Arm Cargo Rerouted

A missing load of arms was found to have been routed mysteriously to a French port where, authorities said, it could easily have been placed aboard a ship. Confused reports of the death of a second Swedish Red Cross worker as a result of the Dolo bombing a week ago reached the British foreign office from its legation at Addis Ababa.

However, because of a similarity of names, it was thought perhaps only one Swede had been fatally wounded as previously reported.

F. R. Under Fire
Fascists saw Premier Mussolini's hand behind a blistering editorial criticism of President Roosevelt's neutrality speech, written by Virginia Gayda in the Biennale d'Italia.

French editorial writers, too, assailed the speech as reflecting American "egotism."

In London, informed sources predicted the British cabinet soon would study the American president's pronouncements. These persons looked upon the speech as strengthening the hand of the league of nations in the Italo-Ethiopian problem.

English Troop Moved
In the Mediterranean, where international tension was relaxed for weeks incident to the advancement of peace proposals, Britain used commercial liners to carry troops to British posts near the areas of greatest uneasiness.

The destination of one Cunard-White Star liner, the Scythia, pressed into troop transport service, was said by authoritative sources to be Alexandria, Egypt, just east of Italy's north African possession of Libya and northwest of the Ethiopian war zone.

JOHNSON ASSAILS F. R.
CHICAGO, Jan. 6. (AP)—Gen. Hugh Johnson, former NRA chief, sharply criticized President Roosevelt's night message to congress today and warned against a "rabble rousing rift" which he said threatens to plunge the country into a grave crisis in the coming campaign.

Class conflict, he predicted, will result from the opposing alignments of big business and administration leaders unless an understanding is reached.

Johnson, who has criticized various phases of the new deal administration since its inception, as head of the NRA, spoke at the shoe fair here.

This would be an all time high.

There was not the slightest hint of readiness to meet demands from the opposition for an immediate balanced budget. Pending study of the voluminous document, political leaders in general withheld detailed comment.

Dispute in Offing

From the start, however, dispute was plainly inevitable. Comment varied largely according to the economic views of the legislators rather than along strictly party lines.

"To run all the regular activities of the government," Mr. Roosevelt said bluntly in the message read from the rostrum to congress and house, "I will need a total of \$5,069,000,000."

This figure, put forward as a new standard for the government's permanent operating costs as differentiated from "emergency" outlays, exceeded comparative "regular" costs of recent years by around \$2,000,000,000.

Change Held Justified
In a new expression of policy, Mr. Roosevelt moved federal public works, the Civilian Conservation Corps and agricultural benefit payments from the category of "emergency" to "regular" federal activities.

"Success" justified the change, he said.

Even the new high level of "regular" expenditures, it was said, would leave a \$5,000,000 surplus of revenue (before relief costs) as a result of "increased earning power and profits throughout the nation and not from the new taxes imposed."

In defense of new deal financial policies, Mr. Roosevelt added:

"The credit of the government is at its highest."

Success Pointed To
"The average business men of the nation stand ready to do their share."

"It is to be hoped that the motives and attacks which spring only from the desire for political or financial power on the part of the few will not retard the steady progress we are making. Our policy is succeeding. The figures prove it."

"Secure in the knowledge that steadily decreasing deficits will turn in time into steadily increasing surpluses, and that it is the deficit of today which is making possible the surplus of tomorrow, let us pursue the course that we have mapped."

The figures had been explained by him Saturday to more than 100 newsmen in his office. His "budget school for reporters," popping with questions and answers, lasted more than two hours.

Aides Accompany F. R.
Secretary Morgenthau, Daniel Bell, acting budget director, and other aides were at the president's side. Reporters mingled with the business at hand.

In his partial relief budget, Mr. Roosevelt estimated a \$1,103,000,000 carryover from 1935's billions of relief money.

By deducting the estimated \$5,000,000 surplus representing the difference between income and "regular" expenditures, he arrived at the partial estimate

of the 1937 deficit—\$1,098,000,000.

This compared with an estimated \$3,234,000,000 deficit at the end of the current fiscal year on June 30—a difference of \$2,136,000,000.

Mr. Roosevelt's nearest hint of how much future relief requests may be was:

"I do not anticipate that the need for additional relief funds will be as great as that sum (\$2,136,000,000)."

Especially evincing expected business improvement was a forecast that 1937 income tax collections would increase half a billion over 1936's estimated \$1,431,000,000.

Policy Held Sound

The new deal policy adopted in 1933 "to stop the downward economic spiral," the president said, was "predicted on two inter-dependent beliefs."

"First the measures would immediately cause a great increase in the annual expenditures of the government—many of these expenditures, however, in the form of loans which would ultimately return to the treasury."

"Second, as a result of the simultaneous attack on the many fronts I have indicated, the receipts of the government would rise definitely and sharply during the following few years, while greatly increased expenditures for the purposes stated, coupled with rising values, over a period of years, diminish the need for work relief and thereby reduce federal expenditures."

The increase in revenues would ultimately meet and pass the declining cost of relief. . . .

"There is today no doubt of the fundamental soundness of the policy of 1933. If we proceed along the path we have followed and with the results attained up to the present time we shall continue our successful progress during the coming years. . . .

"The finances of the government are in better condition than at any time in the past seven years. . . . the budget reflects a substantial decrease in the spread between income and outgo."

