

STREET ISSUE RISES TO FIVE MONDAY NIGHT

The battle of Rogers street continued at Monday night's council session, the most important result being the opportunity it afforded for Mayor Willis Mahoney to clear up what he termed a misunderstanding of certain concessions granted the California Oregon Power company in the gross earnings tax ordinance adopted when Mahoney went into office.

Involved in the Rogers street dispute is a fire plug. M. J. Young, whose property is also involved, has been ordered to move a wall that has been built on the street, and in this reconstruction work it appears the fire plug will have to be raised.

Payment of Cost Questioned
The water line was put in on the established grade by Copco. Any change in the plug will have to be paid for by the city or Young, according to Copco's statement to Fire Chief Keith Ambrose, who has been working on the problem. In the gross earnings tax ordinance, it was recalled, it was held Copco would not have to pay for changes of its facilities in case of new grades being established.

Mayor Mahoney called for the ordinance and read that part of it, showing that in the creation of new local improvement districts which changed the grades, the changes in water and power lines to new grades would have to be paid for by the district. The Rogers street change, Mahoney pointed out, has nothing to do with creation of a new local district. The city, he said, should not have to pay for changing the plug.

Dirt Surrounds Plug
The upshot of the Rogers street dispute was a decision to give Young ten days' notice to complete grading the street, and, on advice of the fire chief, to raise the hydrant. At present, according to Chief Ambrose, dirt dumped by Young surrounds the fire plug so it would be almost impossible to use it in case of fire.

Wood Walk Okayed
It was agreed to permit the Big Basin Lumber company to build a temporary sidewalk out of timbers on Main street near its property. Councilman Charles Thomas said he opposed a permanent concrete sidewalk, because of the hope for constructing an underpass at that place.

The council received from Assessor Charles Mack a notice that the city has received \$967.51 in taxes, paid by the Klamath Lumber and Box company, which were an over-charge. He suggested the city make a direct refund. Police Judge Richmond said it would be fairer to the city if the amount of the over-charge were held out of future tax collections on the 1933-34 rolls rather than requiring an outright cash refund.

The matter was referred to the city attorney.

Councilmen received statements from various business houses on Eighth street to the effect that a "mechanical was her woman" there did not make bothersome noises. However, the city fathers expressed concern over the constant blaring of radio loud speakers thereabouts, and asked the police committee to study methods of controlling this " racket."

License Opinion Wanted
Plumbing Inspector O. D. Matthews told the council that a letter it had received, purporting to come from the Master Plumbers' association, had not come from that organization at all, but from one individual firm.

Matthews asked for a council expression on a license problem in connection with the Watters Plumbing company. This company, he said, went out of business in 1935, went into business again in 1936. He wanted to know if a new \$75 license should be required for 1936, or a \$25 old license. Councilmen favored the \$75 license.

Councilmen received and referred to the street committee a petition asking for re-grading a drive on Pleasant street.

BANKS SPONSORING SPEECH CONTEST

This year the public speaking contests will be held by the Future Farmer chapters of Bonanza high school and Henley high school. They will be sponsored by the American National bank and the First National bank of Klamath Falls. The banks will put up \$100 premium money for each chapter.

The purpose of the contests are to help develop speaking ability, as well as knowledge of agricultural topics. The students will be allowed to talk on any agricultural topic they wish. They will be judged on ability to deliver a talk, content of the speech and ability to answer questions about their topic asked by the judges.

There is much interest in the contest this year and the boys are busy preparing their topic so as to have them ready next month.

Part-time school classes in farm mechanics are being held at the Bonanza high school. These classes are open to all out-of-school boys between the ages of 16 and 25 years, who live on farms or make their living from farm work.

The purpose of such classes, states William Holloway, agriculture instructor, is to give those boys who have not had a chance to finish high school or go to college an opportunity to continue their education. The work taken up in these classes include forging, leather work and harness repair, soldering and sheet metal work, tool fitting and sharpening, rope work and wood work.

There is much interest in these classes. They are held every Tuesday and Thursday evening from 7:30 until 9:00 o'clock. Any young fellows interested in the work are invited to attend. There is no charge for the class.

A feature of the rally was the installation of officers of the Senior-Intermediate society of the host church. The installation charge was made by the California secretary.

President Everett Eskate presided at the rally. After Dr. Brown left on the train for California, Dr. Walter L. Myers led the group in a social hour.

Dr. Brown also installed the officers of the Senior-Intermediate society. They were elected at the Christian Endeavor session Sunday, December 29.

Arthur Brooks was re-elected president and will head the group during the coming six months. He had already served one term.

Ruth Metcalf was elected vice-president and Lookout chairman. Olive Clapp was chosen to serve as secretary and Erva Hooper as treasurer. Gene Robinson is the newly-elected song leader.

The committee chairmen were: Prayer meeting, Violette Pearson; social, Ruth Brooks, and missionary, Charles Uhlig.

Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Jones have served as advisers of the organization since its organization, and they were re-elected to serve for the entire year of 1936.
