LEGION POST TO WORK FOR MUSEUM HERE

The Klamath post of the American Legion has taken up a study of the problem of giving Klamath Falls an adequate museum, it was announced Monday by Tom Young, post commander.

Availability of locating the museum and the chamber of commerce headquarters in the same building is being considered by the committee, Young said.

"There would be many advantages to such an arrangement," the post commander pointed out.

"For one thing, the chamber of commerce is the place where outside motorists go when they come to Klamath Falls. Tourists naturally gravitate to that place, for it is the out-of-state registration office, it gathers road information, and tourist literature is available there. If we had a museum, with exhibits of scientific and historical interest in connection with the Klamath region, we certainly would want those visitors to see them. They would see them, if the chamber of commerce and museum were located in the same structure."

"Furthermore, there would have to be somebody on hand throughout the day to take care of a museum. If the chamber of commerce were located at the same place, the chamber staff could handle that work."

Young said that various possibilities for a building have been considered. It is essential, he pointed out, that the museum and chamber offices be in a central location, which can be reached easily both by tourists and by local and Klamath country people downtown.

"The post members feel that in they can do something to promote this project, it will be a truly worthwhile contribution to the community," said Young.

MERRILL, Ore.—Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Moser, Presbyterian missionaries home on a nine-months furlough from the missionary post, Cameron, Kivu, East Africa, were guests of honor at a silver tea held at the Presbyterian manse Wednesday afternoon when Mrs. Moser, former Klamath Falls resident, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Dunbar of that city talked informally on her work among the natives.

Now as in years past the people of Africa are in need of religion's message, and in her work Mrs. Moser is frequently called upon by young women who feel the urge to learn. Her work is devoted to bringing Christianity into native homes and in teaching improvement in living conditions.

Moser is treasurer of the mission and although not an ordained minister has ample opportunity for preaching.

Mrs. Moser has been in Africa for the past three years and Mr. Moser served several years prior

to the time his wife took up missionary work there. They are on a nine-months leave of absence and will return to Africa some time next summer.

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MAN SENTENCED TO PRISON TERM
