NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (AP)—Eddie Collins told the Boston papers the inside of the big deal between the Athletics and the Red Sox.

It began cooking as far back as July 4, when the Macks paid their second visit to the Hub. . . . Mack called on Collins at Fenway park and wrote out a lineup which he said he believed would keep the Beaneaters in the money for some time to come. . . . On the list were several of his own stars. . . . The Sox were hot after Jimmy Foxx, but had given little thought to any of the other outstanding A's.

Mack admitted his club owed money. . . . He told Collins if he could get enough from the Sox to satisfy those obligations they could have more than the one million. . . . This put an idea into Collins' head. . . . He went into a huddle with Tom Yawkey and Joe Cronin, with the result that Yawkey promptly visited his bank. . . . The deal might have been closed sooner, but for Mack's reluctance to give up Johnny Marcum.

Cronin is scratching his head trying to decide how to line up his remodeled Sox. . . . With Eric McNair on deck at third, Cronin will play short again. . . . That leaves the fleet Bill Werber as the problem. . . . Cronin may convert Werber into an outfielder, but even then he doesn't know where to squeeze him in.

With Roger Cramer and Heinie Manush sure of the center and left field jobs, Werber would have to battle it out for the right field patrol with Skinny Brahman, Mel Almada and Dusty Cooke. . . . All five regular outfielders are left-hand hitters, which may react in Werber's favor.

Cronin Mack may part with another headliner before the clubs trek south. . . . All winter they had him selling Third Sacker Pinkie Higgins to the Yanks. . . . The Yanks would like to have Higgins, but not for \$100,000 and five players. . . . The five men

OREGON LISTED AS DARKHORSE

Webfoots Will Put Big, Fast Team Into Conference Play.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 9 (AP)—Good big men—including some of the greatest individual stars in the school's history—will pursue championship golf on up and down the basketball court for University of Oregon this season.

Whether the crew, with a new coach, a new system of play and a number of transfers, can develop enough consistent team play in one season to be a steady winner, is one of the hottest questions in northern division Coast conference circles.

Tallest on Record

Coach Howard Hobson, who brought virtually all of his last year's great team with him from Southern Oregon Normal, has the tallest basketball squad ever assembled in Oregon.

One combination averages six feet five, while the squad average is six feet two. Only two go under six feet, and not much.

The booming, fast-breaking, shoot-and-follow style of play, Hobson's giants employ promises many a spectacular court battle.

In early season play his team has been erratic at times, but when clicking it rolled up points so fast that it won 12 of 14 pre-conference tilts.

Team Loses Two

The defeats were a 47 to 46 decision to Rice's All-stars of Eugene in the opener, and a 29 to 21 licking by Willamette university. The Webfoots have had to come from behind three times for victories, but the big fellows seem able to increase their speed near the end of a game, if necessary.

Biggest and braviest of the regulars is Ward "Boomer" Howell, six feet six transfer, who averaged around 12 points a game in three years at Southern Oregon Normal. He reaches a few inches higher than the basket when leaping in for some of his crissle shots. It's a terrific task to guard this 220-pound Goliath without fouling him, and he's a dead eye at dumping them in from gift lane.

Howell will play center some, but usually forward, for the best jumper on the squad is Chuck Patterson, six feet two, a negro flash who does everything with ease and perfection.

Jones at Forward

He and Howell have been leading scorers thus far, even out-pointing Willie Jones, last year's all-conference center who was second highest scorer in the league. Jones still picks up plenty of points from his new forward position, thanks to his uncanny whirly shots and six feet four inches of height.

An even more clever passer than the action-bristling Patterson is Sam Liebowitz, who flips the ball behind his back or from any angle with the ease of a school boy spinning a yo-yo. A veteran from last year's team which won third place in the league, Liebowitz is a fine scorer and one of the best on the squad at setting up plays.

Hobson's Record Good

The other guard post will be filled by Clifford "Chief" McLean, a Sioux Indian transfer, or Ronald Rourke, long-shot pinch hitter from last year's squad, or John Lewis, another veteran. Still another guard is Bill Courtney, the midget of the squad at five feet ten.

Ken Purdy from Long Beach junior college, Wayne Scott from Southern Oregon Normal, and Dave Silver, six-foot-four sophomore left-handers, alternate at the forward berth.

Silver also takes his turn at center, along with Ray Jewell.

