National and Local Markets

WHEAT AVERAGES LOWER ON MONDAY

CHICAGO, Jan. 13, (AP)—Virtually disregarding the United States supreme court process tax decision in the Rice Millers' case, wheat averaged lower today. There was a short-lived rally of values following the decision, but traders afterward concluded the status of taxes actually collected remained in doubt. Under such circumstances, prices again sagged. What closed unstable at the same as Saturday's high, to 1 cent lower, May, \$1.00 to \$1.01; corn, in to 1 cent down; May, 59c to 60c; oats unchanged to 5c off, and provisions varying from 20c setback to a rise of 2c.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 13, (AP)—A late rally in the rails helped to brighten today's stock market picture. Packing, Oil and specialty issues were also in demand. Supreme court rulings apparently did not stir the list unduly. Despite considerable profit taking in spots, there were many gains of fractions to a point or more. The close was steady. Transfers approximated 2,650,000 shares. The utilities led a forward push in the morning, but they shaded or cancelled their advances when the expected TVA decision was not forthcoming. Packing stocks were among the liveliest of the session at improved earnings reports of leading companies. Carrier equities reflected expanding car-loadings. Steel issues did little. Grains backed up while cotton steadied following dismissal by the high tribunal of the first Bankhead act case. Bull bonds exhibited strength. The dollar rallied against the principal foreign exchanges. The flurry in rail shares put the ticker tape a trifle behind in the final hour. Until then trading was quiet. Preferreds included Mfg. Nickel Plate preferred, New York Central, Union Pacific, Williams Co., Armour, Swift, American Sugar Refining, Houston Oil, Ohio Oil, Standard of New Jersey, National Cash Register, Burroughs and International Telephone. Details up to a point were registered by Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, American Can and Anaconda. A loss of eight points was suffered by Air Reduction. Boston Wool

BOSTON, Jan. 13, (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Sales of wool in Boston have recently been slower than two or three weeks ago. Prices remained firm, the larger business was on 84s and finer western grown wools. Scattered sales of small volume were closed on a number of other lines. Average to short French combing 64s, and finer domestic wools in original bags brought \$2 to \$4 cents scored basis, while average to good French combing in similar lines realized \$4 to \$6 cents. Semi-bright strictly combing and medium fleeces sold around 75 cents scored basis for 56s, 3/4 blood and 1/2 blood 70 cents for 48s, 50s, 3/4 blood.
