

SOUTH SIXTH WALK PROJECT STARTS MONDAY

Work starts Monday on construction of a gravel sidewalk on South Sixth street, from the city limits to the bridge beyond Altamont. This is a WPA project, sponsored by the county, in the hope of reducing the number of accidents that have occurred when automobiles struck pedestrians on this heavily traveled street.

The sidewalk will be six feet wide, except at the fairgrounds, where it will be 10 feet wide. It will be constructed on the north side of the street.

About 20 men will be employed on this project.

Under CWA a sidewalk was built from the viaduct along South Sixth street to the city limits. The new walk will connect with this work.

About 150 men are at work in Altamont on the WPA drainage project, and 60 are employed in similar work at Stewart-Lenox addition.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC SCHEDULE CHANGED

"The Shasta" and "Klamath," early next month, will be operated as separate and independent trains between Portland and San Francisco according to an announcement made today by J. A. Ormandy, General Passenger Agent, Southern Pacific.

Under this plan, the present consolidation of these trains between Portland and Eugene and between Dunsmuir and San Francisco will be discontinued. This increase of trains will greatly improve the through service between the Pacific Northwest and California.

Southbound, "The Shasta," will leave Portland at 8:15 a. m., arriving San Francisco at 9:50 next morning. "The Klamath" will leave Portland at 8:40 a. m. and arrive San Francisco at 7:50 the next morning, thereby reducing the morning schedule between the two points by approximately 2 hours and 30 minutes.

Northbound, "The Shasta," will leave San Francisco at 6:00 p. m., arriving Portland at 7:15 the next evening. "The Klamath" will leave San Francisco at 9:00 p. m. and arrive Portland at 8:20 the following evening.

Early next summer, Ormandy further announced, both of these trains will be fully air-conditioned. This is part of the program of the Southern Pacific for air conditioning coaches, tourist and standard sleepers, diners and observation cars in all of the principal arteries of the system in anticipation of increased tourist traffic during the coming summer. Ormandy said further that the company is well satisfied with the public response to their program for air-conditioning passenger cars, which was started a year ago.

Timber Cruiser Shot to Death

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10. (AP)—Myron T. Hueltel, 77, a transient timber cruiser, was shot to death here today, and police arrested Laura E. Stevens, 55, with whom he had been living.

Police Lieutenant Ben Wade said Miss Stevens told him Hueltel had refused to marry her and that he criminally attacked her a year ago. Wade said the woman held a pistol to her head and that he pushed it away just as the weapon discharged. "The bullet imbedded itself in the wall. Wade's hands were burned by the discharge.

F. R. OPPOSITION STILL MOUNTING

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—An increased percentage of voters in the Literary Digest's poll were reported today as having registered opposition to President Roosevelt's New Deal.

The Digest said its count shows 1,044,948 of the 1,658,462 votes cast were against the administration's policies.

The negative vote, amounting to 61.89 per cent, was 1.42 points larger than its total a week ago. Representing a total of 531 electoral votes, 36 states are listed in the Digest's tabulation as having majorities opposed to the Roosevelt program. The other 12 are Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North and South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, and Virginia.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10. (AP)—Attorney Lee Boyer, acting for the estate of the late William Lulloff, filed suit here for \$110,000. The case resulted from the death of 22 persons who drank "dehorn" in 1924.

Boyer was named administrator for the estates of 21 of the victims. Defendants include drug stores, a paint company and employees of the firms which allegedly sold denatured alcohol.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 10. (AP)—Election of a "Little Colonel," a co-ed chosen by the University of Oregon, as guest of honor at the Scabbard and Blade military ball here Saturday night recurred the condemnation of the Y. M. C. A. council.

LOAN ASSOCIATION MEETING JAN. 14

All local farmers who are members and stockholders of the Klamath Falls National Farm Loan association are urged by Secretary-Treasurer R. H. Dunbar to attend the annual business meeting of their organization at 130 S. Fifth street, on January 14 at 1:30 o'clock.

Stockholding members will receive a full report on the operations of their association during

the past year and will elect their board of directors for 1936. Each member is entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned, but no shareholder may cast more than 20 votes regardless of the number of shares held.

"The success of any cooperative enterprise depends a lot on how well informed its members are," Dunbar points out. "That is why we hope all stockholders will attend their annual meeting and take full part in the proceedings."

The Klamath Falls National Farm Loan association is the local cooperative business organization through which farmers obtain long-term mortgage loans from the Federal Land Bank at

Spokane. Member-borrowers own stock in their association on the basis of on \$5 share for each \$100 borrowed, and the association in turn has a corresponding investment in the capital stock of the Land bank. The stock is pledged as additional security to loans which the association approves.

In this cooperative way, 103 member-borrowers have obtained approximately \$414,150.00 in mortgage loans through the association on favorable repayment terms at low actual cost.