Camp Bonanza Beats Tulelake Three-C Five

BONANZA, Jan. 9.—The fast traveling Camp Bonanza quintet added another win to its string of victories when they scored a one-sided 30-8 triumph over Camp Tule Lake in a CCC league game played at the Bonanza high school Tuesday night.

Determined to get into the championship running after a surprise defeat by Camp Bly several weeks ago, the Bonanza cagers started with a rush, and were never headed from the opening whistle.

With the regulars of Camp Bonanza exhibiting a flawless defense which held their rivals to one field goal in the first half, the Cubs led at half time 16-2.

In the second half every man on the squad saw action, but this failed to hinder the rampaging Tree Troopers who scored freely to win 30-8.

"Slim" Alch was the scoring star of the game, hanging up 13 points.

Shades of Roy Riegels famous Rose Bowl run were recalled when Fleisherpass, Tule Lake center, obligingly tallied a basket for Bonanza in the second half.

GOLF RECORDS HAPPY SEASON

Year of 1935 Notable for Increase of Women Players

(This is another in a series written especially for the Associated Press by national sports leaders on results of 1935 and prospects for 1936.)

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—One of the most notable developments during 1935 was the tremendous increase of women golfers. It is safe to predict that with a definite upturn in business conditions and serious application of the teaching efforts of professionals to women players, we can look for the development of some outstanding players of championship calibre within the next two years.

Parks Stands Out

The most remarkable individual performance of 1935 was the play of Sam Parks, Jr., in the national open championship. The winning of this event by such a youngster and a comparative newcomer to tournament golf, together with the winning of the P. G. A. title by Johnny Revolta, another of the younger boys, has stirred up much keen rivalry and enthusiasm among the younger professionals. Thus our veterans must produce their best to hold their places.

During the past year the Professional Golfers' association instituted a new service to the golf clubs—at no cost to them—which is proving exceedingly popular with club members and which will ultimately spread its benefits to all American golfers. This service is that of a consultant architect. He is A. W. Tillingham, a man who has had many years of experience in constructing and remodeling courses.

Golf Future Bright

He calls on the clubs, goes over the course and offers advice and suggestions on construction problems and needs for improvement. Through this service we hope to make the game more enjoyable by eliminating or correcting many of the traps and hazards known as "duffers' headaches," which will, in most cases, also reduce the cost of upkeep.

With the popularity and soundness of the game of the present amateur champion (Lawson Little) I believe that amateur golf will fast raise itself to the high place it held when Jones was king. Golf is being added to the sports program of practically all of the larger schools and many of the small ones. In fact, boys and girls are manifesting so much enthusiasm for the game I predict that within the next two years there will be a national junior championship.

Going from the very young to the "quite old," the P. G. A. will sponsor a national senior's championship this year for professionals 40 years of age and over. This event will bring into competition men who have contributed much to the game and who are greatly responsible for its growth in this country. The place and date of the tournament will be announced later.

Freshmen Winners over Wendling

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 9 (AP)—The University of Oregon freshmen opened their basketball season with a 59 to 37 win over Wendling Cardinals.

Laddie Gale, six-foot-five forward, led the frosh with 15 points. High scoring honors, however, went to Wicks, Wendling guard.

Big Opportunity Seen this Year for Snow Sports

Cities and larger communities of western Oregon and Washington are convinced that winter sports development holds great possibilities for local enjoyment and for advertising the north-west, according to a recent U. S. forest service report covering ski run improvements on the national forests.

The report shows that from Klamath Falls and Medford, Oregon, on the south to Hellingham, Washington, on the north, the Cascade mountain national forest area is becoming dotted with ski runs built by the forest service or by winter sports organizations cooperating with the service.

As far east as Pendleton and Walla Walla, the snow sport germ has made inroads with the result that forest service directed CCC labor has completed a winter playground area with appropriate building accommodations in the Blue mountains, say forest officials.

Among the organizations interested in winter sports development are the Klamath Clanmen, the Rogue Snow Men, the Skyliners at Bend, the Obladians at Eugene, the Chemekutsans of Salem, the Portland Winter Sports' association, containing some 20 organizations, the Silver Star ski club at Vancouver, Washington, the Yakima Sports Club, the Leavenworth Winter Sports club, the Seattle Ski club, the Washington Alpine club, the Mountaineers, and other associated clubs of Seattle, the Mount Baker Ski club, the Olympic Peninsula Winter Sports' club, and various Tacoma organizations.
