- A Code for Dog Fanclers 1—Color all your work with a deep love for dogs. 2—Welcome the novice, for you yourself knew as little as he. 3—Win with a smile; lose with a smile. 4—Beware of him who is quick to find fault. 5—Seek business, but not by taking it away from a competitor. 6—Mind your own business rather than somebody else's. 7—When you lose, breed better dogs and come back with them, to win. 8—Say nothing rather than speak ill of another kennel or breed. 9—Show in yourself the same sportsmanship you demand of others. 10—Be the god your dogs think you are. Breeders' Code (The ten commandments of correct breeding of dogs) 1—I will give chief attention to the bitch. 2—I will study grandparents rather than parents. 3—I will keep full breeding records. 4—I will put away culls and weaklings at birth. 5—I will interpret a pedigree not by names and titles but by breeding facts. 6—I will never breed a shy or excessively nervous dog, nor sell nor give away such dog. 7—I will not pay any attention to breeding superstitions. 8—I will honor the bred-by-exhibitor class winner most of all. 9—I will judge a stud or matron by the offspring. 10—I will breed dogs for dis-

position as well as for physical perfection. STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Jan. 11. (UP)—Stanford opened its 1936 basketball season with a resounding 44 to 30 victory over the Rany Bruins of U. C. L. A. Friday. The southerners' five man defense cracked badly under the pressure of the Cardinals' fast breaking offense, and Angelo "Hank" Luisetti, star forward, and his running mate, Turner, smashing through to take set-up shots time and again. The game went scoreless for four minutes in the opening period, but Luisetti, sharpshooting ace of the Stanford five, suddenly found the range and dropped through six points in a space of a minute.

Oregon State Takes Conference Opener By 30-26 Score

CORVALLIS, Jan. 11. (UP)—Oregon State college's basketball team, defending northern division champion, outpaced a determined University of Idaho team and won the 1936 coast conference opener Friday, 31 to 24. Neither team displayed a consistent attack or defense. There were many wild passes and inaccurate shots at the basket. After a jittery first half, which ended with the Stators leading 12 to 8, Idaho tied the score at 12-all on two free throws and a one-handed field goal from the corner by Wally Geraghty, who was the outstanding Vandal player.

This was when the second half was only two minutes old. Earl Conkling, O. S. C. center, put his team ahead again with a shot off the backboard, but Bert Larson, Idaho forward, knotted the score at 14-all a second later when he took a long pass from Geraghty and tallied. Although the Vandals kept doggedly on the heels of the Stators until the final five minutes, they were unable to get abreast again. Cliff Folen, tall O. S. C. guard, pulled the game out of the fire midway in the second half with two quick field goals that gave State a five-point lead. Folen was high scorer with 10. Geraghty got 5.

SEATTLE, Jan. 10. (UP)—University of Washington opened its coast basketball season tonight with a close but slow victory over Washington State college, 39 to 25. The Huskies were ahead throughout, except for a brief period in the second half, when the Stators grabbed a 19-15 lead. The half ended 16 to 15 for Washington. High point man was Egge, Washington guard, with eight. Lovelich, Washington forward, and Nelson, Cougar center, scored seven each. The Huskies played the game without a substitution.

Detroit Woman Given Permit as Promoter

DETROIT, Jan. 11. (AP)—Michigan's only woman boxing promoter received her license this week from the state athletic board of control and posted her motto: "Never a Postponement." The new promoter is Mrs. Frank Erno, who inherited the business and the slogan from her husband, the late Frank Erno, who had arranged boxing and wrestling cards here for the last five years. During that time Mrs. Erno was his business manager, selling tickets, computing the gladiators' percentages, and writing the checks. When Erno died recently after scheduling a fight, his widow made a prompt decision.

Willamette Highway Allocated \$215,000

PORTLAND, Jan. 11. (UP)—Expenditure of \$1,160,000 on the Oregon forest highway construction program for the fiscal year beginning July 1 was agreed upon Friday by the state highway commission, the United States forest service and the federal bureau of public roads. Of the sum, \$980,000 will be federal forest money and \$180,000 state funds. Allotments to highways were: Willamette, \$215,000; Fremont, \$100,000; Pendleton-John Day, \$85,000; Tiller-Trail, \$95,000; John Day-Burns, \$750,000; South Santiam, \$100,000; North Santiam, \$100,000; Weston-Elgin, \$175,000; Salmon River, \$215,000.

Lewis Triumphs Over Jack Fox in Seattle Bout

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 11. (AP)—A knockout victory under his belt for his first 1936 test, John Henry Lewis looked confidently over the field today for challengers for his light-heavyweight ring crown. The champion, from Phoenix, Ariz., looked the titleholder's part last night in knocking out Tiger Jack Fox, Cagoy Spokane negro veteran, in the third round. The bout was scheduled for 10 rounds. Lewis weighed 175, three pounds over the class limit. His title was not at stake. Fox weighed 180.

