

Oregon Giants Crush Idaho Vandals, 61-29

Klamath Proves Strength

Team Rises from Second-rate Class to Dominate District For Fifth Year. Oregon No Longer Merely Darkhorse.

The steady development of the Klamath high school basketball team from a second-rater to the dominating position in the district is one of the most genuine achievements of athletics here this season. With an absolutely new team of inexperienced players, Dwight French, Klamath coach, makes a positive bid for his fifth straight district championship. The situation is unexpected, for even the most optimistic followers didn't concede the Pelicans any great chance to defeat Bend.

The season is by no means over, Bend must be met again and then the issue must be finally determined at the district tournament. If Klamath's young players, only one of whom a letterman, can get to the state tournament for the fifth time in as many years, then something of a miracle has been performed by both the athletes and their coach.

Durbin, the Klamath forward, was one of the big reasons for the victory over Bend. The Bend Bulletin describes him as follows: "Durbin, a lanky forward who plays brilliant ball, was principally responsible for the Lava Bear defeat. The Klamath player accounted for 13 of the 22 points made by the visiting team. Durbin made 11 of the 16 points scored by the visitors in the first half. In the final half, Durbin was more closely watched, being held to one basket but his fellow-forward, Reginato, was on the loose and made three baskets."

The report continued: "The game had no bearing of the championship but it closely pointed to the fact that a contender for district honors and the right to enter the state tournament again this season."

Oregon's one-sided victory over Idaho Monday night removed the Webfoots from the classification of "darkhorse." The Webfoots, without the slightest doubt, are now full-fledged contenders. Washington and Oregon State are already working out a defense for those Oregon Giants, who appear to move slowly yet drop in too many points.

WARD HOWELL LEADS SCORERS

Webfoot Darkhorse Team Gains Sensational Win Over Invaders.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 14. (AP)—University of Oregon's dark horse basketball team turned into a dashing runaway in its first coast conference, northern division game of the season, and tromped University of Idaho under a terrific 61 to 29 score here last night.

Howell Big Star Coach Howard Hobson, and the numerous transfers who followed him here from Southern Oregon Normal, gave the other coast schools plenty to work about by their booming, fast-breaking offense.

The Webfoot Giants, headed by six-foot-six Ward Howell, were ahead only 24 to 18 at the half, but in the second cano their shots at the backboard beat a steady staccato, and they kept the scorer busy registering 27 points while Idaho gained but 11.

Idaho started out strong, and led 7 to 6 early in the game. Oregon moved ahead, but Wally Geraghty, the Vandals' all-conference guard, caged three goals in rapid succession to tie the score at 13-11.

New Giants Rushed in Oregon then moved ahead, and the start of the second half ran up 18 points before Idaho scored again. Coach Hobson kept sending in fresh Giants to maintain the terrific pace and rest his regulars for tonight's game here with the Vandals and for Friday's significant game with Oregon State, defending northern division champion.

The reserves had nearly as much success finding the hoop as did the regulars. Howell scored 19 points to head the scoring, while Liebowitz followed with 16. Willie Jones, Oregon's high scorer last season, had to be content with six points. Twelve of Idaho's points were registered by the sharp-shooting Geraghty.

Quick Triumph Over Retzlaff Predicted For Joe Louis

CHICAGO, Jan. 14. (AP)—The outcome, a quick, crushing triumph for Joe Louis over Charley Retzlaff, seems as certain as tomorrow, but the indications are that \$75,000 worth of spectators will be enough interested in seeing it done to go to the Chicago stadium Friday night.

Chicago fight fans have not had an opportunity to watch the Brown Bomber blast an opponent out of action since last August when King Levinsky acted as the party of the second part. Many of the 39,195 who went to the White Sox baseball park that night missed seeing the King abdicate in the first round because threatening weather caused the management to stage the event about an hour ahead of schedule.

The attraction, the first major fight event of the Chicago season, as well as the spectacular Detroit Negro's initial appearance of 1936, is expected to attract a near-capacity attendance of 20,000. Reports that Louis has not looked so sharp in training may help to pack the stadium.

Competing with the main event in popular interest will be the meeting between Tiger Taskoff of Bulgaria and Shinuchi Chikuma of Japan. Taskoff, a wrestler of the "old school" is familiar with the art of jiu jitsu. His chances for a victory over the sportman-like oriental are good.

Both catch-as-catch-can and jiu jitsu will be employed in this mixed bout. The program will start at 8:30, when Frankie Peck of San Francisco enters the ring to tackle Tuffy Cleet of New York. Peck is one of the cleanest, most thorough grapplers to come to Klamath Falls in many months. Since Cleet is making his debut here, little is known of his ability.

Joe Louis, Jim Braddock Aid Recovery of Boxing Game

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 14. (AP)—Two men, James J. Braddock and Joe Louis, have caused tremendously increased interest in professional boxing and led thousands of men and women all over the United States to talk about the game though perhaps they've never even seen a boxing glove.

Although Louis' sensational exploits during 1935 must be reckoned the outstanding development of the year, Braddock's stunning defeat of Max Baer by the heavyweight championship can be ranked a close second among the causes for boxing's revival. This entirely unexpected result was of tremendous value to the game for it showed at once that a man with a strong physique and good heart, well grounded in the fundamentals of boxing, always has a chance.

Big Gate Viewed If, as seems likely now, Louis and Braddock are matched for the title this year, the "gate" should run well over \$1,000,000 and bring such a rush of customers as no stadium in the country could accommodate.
