Oklahoma Senator Seeks All-America Silver Conference

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2. (U.P.)—A conference among American, Canadian and Mexican government officials to develop a unified silver policy as the first step in a war against managed currency was proposed Wednesday by Senator Elmer Thomas, D., Okla.

The Oklahoma senator, leader of currency expansionist forces on Capitol Hill, advanced the suggestion as Mexican and United States fiscal authorities met at the home of Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau to discuss this nation's future silver policy.

Thomas, Senators Charles McNary, R., Ore., and William E. Borah, R., Ida., are among the invited guests at a dinner Morgenthau is giving for Eduardo Suarez, secretary of the treasury of Mexico.

"Great Britain has half of the world tied up with managed currencies," Thomas told the United Press. "I believe the rest of the world is helpless to fight that situation unless silver producing countries get together."

Fishermen Discover Youth's Body in Net

LONGVIEW, Wash., Jan. 2. (U.P.)—Fishermen pulling in their net near Cathlamet brought in the body of Raymond Atwell, 24, Vancouver, Wash., youth who was en route down the Columbia river to Astoria in a small boat with his brother Robert, 20.

AUXILIARY WORKS TO PRESERVE PEACE

In the face of the most threatening conditions since the World war, the women of the American Legion auxiliary are continuing to work for enduring peace through development of stronger friendship and closer understanding among the people of different nations.

Mrs. M. E. Cooper, chairman of the Fidac committee of the local auxiliary unit, explained Thursday how this work is being carried forward through the women's auxiliary of Fidac, the "after-all veterans' federation."

"Through peace treaties and pacts have been found to be incapable of preventing war," said Mrs. Cooper, "we of the American Legion auxiliary have not lost faith in the possibility of lasting peace. While elaborate superstructure of peace, erected after the World war, appears to have fallen into ruins, we are continuing to work on what we believe must be the foundation of peace—friendship and understanding among the peoples which compose the different nations."

"The Fidac gives us contact with the women of the European countries who, allied in the war, in our Fidac program, we study these countries, trying to learn to understand their customs, problems and aspirations; trying to know these people better and establish an enduring friendship with them. We are trying to give them a similar understanding and friendly feeling for the people of the United States."

"Wars do not occur between nations whose people are friendly. There must be hate for the other nation in the hearts of a people before they can be led to aggression. Propaganda of hate always is used to lay the foundations for war. We believe that friendly conversation about other nations can be used to lay the foundation for lasting peace."

"One of the important undertakings of Fidac is stopping propaganda designed to create ill-will between nations. In our national Fidac essay contest for 1936, we are asking high school students to write on 'How an American youth cooperates with Fidac to prevent propaganda of international hostility.' We hope that the united efforts of the war veterans and their families of the allied countries can lead the way toward ending this menace to peace."

"Every member of the American Legion auxiliary is automatically a member of the Fidac auxiliary, and each should try to interest boys and girls in this national essay contest. Essays will be limited to 1,000 words in length and will close May 1, 1936. State and national prizes will be awarded with a \$200.00 scholarship as first national prize. The contest is open to all students regularly enrolled in high schools or in schools carrying a high school curriculum."

CHEVROLET MOVES TO BOOST SALES

DETROIT, Jan. 2. (U.P.)—To stimulate the sales of new automobiles and late model used cars, the Chevrolet Motor company announced today it had set up a \$1,000,000 fund from which its dealers will be paid \$20 for every old car taken in trade and junked during January.

The company also said it would pay bonuses to its dealers' salesmen who sell more used cars during January than in the same month of 1934.

M. E. Coyle, president of the Chevrolet, said the special fund not only would aid the sale of late model used cars, but would take many unsafe vehicles off the highway.

General Petroleum company has been awarded the county's gasoline contract for 1936. County court members accepted the company's bid of 15.85 cents per gallon, standard grade. The company has agreed to deliver at various points over the county.

Floes of Ice Jam Mississippi River

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo., Jan. 2. (U.P.)—Ice floes extending 15 miles northward Wednesday jammed the Mississippi river here for the first time since 1922.

YAKIMA BOOSTS PINE SPUD BOXES

Reminiscent of similar efforts here, the Yakima local of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen has undertaken the development of retail potato crates in connection with wood box promotion.

These crates are made of ends and slats and are designed to market potatoes in retail quantities. The slats are widely spaced to permit circulation of air among the potatoes. The Yakima promoters believe these crates will appeal to purchasers of small quantities of potatoes in the cities.

One firm that has stores in a number of northwestern cities has agreed to sell potatoes in boxes in all of them, it was reported. Yakima, like Klamath Falls, has a large potato industry as well as pine mills and box factories.

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FUNDS ALLOTTED FOR STATE SURVEY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2. (U.P.)—The WPA allotted \$23,682 for the University of Oregon bureau of municipal research to complete a statewide survey of local government. V. B. Slansky, executive secretary of the Oregon state planning board, announced today.

Detailed data will be assembled from every county on municipal debt, current receipts and disbursements, administrative organization, services rendered, personnel, employees and other phases of local government.

Employment of 49 statisticians, accountants, five typists and secretaries, one attorney and two draftsmen is included in the project. Three non-relief field accountants also will be employed.

RUST RESISTING WHEAT DEVELOPED

The Toronto Star (Canada) of recent date, under the heading, "Important Discovery," states the following: Thomas Teare, one of Saskatchewan's leading agriculturists, has produced a rust-resisting wheat. Teare has his demonstration plot for inspection and many farmers visited the place to marvel at a wheat, not yet named, that has withstood the attack of rust this year. Right alongside this plot is another wheat and barley infected badly with rust.

During the past 20 years Teare has concentrated on producing pure seed, and his success is attested by his crops. The two sections of land he farms have become known as the show place of the Marquis district. He has supported seed from every section of the globe to get what he wants in the way of plants and flowers.

Continued Upturn Of Lumber Business Forecast For 1936

SEATTLE, Jan. 2. (U.P.) bright outlook for the lumber industry in 1936 was predicted Wednesday by the West Coast Lumbermen's Association in its annual review of the past year.

"The turning point from the low depression of the national lumber market was passed in 1935," said Col. W. B. Greeley, secretary-manager of the association.

Building Revives—Private building revived as a movement of consequence throughout the United States for the first time since 1931, he reported. "Throughout 1935, the record of home building permits and contracts awarded has grown practically every month. At the close of November these were \$5 per cent ahead of the same period of 1934."

"The rising tide of home building, long neglected and now easy to secure by low cost financing, is creating again the fundamental basis for a prosperous national lumber industry."

Delayed government projects, which got under way this fall, also boosted lumber use to another high level, Greeley pointed out. West coast lumber production for 1935 was estimated at 4,700,000,000 board feet in the Douglas fir area, compared to 4,275,000,000 feet in 1934. Orders and shipments also showed an increase.

In the report, Col. Greeley made it plain that the bright outlook for 1936 might be dimmed by labor troubles, such as plague the industry in the spring of 1935.

"Since the strike, the higher cost of production on the American side has given the industry in British Columbia the opportunity to win further sales in open, foreign markets, particularly in China," he said.

Trade Pact Hindrance—He said the Canadian trade agreement left the west coast lumber industry in a difficult position.

lumber industry in a disadvantageous position in national and international markets.

"Nevertheless, the west coast lumber industry, given peace and cooperation by employers and employees of logging camps and sawmills, longshoremen and their employers, and the maritime industry, will prosper during 1936," he predicted.
