is included in the annual report of Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Jones.

Reclamation work during the last fiscal year included in Oregon: Stanfield, Umatilla county; Umatilla, Vale, Klamath and Owyhee.

The Stanfield project, originally constructed in 1905 by a private company, includes 10,000 acres. The main canal diverts water from the Umatilla river. The water supply in part is obtained from the McKay reservoir under contract for 15,000 acre-feet. A PWA allotment of \$100,000 was used for refinancing and rehabilitating the project.

The Umatilla project, including 11,000 acres, produced crops this year having an average value of approximately \$15 an acre. On the east division of the project a cooperative creamery and cannery are operating successfully.

Nearly all lands on which water is available have been settled on the Vale project, and there are 242 water users. Crops are diversified, the largest acreage being planted to alfalfa and hay for winter forage. Alfalfa returned a yield of about 4 tons to the acre, and potatoes 135 bushels to the acre. The agency valley reservoir, a part of the project, is nearly completed.

Of 568 farms on the main division of Klamath project 510 were farmed and produced crops valued at \$37.53 per acre. On the Tule lake division only but one of the 334 farms are being operated with crops valued at \$48.73. Work during the year included enlarging and strengthening of the dikes in the Tule lake division and extension of the drainage system in the main division.

New lands totaling 6,400 acres were sold during the year on the Owyhee project, and 35,000 acres on which water will be available early in 1936 will be for sale at that time. Construction of the irrigation works was completed and the North canal was completed to the inlet of the Malheur river siphon. Repairing of the foundation of the Owyhee dam is proceeding rapidly.

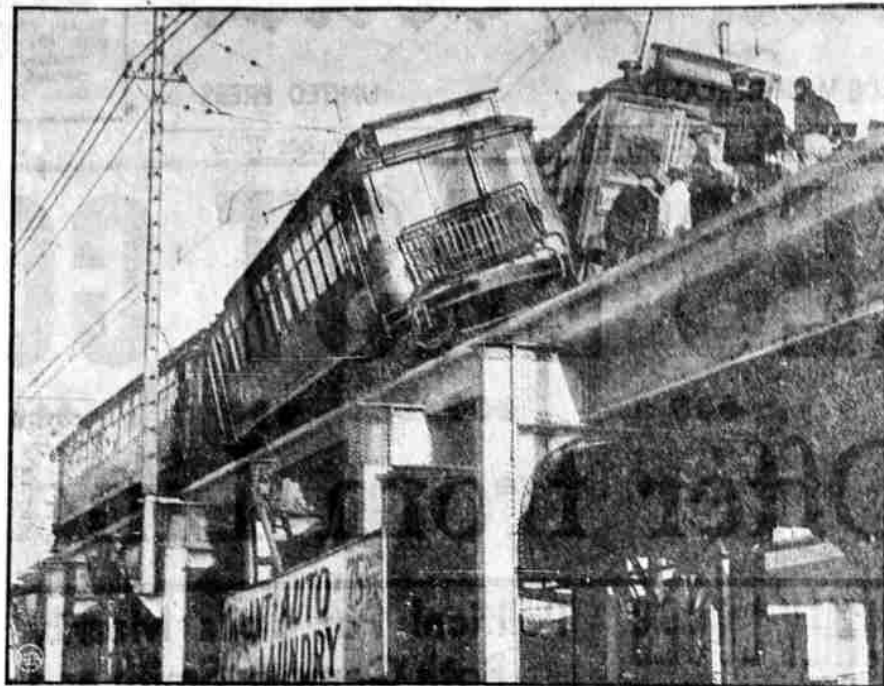
TULELAKE

moved or disconnected in the recent campaign for elimination of toll rates between Tulelake, Merrill and Malin. Many of the business houses in town are without phones, and the percentage of disconnections in rural homes is very high.

Building activities in the district are continuing, despite cold weather, and construction on several new structures is planned for the early part of 1936. Contracts will be let in the near future for work on two four-room modern frame houses, to be built in Tulelake, by Thomas C. Wood, Bakerfield, Calif. Each dwelling will contain a living room, two

bedrooms, a combination kitchen and dinette and bathroom.

PROPOSED LAWS AFFECT KLAMATH

Complete information on the proposed legislation that, if passed at the next session of the legislature, will enable this county to have an official planning commission has been received by Guy E. Bellant, chairman of the Klamath county planning commission from the Oregon state planning board office. The state board requests that members of the local body study this information, take it up at a meeting in the future, and inform the board whether or not it approves it.

At present every county but two has an organized planning commission. Although practically all groups are active in planning work, they do not as yet have official status. The new bill would make it possible for county courts that approved the planning program to appoint official boards.

Such acts have already been passed in Washington and Idaho, and under this legislation, county boards have been named and are rendering valuable services to the states, the state board points out. "Planning looks toward the future," writes V. B. Stanbery, plan-

ning consultant and executive secretary of the state board. "It implies a comprehensive plan for future development to be evolved over a period of years. To accomplish this, county boards should be recognized as a continuing function."

The bill enables the county courts by resolution to create at their discretion a planning commission which becomes a legal entity, to act in an advisory capacity to the court and other bodies. It will encourage planned development and conservation of all resources of the county for the social and economic welfare of the people.
