

DUPONTS ADD HUGE SUM TO LEAGUE FUND

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3, (AP)—The American Liberty League's chief financial backers last year were members of the Du Pont family of Wilmington, Del., the league revealed Thursday in a report to the house of representatives.

The Du Ponts contributed or sent more than 25 per cent of the league's receipts of \$483,175, the report showed.

\$42,000 Behind Demos

These loans and contributions, coupled with large amounts from other big business leaders, gave the Liberty League financial resources greater than those of the Republican party. The league's receipts for the year ran only some \$42,000 behind those of the Democratic party.

The two party organizations also filed reports.

The Democrats listed receipts of \$525,635, disbursements of \$592,934, a cash balance of \$23,710, and unpaid obligations amounting to \$403,277.

The Republicans reported contributions of \$407,450, disbursements of \$199,166, and a surplus of \$208,480.

The Liberty League reported expenditures totaling \$259,973. Of this figure \$54,750 went to Joseph P. Kamp, president, for salary and traveling expenses.

The Liberty League, founded some 18 months ago "to preserve the constitution and American theories in government," said it would welcome contribution of small amounts—anything from \$1 up—from the "man in the street."

Today's report, however, showed that wealthy men contributed most of its money. Prominent backers, in addition to the Du Ponts, were John J. Raskob, who managed Alfred E. Smith's presidential campaign, \$15,000; Alfred P. Sloan, board chairman of General Motors corporation, \$15,000; E. T. Weir, Pittsburgh manufacturer, \$15,000, and Joseph E. Widener, Philadelphia capitalist, \$15,000.

The league received donations or loans from 25 persons for \$5000 or more; 149 individuals gave \$100 or more.

Not Legally Bound

Under the corrupt practices act the league is not required to report contributions of less than \$1000. The league, in fact, announced recently that it did not consider itself legally bound to make a report, but said it would file a statement anyway.

J. Howard Pew, Philadelphia, who lent \$50,000 to the league and gave it another \$5000, was listed also by the Republicans as contributor of \$20,000. Three other members of his family, active in the Sun Oil company, each contributed \$20,000 to the G. O. P.

Another Republican contributor was John D. Rockefeller, Jr., \$5000.

Reed and Bob Burleigh head the firm. Formerly in the lumber business here, and he later resigned as a district official of the WPA. Burleigh was formerly with the Miller Tractor company.

Headquarters are being established at 719 Market street, Klamath Falls. The company will carry a complete "Caterpillar" line including Diesel and gasoline tractors, power units, road machinery and similar equipment.

TRADE TREATIES BENEFIT FARMS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3, (AP)—The system of reciprocal trade agreements to build up foreign trade may be the primary solution of agriculture's problems, Dr. Henry F. Grady, chief of the trade agreement division under Secretary of State Hull, said on Thursday.

Indicating that present federal aids to agriculture are merely a temporary expedient, Dr. Grady contended that the real corrective is to rebuild foreign trade.

The Pacific coast will benefit more quickly and more completely than any other section of the country from liberalization of foreign trade, the former University of California professor said. This is because the west coast produces for a specialty market.

"Europe is your big market for fresh, dried and canned fruits, and for canned salmon and pilchards," he said. "We intend, if possible, to consummate agreements with every principal power, and every one of the European agreements will be beneficial to the west coast."

In this connection, he tacitly confirmed hopes of Washington and Oregon fruit growers that a forthcoming agreement with France will substantially increase fruit exports, but said: "I should not mention France only as being a prospectively greater customer."

He said 18 treaties already have been announced as pending or completed. The markets in France, Spain, Switzerland and Finland were rated as highly important for northwest farmers and orchardists.

Dr. Grady said opposition from lumber interests to tariff reductions on Canadian lumber has largely subsided. He denied a charge that lumber men's problems were not considered adequately before the pact was signed, asserting a committee of government experts spent an entire year studying briefs submitted by the industry.

WOODBURN DEATH BRINGS MYSTERY

SALEM, Jan. 13, (AP)—The cause of the death of Lewis Orville Caswell, 72, whose dead body was found yesterday on the kitchen floor of his home here, remained a mystery today.

Circumstances surrounding his death became complicated when Coroner L. E. Barwick said he was informed Caswell's niece, Mrs. Ara Magdon of Portland, had received a letter from him written December 31, indicating he intended to take his own life.

Investigation revealed no bullet wounds nor trace of poison, but the fact that Caswell's head was lying on a pillow and he was well dressed indicated he may have been preparing to die, Barwick said. An autopsy will be held today.

Caswell's was the third sudden death in this county within 24 hours, and the fourth this week.

