ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—Four employees of the Crown-Willamette Paper company reported windows in their homes were shattered by rocks.

Police attribute the incidents to jurisdictional warfare between the International Sulphite and Paper Makers' union, of which Crown-Willamette employees are members, and the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—Colonel Thomas M. Robins, United States division engineer, announced he recommended against the construction of a proposed breakwater at Seaside and improvement of the Columbia river at Hammond to prevent erosion.

Cost of the projects was declared out of proportion to the probable benefits, Colonel Robins said. Appeals could be filed with the engineers at Washington for the next four weeks.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—The Roseburg chamber of commerce opposes the inclusion of the Diamond Lake area under the national park service and so notified officials in Washington by wire.

The chamber contended national park regulations would result in reducing the number of tourists and campers. The lake area is under the forest service.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—Portland outgoing airmail postage increased 51.94 per cent in 1935 over the previous year, Postmaster E. T. Hedlund reported. The 1935 total was 183,790 pounds.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—Directors of the Janzen Knitting Mills voted a 10-cent dividend on common stock and the regular 17.75 quarterly dividend on cumulative preferred. All directors and officers were re-elected. J. A. Zehnhauser, president, said business was showing a substantial increase.

KLAMATH ROAD BIDS OPENED NEXT FRIDAY

Bids on Klamath county's roads to California and on two grade separation projects on the Lakeview highway will be opened by the state highway commission at its meeting Thursday and Friday in Portland.

Two south-end road projects are on the list. One is for 2.5 miles of grading and surfacing on the Merrill-Hatfield section that will connect The Dalles-California highway with the Alameda highway through the Tululake country, and the other 2.8 miles of surfacing on the Merrill-Hatfield section.

Another project calls for construction of a concrete, steel and timber undercrossing under the Oregon and Eastern railway and 4.8 mile of grading and surfacing on the Lakeview road at Glendale.

Another call for construction of a concrete bridge over the O. and E. and 5.1 mile of grading and surfacing near Dalry.

JUDGE REPORTS ON BOND COLLECTIONS

Police Judge Clifton Richmond announced Tuesday that in 1935 \$140,493.64 was collected from property holders in connection with the city improvement bond program. This amount was exclusive of HOLC payments.

Richmond said that in 1934, when William Vale took over the re-bonding department in Richmond's office, \$109,991.33 was collected. Vale has been at work on the program for about two years, and has started the re-bonding process and pushed payments on assessments.

"People of the city should be reminded they can pay their assessments in installments," said Richmond. "Every person who wants to keep his property should look into this plan."
