

COUNTY INCLUDED IN STATE SURVEY

Detailed information regarding administration of local government in Oregon and the financial practices of cities and counties will be assembled in a state-wide survey to be made by the bureau of municipal research of the University of Oregon, it was announced here today by V. B. Stanbery, executive secretary of the Oregon State Planning board, and by Herman Kehrl, director of the university bureau. Klamath Falls and Klamath county will be included in the survey.

The project, which has the approval of the state planning board, has been allotted \$23,082 from the WPA. Kehrl will have charge of the work, which calls for employment of 49 statisticians, accountants, five typists and secretaries, one attorney and two draftsmen. In addition to supervision by Mr. Kehrl and other staff members of the bureau, three non-relief field accountants will be employed.

Workers on the project will be sent to every county in the state to compile information on municipal debt, current receipts and disbursements, administrative organization, services rendered and personnel employed. Local government records will be examined, officials will be interviewed, and the data assembled on a uniform basis so that all municipalities can be compared.

FUTURE FARMER CONTEST STARTED

A farm shop improvement contest is being sponsored by Lloyd Beebe, proprietor of Beebe's Monopoly store, through the Bonanza Future Farmer chapter. A prize of a soldering outfit, consisting of a blow torch, copper, tin snips, acid, solder and flux will be awarded by Beebe to the Future Farmer making the most improvement in his shop at home.

The farm shop is an important part of the farm and there is much need and room for improvement, states William Holloway, agriculture instructor of the Bonanza high school. The improvements to be made by the students include rearranging the shop equipment, installing forging equipment, rebuilding the shop building, building work benches, making cabinets or racks to hold tools and supplies, adding tools and equipment that are needed to do necessary repair work on the farm, and fitting and sharpening farm tools.

The entries of the contest have been judged by Arthur Cole, agriculture instructor from Henley. The shops are judged before the improvements are started and then in May they will be judged again, the amount of improvement noted, and the winner selected.

As this is the first contest of its kind in the state it will be watched with interest by Earl R. Cooley, state supervisor of vocational agriculture, and Professor Clyde Walker of the agriculture engineering department of the Oregon State college.

The Future Farmer boys are pleased with the interest shown by Beebe in the work of the local chapter.

BEND, Jan. 6. (P)—Florence Johnston, 20, Washington State college student returning from a holiday vacation at her home in Stockton, Calif., received fatal injuries in an automobile crash north of here.

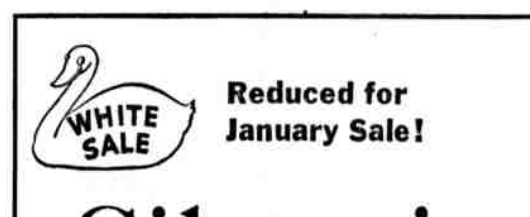

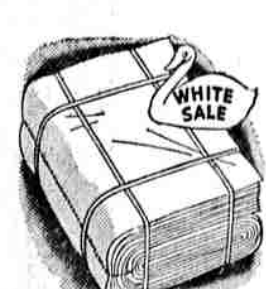