Hugh Jean Sloan, 41, Broadacres farmer, was fatally shot through the stomach early yesterday, and his confessed slayer, a neighbor, John Kyle, 65, was in the county jail facing charges of first degree murder. Kyle said he shot Sloan in "self defense."

Mrs. Vera Melis of Missoula, Mont., drowned in a laundry tray at the home of her parents here at noon yesterday. Investigation led officials to believe her death was accidental. It was learned her husband, Percy E. Melis, was with the forestry department at Washington, D. C.

Meanwhile Edward R. Barrett of Salem faced charges of involuntary manslaughter in justice court today as the result of an accident Tuesday in which his car struck and killed Orlando H. Garson.

BUYING DROPS AFTER ACTIVE YULE SEASON

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (AP)—Consumer buying for the week receded from the bulge of the holiday period but held above last year's comparative, Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., said today.

"The usual Christmas aftermath lowered retail sales in all districts from the total of the week preceding, and in some sections the recession was accentuated by heavy snows which disrupted traffic," the review said.

"Due to the lull in buying during the corresponding period a year ago, however, a favorable showing was made by the comparison, the estimated gain averaging from 2 to 3 per cent."

The varied demand for articles needed to celebrate the arrival of the new year, in the most elaborate manner that has been witnessed in almost a decade, nearly obliterated the expected post-holiday dullness in the retail trade.

In addition, the cold weather maintained demand close to that of the preceding week for heavy weather apparel, rubber footwear, winter automobile accessories and hardware.

"Cutting short their inventory periods, wholesalers in most of the leading markets have their attention to the largest volume of orders received at this season in four years."

EVANGELIST SLIPP HERE NEXT SUNDAY

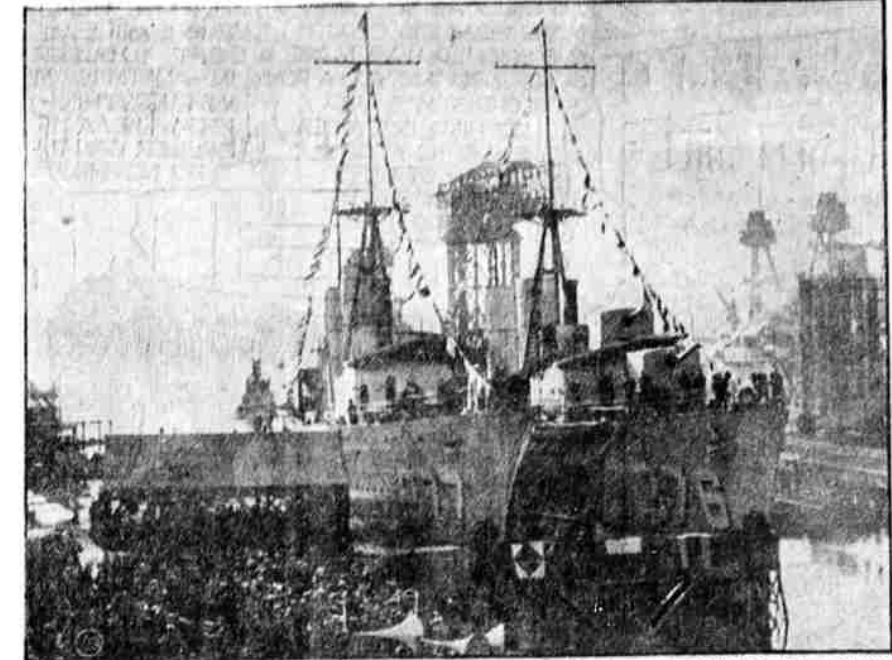
Evangelist "Billy" Slipp and his wife will be at the Klamath Temple Sunday evening to preach the first of a short series of services conducted in the new church.

ATLANTIC CITY HOTEL BURNED

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Jan. 3, (AP)—Ten men were injured when fire destroyed the 100-room Biltmore hotel early today, driving more than 40 guests into the street in their night clothes. The hotel was valued at \$300,000, the owner said.

The fire started in the rear of the five-story frame building and hours later firemen were still pouring tons of water into the smoldering ruins. All furnishings were destroyed or damaged by water and most of the guests lost their jewelry, clothing and other valuables.

Battalion Chief Eben Matmis, one of those injured, said the reports of how the fire started were conflicting, but that he believed the flames originated in a garage in the rear of the hotel and spread rapidly.

Manuel Malamut, manager, was aroused by employees and directed flight of the guests.

Men and women slipped into their heaviest coats and ran out of the place. They were given hot drinks and clothing at nearby hotels.

The 37,717,000 feet reported as 17 per cent below the week before, but some of the decline was attributed to the Christmas holidays.

Shipments were 28,854,000 feet and production 21,295,000 feet. For the period January 1 to Dec. 28, orders were 35 per cent above the same period a year ago.
