Too Many New Year's Games?

Coaches See Multiple Bowl Games as New and Serious Problem

Dr. Gus Dorais, head man at the University of Detroit and chairman of the public relations committee of the Coaches' Association, is not sure that there is room in the football setup for imitations of the Rose Bowl game.

"There was some justification for the Rose Bowl game," said Dr. Dorais, who flipped Notre Dame passes to Knute Rockne during their playing days. "It was first in the field. It presents a gigantic spectacle and, as a rule, arouses genuine interest throughout the country. It has gathered a certain amount of tradition.

"A new problem, which is annually becoming more serious, now confronts college football," Dr. Dorais told those attending the coaches' convention in New York. "The problem is the ever-increasing number of bowl games and pre-season charity promotions.

"We now have besides the original Rose Bowl, the Sugar Bowl, Orange Bowl, Sun Bowl, the Feast of the Sun, and the Blue Bonnet." Dr. Dorais later discovered the Dast Bowl in Kansas, and did not bring up the Ice Bowl battle in his own Detroit Stadium between the professional Detroit Lions and New York Giants in mid-December.

"Are those games, promoted by outside interests, a healthy appendage to our college game; or are they, as some contend, a cancerous growth gnawing at the vitals of the gridiron sport?" continued Dr. Dorais.

"Have the colleges the right to permit the exploitation of students in these promotional affairs? Your committee feels that it is time this Coaches' Association defines a policy toward these games."

"Too many teams are pointing for this bowl or that," explained Dr. Dorais. "That places a greater emphasis than ever before upon victory or defeat.

"It is bad psychologically for the players and puts an added burden on the coaches. When a squad has been defeated once, the public, knowing that it has been eliminated from bowl consideration, loses interest. So do the players. They have too little zest for the rest of their schedule even though some of the most important games may be left.

"Things were somewhat different a few years ago. We thought then that one defeat did not necessarily spoil a season. It is harder now to drive that impression home when everybody is talking about teams that have survived as possible choices for the bowl games.

"It is tough enough when only the Rose Bowl was the goal. It is much worse now that New Orleans, Miami, El Paso, Kansas, and other places have followed Pasadena in football promotion.

"The main idea of most bowl games is to advertise climate and winter resorts, to appeal to tourists. I do not understand why college football should furnish the basis for such advertising without getting something back. As far as I can see, football provides the props and gets nothing to offset the criticism that these post-season affairs develop.

"Many people are still antagonistic toward football and these bowl games give them an argument that is hard to answer. None of us can deny that schools, students, and teams are exploited long after they should have settled down to academic routine. What do they get in return? What prestige? What of anything that has been of benefit to the game as a whole?"

How about that fair share of the award, doctor? Dr. Dorais suspects that the

"It is impossible to prolong interest and to focus attention on a half dozen bowl games," points out the Detroit strategist. "Some of them are bound to die off. There aren't enough teams of national importance willing to lend themselves to these promotions.

The Big Ten will have no part of them and neither will Princeton and some of the other eastern schools. That is helpful.

But don't bet that you won't be sitting in front of the radio listening to two or three or more bowl games next New Year's Day.

GILL ADMITS STRONG QUINT

Beavers Get Set to Defend Northern Division Title

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—Coach Stans Gill of Oregon State college cautiously admitted today that his basketball team looks as good, at times, as his last year's champions did in early season.

Then, as if fearing he had said too much, Coach Gill hastily added that he expects every other northern division coach team to be considerably stronger than last season.

All Hivals Stronger "I have reports that University of Washington's team is the best over, and that is mighty good," Gill said. "University of Oregon is much better—tremendous size and manpower. Washington State has a lot of good men. Idaho—always dangerous, and apparently much strengthened."

Two Stars Improve "Palmborg is faster than Hibbard and has more drive. He's smarter this season than last, and mixes 'em up more. Hibbard was more consistent. Palmborg's passing is consistently good, but his scoring is in spurts. If he plays consistently, he will be even greater than Hibbard."

Tuttle, who teams at forward with Palmborg, has shown himself thus far an even better scorer than Hibbard, who tied with Palmborg last year for third highest conference scorer.

Tuttle shows great promise on defense and passing, but isn't up to Hibbard in those departments, Gill said.

Folien, six-foot-seven guard filling Mose Lyman's graduation gap, is about the same defensively as Lyman was, but hasn't the scoring spark. "Lyman has been out three years and couldn't stand the pace the whole season," the Beaver coach said. "but he was the whole scoring spark in the early games when we needed it most. He was a terror on rebounds."

Reserves Come Through Bergstrom, guard, and Conklin, center, both veterans from last year's team, are playing the same consistent ball they did last year, with some improvement in floor play.

Reserves came through with the winning spark in several games last year, but Gill is somewhat concerned over how the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth ranking squad members will perform this season.

Howard Lyman, younger brother of Mose, shows great promise at guard or center. Merryman and Wintermute both have shown well at forward.

Idaho First Foe The Beavers will use the same type of sure-passing, legal blocking offense, playing for a good opening before shooting rather than casting off.

On the set offense Coach Gill plays his guards near the opponent's basket, one in either corner, and the center roaming between them. The forwards are farther out on the court, in position for shooting long shots or for driving in on dribbles or to take feeder passes when plays open.

University of Idaho at Corvallis Friday and Saturday nights opens the conference season for the Beavers.

The Wimbledon champion and Howard Kinsley, former Davis cup player, ran up the total in a practice session of one hour and 15 minutes yesterday.

Both used sharp strokes in the pat ball marathon, which was officially refereed and tabulated. Mrs. Moody had to retrieve a difficult net ball on the 349th stroke.

Kinsley, who ended the session because he had to give a lesson, expressed belief they could do 5,000 unbroken shots in the next try. Eye weariness was the only physical bother, the players said.

Yale Coach Gets "Fish Eye" View of Swim Stars

PORTLAND, Jan. 8, (AP)—There is no danger that a professional football offer will lure Dick Weisberger, star sophomore fullback, from the Willamette university, Paul Schissler said today.

Schissler, former Oregon State college football coach who now leads the Brooklyn Dodgers in the National Professional Football league, said the offer by the Philadelphia professionals to Weisberger was "all a mistake."

"Philadelphia has been misinformed about Weisberger's status in college. That's all," said Schissler.

"Even if somebody back there had a brainstorm and made the offer, knowing Weisberger to be only a varsity sophomore, which I don't for an instant think happened, Spec still would be sitting pretty, because they couldn't get away with it.

"We're not enticing young collegians with varsity competition still ahead of them into professional football. It not only is not done in the professional league, but couldn't be done, even if some manager would like to try it.
