Confer With Roosevelt on Aid for Tenant Farmers



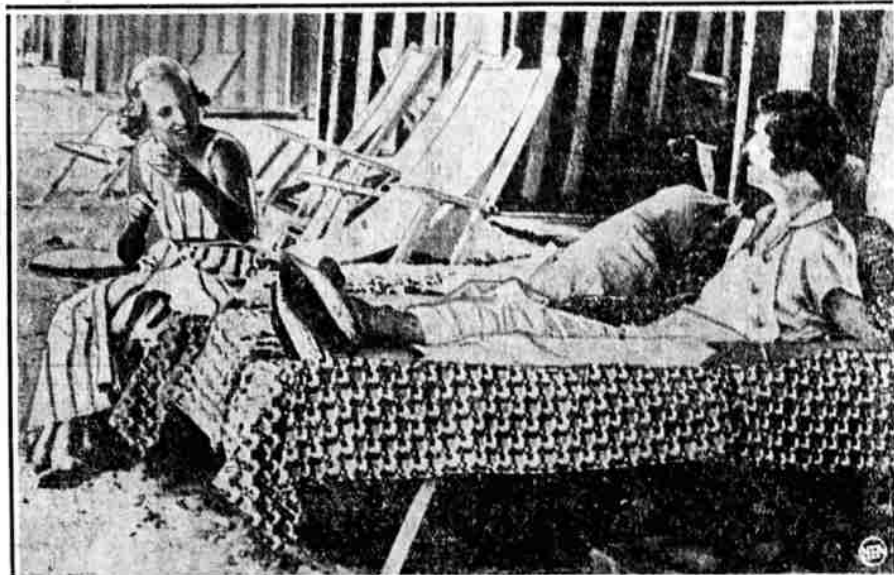

Father Despairs for Kidnaped Son



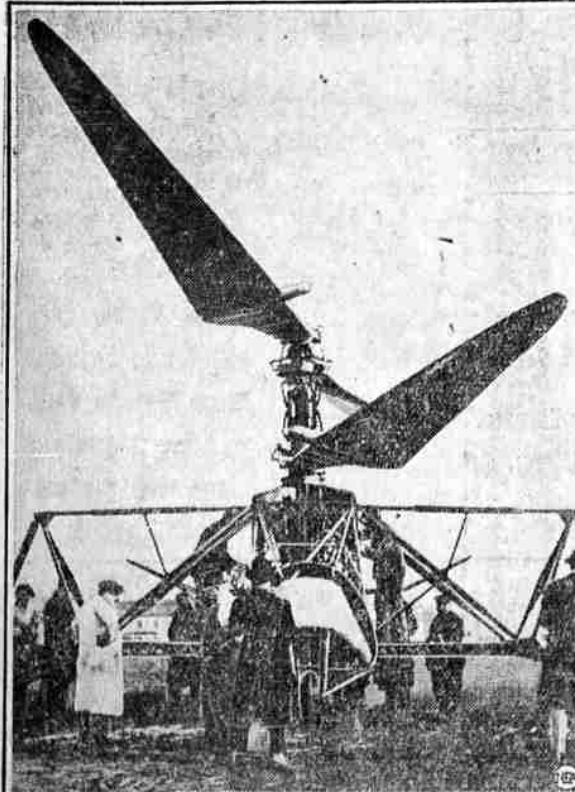
