This prediction has been borne out during the past week as shown by the following daily shipments: December 27, 3 cars; December 28, 9 cars; December 29, 11 cars; December 30, 16 cars; December 31, 20 cars; January 1, 9 cars; January 2, 17 cars.

A strengthening in price of Klamath potatoes is also noticed at the present time, with extra fancy U. S. Number One going at \$1.25 to \$1.45. It is understood that the supply of this quality spuds is limited, however.

AUTHORS' LIVES DRAMATIC AS BOOK

The dramatic incidents in the motion picture "Mutiny on the Bounty" now showing at the Pine Tree are hardly more dramatic than the life of the co-author, James Norman Hall, according to A. B. Epperson who was a college classmate of Hall.

Hall graduated from Grinnell college in 1919. In his college days he was noted for his adventurous spirit. Chester C. Davis, present administrator of the A. A. A., was a classmate of Hall and they worked their way through college as partners in the "gathering laundry" business. The contact was so close that in after years Davis named his first-born son Norman Hall Davis.

Hall's talents were demonstrated while yet in college. He wrote for the college paper and the present college song, "Sons of Old Grinnell" was written by Hall, both music and words.

In 1914, Hall was riding a bicycle through England when the war broke out. He tried to enlist in the English army, but had a hard job of it when they discovered he was an American.

He was advised to drop his "itches" and say "blimey" and "Arry, 'ow's the missus." They took him.

He spent months in the trench warfare with Kitchener's Mob and came home and wrote a book by that title. He then went back to France and joined the Lafayette Quadrille and became an ace. Many are the times he is mentioned for his escapades in Eddie Hichens' "Fighting the Flying Circus."

Hall was finally shot down, the projectile landing between the propeller and the fuselage—but didn't explode. Hall landed in a tree behind the German lines with a broken arm. For months he was held as a prisoner of war, finally escaping and the dramatic events of this escape appeared in his "Knights of the Blue."

He and a companion finally reached the Rhine river separating him from Switzerland and neutral soil. In one of the greatest moments of his life, he dodged the German guard, swam the river just in time to hear the bells and whistles in Switzerland announcing the signing of the armistice.

Writing later for the Atlantic Monthly, he was sent to Iceland, but it seems that he had met Charles Nordhoff in Paris during the war and they found that in common they had three things. First, they were both aviators; second, both were writers; and third, both craved just the opposite of all the things they had been experiencing, peace, calmness, repose and a chance to exert their one special which Norman Hall calls "Cacoethes Scribendi."

The idea of the "Mutiny on the Bounty" appealed to them first about 10 years ago. Here is a story that has lain dormant for nearly 150 years and it is no wonder that it took them 10 years to gather all the facts. The annals of the British Admiralty had to be searched; models of the "Bounty" had to be obtained and all these details, for it must be plain that an author does not care to make a mistake in dates, facts or details, to be later reviled by some critic.
