

Klamath Conquers Two Chief District Foes

MEDFORD NEXT FOR PELICANS

Team Comes Through With Wins Over Bend and Redmond.

Conquering their two chief foes in this basketball district, the Klamath Pelicans were well on their way to a successful defense of their championship.

Hardly considered to have more than an even break in the north against Redmond and Bend, the Pelicans came through to sparkling victories Friday and Saturday nights.

Bend, strongest rival in the section, was brushed aside Friday, 32 to 29. The team went up to Redmond Saturday to win, 32 to 28.

Although these contests by no means determine the district title, the result clearly indicates that Dwight French, coach, has brought up his young and inexperienced players into a snappy combination.

Old rivalry with the Medford Tigers will be resumed here both Friday and Saturday nights at the high school gymnasium.

Medford is not a district foe, but the annual series is regarded by the Pelicans as one of the high lights of the season.

The Pelicans of Klamath Falls, in a flashing display of speedy floor work and accurate hoop-ringing, smashed a strong Redmond high school basketball team to 39-26 defeat here Saturday night.

From the opening whistle, it was apparent that Redmond's cause was a hopeless one. Sparked by Reginato, who accounted for 13 points, the Klamath regulars ran up a 15-2 lead in the first quarter.

Thereafter the Pelicans eased in, with subs holding Redmond sufficiently in check to insure a comfortable victory. Score at the half was 25 to 9.

Even Klamath Coach Dwight French was elated by his boys' performance. He said they looked far better than in their 32-29 victory over Bend Friday night and that he believed they had at last come into their own.

Boxers Enter Closing Days of Workouts

CHICAGO, Jan. 13. (AP)—Joe Louis and Charley Retzlaff turned today into the stretch drive of preparation for their 15 round battle Friday night in the Chicago stadium.

Louis, who put in his best day yesterday since he started training more than a week ago, planned another stiff drill today. Retzlaff was given his first holiday yesterday, but was to do the equivalent to 12 rounds today.

The lethal punching Detroit negro opened up with flashes of his best speed yesterday at the expense of three sparring partners, Otis Thomas, Tom Jones and Tiger Henderson. Thomas stopped numerous left hooks to the body. A left hook to the head dropped Jones, while Henderson got off easy when Louis switched to defense tactics.

Louis' training showed need of polishing up, but his showing was immensely improved over anything he had exhibited in previous workouts for the bout. His trainer, Jack Blackburn, said he will be at top form by Friday.

SALEM, ASTORIA GAINING FAVOR

Fishermen, Senators Top List of State Hoop Contenders.

By The Associated Press The Salem and Astoria high basketball teams suffered defeats the past week, but it's a one to two bet that one of the teams wins the state championship.

For 14 state tournaments held, half have gone to these schools, with each winning four. Little Wheeler high defeated a crippled Astoria team 34 to 21, but the Fishermen came back Saturday to defeat Jefferson high, one of Portland's best, by a 29 to 26 score and avenge a previous defeat of this season. Ted Sarpola, all-state forward, was back in the Astoria lineup.

Ashland Downs Salem Salem, which like Astoria is a good tournament team, beat Mill City 49 to 15, lost to Medford 18 to 22, beat Ashland 39 to 17, and then wilted Saturday night and lost to Ashland 23 to 16. Despite the in-and-out showing, Salem is enthusiastic over the big men Coach Hollis Huntington has assembled. All but one of the regulars are six feet or taller, in contrast to recent Salem teams.

Medford forced to the limelight with its win over Salem and a 24 to 16 win over Weed, Calif. Marshfield came to the front in the Coos Bay region by a 35 to 28 win over Hanson, which had beaten Coquille 30 to 20. Marshfield also beat Riverston 33 to 13.

Pelicans Win Two Pendleton impressed with a 36 to 27 win over Baker. Coach Dwight French's Klamath Pelicans gobbled up Bend high 32 to 29 and trimmed Redmond 39 to 26. Springfield handed Albany its first defeat, 30 to 27.

Russ Rarey's Tillamook Chessmakers continued their long string of victories by beating Oregon City 27 to 25. The Portland prep league opening comes Friday night when all eight teams swing into action at once with great fanfare. Five and possibly six of the Portland teams are rated stronger than last year.

Many Teams Improve Benson, last year's champion, is rather weaker, but Coach Leonard Gherke of Jefferson says his last year's runners-up probably will be stronger.

Coach Dave Wright, whose Lincoln team finished third, says his team will be weaker, but other coaches won't believe it. Prospects are not even as good—if that's possible—for Roosevelt, last year's cellar team.

