News of Oregon

EUGENE, Jan. 11, (AP)—The American Legion is "the great stabilization force of the 20th century," State Legion Commander George Koehn told the Eugene chamber of commerce. He assailed the statement that the Legion was "Public Enemy Number 1," assertedly made here recently by Lucy Norton, head of the history department of the Oswego Normal school, New York.

PORTLAND, Jan. 11, (AP)—Increased production at state game hatcheries and farms appeared in prospect today as a result of the game commission's action in allocating funds for such projects.

The commission, in session here yesterday, adopted a 1936 budget of \$445,452.49 and moved to expend \$49,030 on a game bird program and \$55,520 for hatcheries.

Of the bird project, the \$17,239 was not aside for the re-establishment of the Corvallis game farm for pheasants and partridges, \$10,000 for the Corvallis water supply at the Pendleton farm and \$2,500 for general improvements at the Eugene hatcheries.

Two new chicken houses at Eugene, to be managed by Superintendent of Farms Gene M. Simpson, will be utilized for raising hens for setting.

Commissioner E. E. Wilson said the Corvallis farm will be "a model of scientific production." It is to be entirely self-sufficient.

The commission approved plans for a joint meeting with the fish commission and the state's catfishermen in Portland March 13.

Chairman Dexter Rice and Commissioner George Aiken were delegated to attend the wild life conference at Washington, D. C., February 3 to 7.

Criminal Action
Held Warrant Case
In Hewitt Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11, (UP)—The district attorney's office has gathered sufficient data on the sterilization of Ann Cooper Hewitt, unwilling "duckling" heiress, to approve issuance of a warrant charging mayhem in the case, it was announced Friday.

Assistant District Attorney August Fourtner, after a conference with Police Inspector George Engler and District Attorney Matthew Brady, announced the decision.

Fourtner said the office would approve issuance of a warrant naming Ann's mother, Mrs. Maryon Cooper Hewitt McFarler, Dr. Tilton Tillman, who approved the operation, and Dr. Samuel Boyd, who performed it. The warrant apparently would not name Mrs. Mary Scally, state psychiatrist, who gave Ann tests which assertedly established the fact she was "feeble minded."

Authorities expressed the opinion that it now is "up to Ann" to cause a criminal complaint in the case.

Sloan Announces
Figures on Tax

Approximately 67 1/2 per cent of taxes due in 1935 were paid, according to a compilation made Saturday by Allen Sloan, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collection. The remainder are delinquent.

Total amount charged for the year was \$1,500,676.11. Gross collections aggregated \$1,014,133.91. Net collections totaled \$988,192.68.

The amount delinquent is \$485,833.19.

The first tax paying deadline in 1936 is on March 15.

MARK OF \$10,000

Loans in excess of \$10,000 for building and modernization of homes were made during the month of December by the First Federal Savings and Loan association of Klamath Falls, according to C. S. Robertson, secretary-treasurer of the association.

Steady increases in the amounts of loans are predicted for the coming months, due to the activities of the Federal Housing Administration. Robertson stated Saturday. Demands for money for building and modernization have been on the up grade now for some time and will continue to be so, according to authorities.

The First Federal Savings and Loan Association of this city will hold its annual meeting and election on January 22, at which time three new directors will be elected.

Present officers are: Charles I. Roberts, president; Walter Locke, vice president; C. S. Robertson, secretary-treasurer; and Charles I. Roberts, Walter Locke, Glen Hout, Clifford Richmond, C. S. Robertson, E. W. Vannice, Percy Evans, Henry Seman and Alfred Collier, directors.

During November alone, \$51 federal savings and loan associations in all parts of the United States made new home loans to a total of \$10,747,922, an amount sufficient to finance the building of 2700 dwellings carrying an average mortgage loan of \$1,000, according to an official release.