Louis, Retzlaff Nearly Ready for Chicago Battle

CHICAGO, Jan. 11. (AP)—This was the day for Joe Louis and Charley Retzlaff to demonstrate for members of the Illinois State Athletic commission that they are reaching proper condition for their 15 round battle at the Chicago stadium Jan. 17. The official group, Chairman Joseph E. Trainer, Commissioner Patrick McFarland and Inspector Harold Ryan, had appointments to watch both boxers do their stuff. Retzlaff was first on the program, with the negro star providing the second act. Retzlaff continued to hammer sparring partners yesterday, while Louis took another holiday. Retzlaff did damage when he landed, but appeared to lack speed. He put in a long day, boxing six rounds with three stooges and did the equivalent to four more rounds with the bags. The Leonard, N. D., slugger will rest tomorrow, but will return to heavy duty Monday when he plans to do 12 rounds. He weighed 194 pounds, the figure at which his management intends to have him enter the ring, before yesterday's drill. Louis, never far out of condition, has taken things easy. He weighs only a few pounds over 200, and may go into action scaling as much as 203. He has devoted much of his training to polishing up an effective defense. He has not, however, neglected to deal out plenty of punishment to his sparring partners. Louis will receive 37 1/2 per cent of the receipts, which would amount to about \$31,000 if a capacity attendance shows up. Retzlaff who gets 17 1/2 per cent, expects to take down his biggest purse, around \$10,000.

Matanuska Colony Under Quarantine

PALMER, Alaska, Jan. 11. (UP)—Two cases of smallpox, threatening an epidemic, Friday placed the Matanuska valley agricultural colony under tight quarantine. Two laborers on buildings of the community center were stricken with the disease and isolated by Dr. Earle Albrecht. The physician ordered schools closed and meetings banned until all danger is passed. No one may leave the valley unless immunized. Dr. Albrecht said he did not anticipate an epidemic, but was taking precautionary measures. A native bush of Ethiopia, called n'gabrowe, has a root, which when dried, ground, and mixed with tobacco, will kill the smoker who takes more than three puffs.

Pepper Martin May Be Forced to Quit Jobs

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 11. (AP)—Pepper Martin, St. Louis Cardinal whose latest role is that of official of an ice hockey team, may have to cut down his extracurricular activities or take less baseball pay. He was expected to talk today to Sam Breadon, Cardinal president, about his salary for 1936. They had several things to settle, mainly relative to Martin's interests aside from baseball. Martin, third-baseman, outfielder, extra-base clown, bag puffer and general enthusiasm promoter for the Cards, has varied his activities just as widely off the baseball lot. His reputation as a hunter nearly approaches his diamond fame, and fall and winter he plays both basketball and football. He was once an amateur boxer and last season he entered the racing game as owner of a midget automobile. He is now in St. Louis with the Oklahoma City Warriors hockey club as vice-president and general manager. It was understood Cardinal officials were more opposed to his midget racing activity than to hockey. General Manager Branch Rickey also declared recently Martin would have to take a drastic pay cut if he divided his interests as he did last season. Martin's salary, not announced, was believed in baseball circles to be between \$7500 and \$9000. Last night Pepper asserted he was unaware of the ball club's attitude. "Baseball is my first love, and I'm sticking to it before anything else," he said.

1936 MAT YEAR OPENS TUESDAY

Six Wrestlers Gathered For First Card Of Season

Wrestling talent from near and far gathers at the Army Tuesday night to introduce the season of 1936. From as distant points as New York and Japan, Mack Lillard, Klamath Falls promoter, has signed six heavyweights for the three one-hour matches of the new year. Three of the athletes won followings last season; three will be new to the Klamath fans. Dude Chick, Oklahoma cowboy, has been selected to meet Ken Hollis, the "mosaic" from Arkansas. Chick, a light heavyweight, is particularly noted for his unique leg scissor holds. More scientific than his opponent and possessing considerably more speed, the Oklahoman's chief difficulty will be in avoiding Hollis' roughness. Once more Klamath Falls will be entertained by Shinnchi Shikuma, the jiu jitsu performer from Japan. Shikuma, who defeated Frankie Peck several weeks ago, will meet Tiger Taskoff, a veteran grappler from Bulgaria. Style of wrestling for the first fall will be determined by a flip of a coin. The style will be shifted for the second fall, and the third will be determined by the wrestler who gained his first fall in the swiftest time. Training carefully for the opening bout, Peck of San Francisco was popularly favored to defeat Taskoff of New York. The Australian rule system will be used for this clash.