Bonanza Defeats Sprague River

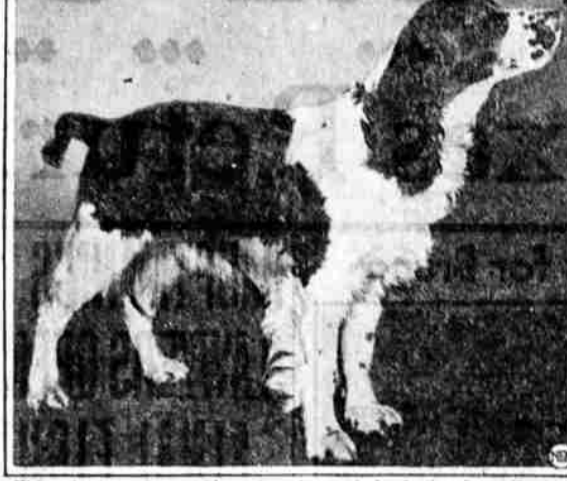
Bonanza gained a 52 to 34 victory over Sprague River in a game played on the Sprague River floor.

Oregon's booming Giants play last tonight and tomorrow night to University of Idaho, twice beaten over the weekend, by Oregon State, in coast conference, northern division clashes.

The Al Spina—Little Dempsey, 10-round featherweight boxing match in Portland Tuesday night drew more than passing interest. Fans likewise were eager for the semi-windup on the same card, bringing together Otto Blackwell and Billy Lee, last mixing lightweights.

Whitman college, last year's northwest conference champion, opens the 1936 championship race against Pacific University at Forest Grove tonight and tomorrow night, and then plays Multnomah club at Portland Wednesday night.

Willamette University entertains Monmouth normal at Salem tonight and then journeys to Ashland to meet Southern Oregon normal Friday and Saturday nights. University of Portland plays at College of Puget Sound tonight and tomorrow night, and at Lindfield college Thursday night.

The Portland Buckaroos open the stretch drive for the northwestern ice hockey league championship when they play the Vancouver Lions here Thursday night.

Winter sports activity is increasing throughout the state and entries have started sliding in for the Pacific Northwest open ski tournament of the Cascade Ski club on Mount Hood, January 26.

WASHINGTON, BEAVERS LEAD

Teams Make Flying Starts in Northern Division Race.

SEATTLE, Jan. 13. (AP)—Oregon State college and Washington have sounded a warning that they again intend to fight it out for the northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball championship.

That was the size-up of the hoop situation in that region today after the Beavers and Huskies opened the season with double victories Friday and Saturday. Oregon State defeated Idaho at Corvallis, 31 to 24 and 45 to 19, and Washington downed Washington State at Seattle, 30 to 26 and 40 to 23.

O. S. C. Starts Strongly Last year Oregon State nosed out Washington for the northern crown, but lost in the playoff with Southern California for the Pacific Coast title.

The "dark horse" Oregon Webfoots moved into play against Idaho at Eugene tonight for a chance to prove their strength in a two-game series. A double win for Oregon would virtually eliminate Idaho from the race, even at this early date, and would send the Webfoots into a tie with Oregon State and Washington.

Huskies Down W. S. C. While the defending champion O. S. C. team was running away with its game against Idaho Saturday night, Washington was forced to come from behind to conquer Washington State. The Cougars got off to a 1 lead in the first five minutes, but they were able to count only one more point before the half, while Washington's big guns were firing for 20 more points.

The Huskies easily held the advantage through the second half with substitutes taking over the chores in the last 19 minutes.

The Huskies played a close-checking, fast game, leading by a wide margin after midway in the first period.

Washington State jumped into an early lead and ran it up to 8 to 1 in the first three minutes. Then Washington's attack clicked, and the Cougars scored only one free throw before the half, which ended 21-9.

In the second period, with more substitutes in the game, Washington scored 19 points and the Staters 12. Last night Washington won 30 to 26.

Touring Golfers Heading North for More Purses

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 13. (AP)—Touring golfers turned toward Northern California today, with young Jimmy Hines, newly crowned king of the Los Angeles \$5,000 open, leading the brigade.

Hines, a strapping, free swinging professional from Garden City, Long Island, won the Los Angeles \$5,000 trophy, and what was probably more important to him, \$1,500 in cash, with a par 72-hole score of 280.

It was his second straight win in Southern California winter tournaments. The Sunday before he took the Riverside \$3,000 open with an eight stroke margin.

His victory yesterday, turned in before a gallery of 5,000, was closer, and for a time, doubtful, came back with a last round 3 strokes up on Henry Picard, Hershey, Pa. Hines faltered under the strain of earlier sub par shooting. He dropped four strokes when he hooked into traps on the 14th, 16th and 18th, and finished with a card for the tournament of 69-68-69-74—280.

Picard, tied with Hines at the start of the championship round, hit a similar streak of misfortune, and wound up with a 284 to 46 for second and third place money with Jimmy Thomson, long driving pro from Ridgewood, N. A. They split \$1,300.

Vic Ghozzi, Deal, N. J., the defending champion, who was a sensation in the first round and a disappointment in the second, came back with a 72-69 in the final 18 for a 251.

Even with him was Mark Fry, young Oakland, Calif., pro, leading west coast contender for the big purse. The two divided \$700.
