'EAT MORE BEEF' IS DRIVE'S OBJECTIVE

Safeway store men will start the new year with an intensive campaign to help the cattle industry encourage a greater public consumption of beef—the first farmer-consumer drive of the company for 1936.

Timed almost simultaneously with two national livestock shows to be held in the west during the early part of January, this initial farmer-consumer campaign will be waged from January 11 to 18 and will be backed by the entire resources of Safeway Stores.

Designating the period of the campaign "Beef Week," R. W. Doe, vice-president of Safeway, announced that this new effort to aid the producer of food commodities would be conducted almost jointly with the American National Livestock association's annual convention at Phoenix, Arizona, and at the same time as the National Western Stock Show in Denver, both of which are attended by stockmen in all areas of the country.

The convention in Phoenix will be held from January 7 to 10, while the stock show in Denver has been set for January 11 to 18. Expressions of approval for this new Safeway farmer-consumer campaign were made by various leaders of the cattle industry in special communications to the Safeway company.

MODOC ORDERS STATE LINE ROAD SURVEY

The board of supervisors of Modoc county Monday ordered a preliminary survey in the state line to Cornell section of the Malin-Carby highway, an extension of The Dalles-California highway in California.

This action was simultaneous with the calling for bids for the Merrill-Hatfield section and the Malin-state line section of the Oregon highway system, both part of the south-end pattern of roadways.

The Modoc county board ordered the survey as a completion of the original survey changed with the development of Tulelake.

The Malin-state line section development, according to the roads and highway committee to the chamber of commerce, will give the next allotment of Tulelake homesteaders an outlet to the county seat at Alturas, and trading centers at Tulelake, Malin, Merrill and Klamath Falls.

SEATTLE, Jan. 7. (AP)—Two men suspected of participating in the robbery of the Spokane Montgomery Ward store, December 23, were arrested at a Seattle hotel late Monday and held for questioning by police. The officers seized three automatic pistols and \$1117 in currency in the room. About \$9000 in currency, checks and money orders was taken at Spokane when handits held up the assistant manager of the store.

The men denied any connection with the robbery and insisted they earned the money working in eastern Washington harvest fields.