Mr. Roosevelt estimated gross receipts for the fiscal year at \$5,564,217,650 as compared with \$4,410,793,946 for the current period.

Public Debt Set
Aside from a general revenue rise based on business improvement, the 1937 total included \$547,000,000 of social security, rail pension and Guffey coal law taxes.

Gross outlays for 1937—excluding the \$1,103,000,000 carryover for relief but not additional demands to be estimated later—were put at \$4,752,606,370. This compared with \$7,645,301,338 for 1936.

The public debt estimated for next June 30 was \$30,933,375,017. Last January it was forecast at \$34,238,000,000.

Major increases in estimated 1937 expenditures included \$610,000,000 for the social security, rail pension, Guffey coal and other new laws; a \$193,000,000 boost to put national defense funds at a record high; \$228,000,000 more money to make \$405,000,000 available for major public works.

Among decreases was elimination of the annual \$125,000,000 road appropriation; the temporary decline in work relief demands; a year's delay in building the army's enlistment strength of 145,000 men; \$308,000,000 less for the CCC and an absence of new funds for a number of "emergency" activities

such as direct relief and the defunct NRA.

The president's legislative recommendations were few. He did ask repeal of last session's appropriation of a sum equal to 30 per cent of customs receipts to the secretary of agriculture for encouraging the exportation and domestic consumption of agricultural commodities.

Issues of food companies that have paid the processing taxes rallied 1 to 2 points while the so-called farm equities and others fell 1 to 3 or more. The activity was pronounced, transfers approximating 3,000,000 shares. The close was irregular.

HOG PRICES RISE
CHICAGO, Jan. 6. (AP)—An immediate sharp rise in hog prices today followed announcement of the supreme court's decision invalidating the AAA, a provision of which was a \$2.25 per hundred-weight processing tax on swine.

The big Chicago hog market, weak and 25 cents lower early in the day, was spurred into great activity shortly before noon when the court's decision became known. The early top for choice hogs had been \$9.55 but the 25 cents loss was more than recovered in the active buying that closed the market. The late top

was quoted at \$9.75, an advance of 20 cents in an hour.

NEW PLANS HASTENED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (AP)—New farm legislation was projected in congress today only minutes after the new deal's AAA was killed by the supreme court.

Senator McNary, the republican leader, told reporters he would introduce in a few days a substitute providing three optional plans designed to make the tariff effective and raise the farmers' world price for surplus crop.

They are the old export demerit plan, the equalization fee vetoed twice by President Coolidge and the domestic allotment plan.

"None of these require processing taxes, acreage control or benefit payments and all are constitutional in my opinion," McNary said.

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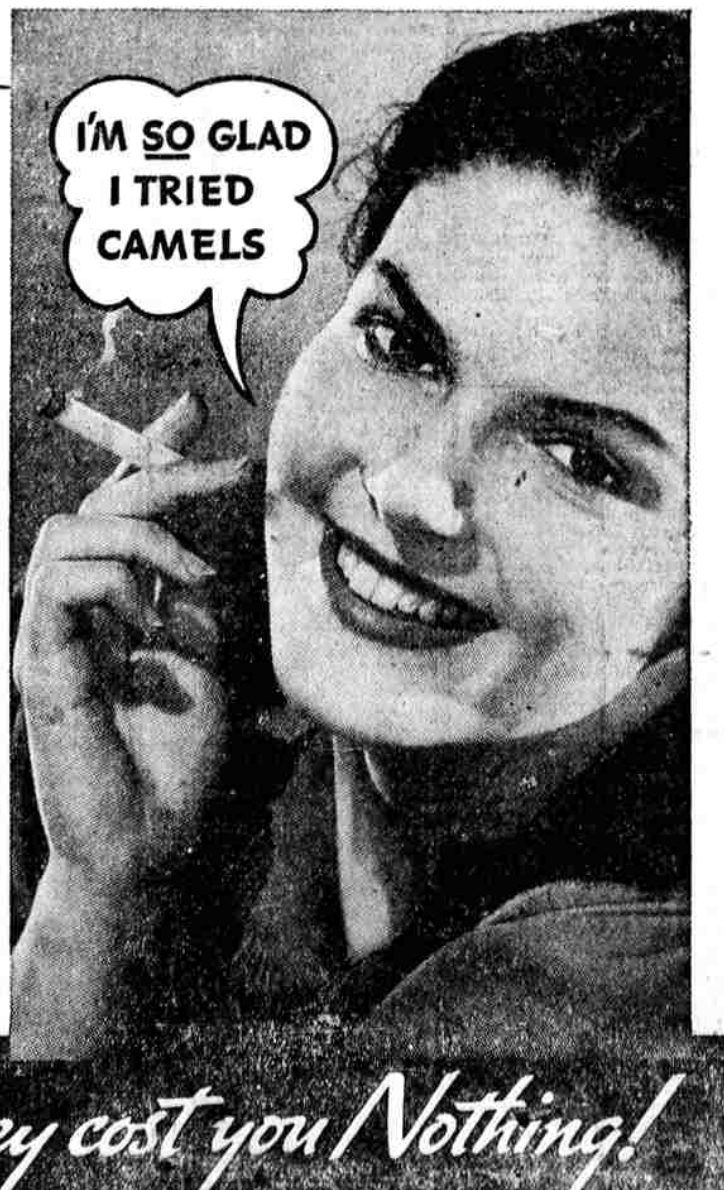
