BETTER DEMAND NOTED FOR WOOL

BOSTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There is a little better demand for wool, and prices are inclined to be a bit stronger, possibly two cents, on a basis, for the better wool."

"Stocks are in light supply, domestic wools outside manufacturers' hands being estimated at only 45,000,000 pounds, to last until new clip time."

"The manufacturing position appeared to be very sound and the ultimate consumers are still showing interest in wool clothing."

"Foreign markets are strong and expected to rule even stronger."

"Mohair is very firm and in slightly better inquiry."

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 3, (AP)—The stock market enjoyed a broad advance today as congress convened and the financial district awaited with interest the president's annual message.

Gains of fractions to three or more points predominated. A number of new highs for the past several years were recorded.

While a few of the mines and aircrafts were backward, the close was firm. Transfers approximated 2,700,000 shares.
