

SEATTLE MAN  
NAMED AIDE  
FOR CAPITOL

CONFRATERNITY TO  
HOLD INSTITUTE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3. (AP)—Carl F. Gould, Seattle architect, will be technical adviser to the Oregon capitol construction commission, members voted last night.

He will prepare regulations and requirements for a nationwide contest among architects. The prize is the architectural contract for Oregon's new \$22,000,000 capitol to replace the old structure which burned.

Five other prominent architects were considered.

Gould, who conferred with the commission here, said he would go to Salem today to inspect the site and discuss space needs with state officials. Two weeks probably will be required to gather information, and another week to map out a program, he said.

The fee will be \$2000 if the contest is open to all architects and \$1500 if only designated architects compete. He also will receive expenses during his absence from Seattle.

The statehouse architectural work will entail an expenditure of \$150,000, or six per cent of the total cost.

The contest, to start in a few weeks, will extend three months. The public works administration, which allocated funds to aid in the capitol construction, approved plans for the competition.

C. C. Hockley, Oregon PWA administrator, said he thought the contest should be nationwide, but suggested if an eastern man wins it could be specified that the top-ranking Oregon architect be associated in the project.

"The Oregon man would know conditions, materials and weather," Hockley said. "He would be your local representative and builder."

**Barth's Store Changes Hands**

Transfer of ownership of Barth's Dollar store, 717 Main street, from George Barth to Vern Norvall became effective January 1, it was learned Thursday. Terms of the deal were not revealed.

The long established business will be operated under the new name of Cash Bazaar. Norvall formerly was for several years manager of the Golden Rule basement store.

No immediate changes are contemplated by the new owner, either in the policy or tangible appearance of the store. It is understood both stock and fixtures were included in the sale.

**BIDS ON WINEMA SCHOOL REJECTED**

School elections will be held May 1 and it is expected that a decision will be reached soon after that date when bids will again be called for.

Staunton is the retiring member of the board this year with W. H. Anderson and George Frey the hold over members.
